


K.G.S. lost a good friend by the sudden death last November of Mr. J. H. Clothier. Four sons of Mr. Clothier belong to K.G.S. and two are members of the Association, and Mr. Clothier himself took a real interest in the school. He never missed being present at the Cross Country and Sports.

A valuable addition has been made to the House Cups. Mr. A. E. Penny, of Oakfield, Salwick, has presented a silver cup for the Junior Cross Country Race.

A notable event in the Spring Term of 1924 was the introduction of House Concerts, each House in turn giving

a Concert to the School. These proved very successful and enjoyable.

Mr. R. V. Ryder, Secretary to the Warwickshire County Cricket Club paid a visit to the School in March, and gave a most interesting lecture on cricket to the School.

A new Motor Mower, a 30-inch 4 h.p. Green (£130) has been obtained. It is now possible to keep mown almost the entire area of the field. This has been made possible by the fine lead given by the Association when they voted £25 for this purpose.

PRIZE DAY, July 29.—P. E. Meadon, Esq., Director of Education to the Lancashire County Council, has promised to present the prizes.

Old Boys' Football Match and Dinner, November 18th.

The Sports, 1924.

The morning of May 21st was not at all promising, but a delightful afternoon favoured the Sports. There was a large attendance. The entries were large and a general keenness marked all the open events.

The Cross Country on March 26th was won by the Lytham House, with the Fylde House as runners-up. The first man home was J. O. Clothier, his time being 26 mins., 2 secs.

This year a Junior Cross Country was run for the first time, on March 31st, over a slightly shorter course. The winners were the Kirkham House, with the Fylde House as runners-up. The first home was D. Robinson.

The Victor Ludorum Cup was won by R. Robinson, who won the Long Jump and Hurdles, and was second in the Mile, Half-mile, Quarter-mile, and Cross Country, totalling 41

points. J. O. Clothier, who won the Cross Country, 100 Yards, and Quarter-mile, was second with 35 points.

The contest for the House Cup was fought with the usual keenness. The Fylde House was first with 73 points, the Lytham House was second with 66.

The Old Boys' Race (220-yards) was won by R. S. Crozier, F. Mullineaux being second.

Cricket, 1924.

Apart from the first three School Matches, in which the Eleven showed no sign of their true form, the season has been an eminently successful one. Cameron disappointed us as a batsman, but on the whole the Eleven reached a higher level than any team during the past 10 years. Atkinson was the most prominent player, both as batsman and bowler, and should make his mark in the future.

The improvement of the playing-field, and the playing of matches on the School ground between the Old Boys XI. and such teams as the East Lancashire Wanderers and Preston Garrison, have done much to raise the standard of the School Cricket.

School Matches.—Arnold House were decisively beaten at Kirkham, but early in the season matches were lost against Hutton (1), Blackpool Secondary School (1), and Arnold House (1). The remaining match against Blackpool Secondary School resulted in an even draw.

OTHER MATCHES.—Wins were recorded against Preston III., Mr. H. C. Turner's XI., Wrea Green, the Master's XI., and losses against Preston III., Mr. G. G. Atkinson's XI., and the Old Boys' XI.

The 2nd XI. had a very successful season. Arnold House, Blackpool Secondary School, and Hutton G.S., were beaten once each, one match was lost against Blackpool Secondary School, one match against Arnold House drawn.

The season was memorable for the introduction of the Rugby game. The original intention was to spend the season in learning the new code, while fulfilling the old programme of Association matches. Interest and enthusiasm soon led to the arrangement of Rugby fixtures. In spite of the difficulties of playing under both codes, the School made very rapid progress in the Rugby game, and such foundations have been established that the outlook for the future is bright. Next Season only the Rugby game will be played, except in the Old Boys' match.

Matches were played against XV's from Preston Grass-hoppers R.F.C., The Fylde R.F.C. (twice) and Dick Kerrs

A.; in each case the School were defeated except against Dick Kerrs A. who were beaten 8 points to 3. In Inter-School matches, Lancaster R.G.S. II. XV. (twice) Blackpool Secondary School (twice) and Hutton G.S. were met: in each case the K.G.S. XV. were defeated but not disgraced.

Of Junior Matches the Second XV. lost to Hutton 2nd XV., and 4 Bantam Matches, i.e. teams with limitations as to age, size and weight, were played. K.G.S. Bantams beat Hutton Bantams and Blackpool Secondary School Bantams at home, and lost the return matches away.

Prize Bay, 1924.

Prize Day was held on July 30th. Mr. W. W. Vaughan, Headmaster of Rugby, presented the prizes.

The Chairman of the Governors (the Rev. W. T. Mitton) presided over a large gathering, and in opening the proceedings observed that Governors of Schools in these days needed to be students of economy and also the possessors of a lively imagination, and between the two they had an exceedingly

difficult task to fulfil. There were things which the Governors regarded as desirable, but which were out of the question with the resources at their disposal, and one was the considerable improvement of the cricket field, which he hoped would ultimately be accomplished.

The Headmaster (the Rev. C. Strange) in his report said that the past year had been a hard and strenuous one in national life, and a school faithfully reflected the conditions of national life. It had demanded strenuous effort to maintain the high standard of efficiency, but K.G.S. had risen to it. Their numbers showed a tendency to decrease, though they were still nearly 50 per cent. higher than 10 years ago. Neighbouring towns had no longer a surplus of boys seeking secondary education. They could accommodate them themselves and did not make the same demands upon Kirkham. That was as it should be.

After referring to examination successes and pointing out that these successes by no means exhausted the good work done by the School, the Headmaster said that if he were to assess the value of a school the first two departments he would inquire into would be the Latin and Cricket. If they were good there would be little need to inquire further, because the mental discipline involved in learning Latin and the qualities called for in playing true Cricket reveal the best sides of character and mind. Their Latin was not as good as he would like it to be, but it was improving, and it had not been side-tracked, as had been the tendency in some schools in recent years. Their Cricket had never reached a higher standard than it had that season. The spirit of sportsmanship, the loyalty and keenness in School and House Games, was splendid.

The Old Boys' Association was becoming increasingly evident in helpfulness to the School, and Mr. J. H. Rigby was doing a great work as Honorary Secretary of the Association. Among Old Boys who had distinguished themselves were R. H. Bowdler, who had gained 2nd Class Honours in Civil Law at Oxford; E. O. Walton, Bachelor of Arts, Cambridge; E. Thompson, Bachelor of Science, School of Technology, Manchester.

The Headmaster paid tribute to the work of his colleagues and referred to the severe loss the School had suffered by the resignation of Miss Stephens, who during a period of nearly seven years had done splendid and enduring work in the School.

Mr. Budden had brought distinction to himself and the School by taking a Second Class Honours Degree in French at the University of London. He testified his gratitude to the important work done in the domestic welfare of the School by Mrs. Strange. In conclusion Mr. Strange pointed out that K.G.S. was a real and distinct community—a School, and not merely a building wherein instruction is given, and that they recognised their connection both with their past and future. Herein lay no small source of strength.

After handing the prizes to the successful students the Headmaster of Rugby spoke of the continuance of pupils at Secondary Schools at least until the age of 16, for at that stage of life impressions deepened very much, and he would urge employers to be patient and encourage boys to go to them when they had had a reasonable experience at a Secondary School. Parents he would advise to show an interest in the School at which their children were receiving instruction, and one of the best methods of co-operating with the Staff of the School was for parents to lead their children to feel that they were in close touch with the aspirations of their school. He hoped that in the schools there would be a feeling of distrust and even loathing of that spirit of bargaining, which at present was one of the worst features in the country. He thought the only remedy was that the generations brought up in the schools should put aside all ideas of bargaining and that what was done should be done because it was right or because it was generous, irrespective of reward or gain.

He congratulated the Governors and Staff of the School on its situation and surroundings, asserting that surroundings did educate and beauty was of infinite value.

Unnual Meeting and Dinner, 1924.

The Annual Meeting of the Association was held at the School, on November 19th.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting, and the Balance Sheet for the year, were read and approved. It was stated by Mr. J. H. Rigby, Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, that there was a balance in hand of ± 37 . The membership of the Association was 151.

The Chairman alluded to the success which had attended the Cricket Matches arranged by the Association. It was decided to increase the fixture list to 7 matches. It was Resolved that a sum of $\pounds 25$ should be given for the purpose of buying a larger Motor Mower for the cricket field—the hope being expressed that this would lead to contributions from other sources for the same purpose.

A hearty vote of thanks and appreciation was accorded to Mr. J. H. Rigby for his valuable services as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer, and he was unanimously re-elected. The Committee for the ensuing year was constituted as follows:—The President, the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, Messrs. A. V. Catterall, H. Parkinson, T. V. Goodier, T. H. Maxwell, R. S. Crozier, H. C. Turner.

After the Meeting a representative gathering sat down to Dinner. For the first time the Assembly Hall was used, proving an admirable room for the purpose.

During the evening the President proposed that Mr. Benjamin Stuttard (Master 1866-85) and Mr. James Bennett (1845-52) should be appointed Honorary Life Members of the Association. This was acclaimed by the whole gathering.

The usual Toasts were duly honoured, the speakers including the President of the Association (the Rev. C. Strange), the Chairman of the Governors (the Rev. W. T. Mitton), the Rev. E. S. Stoney, Mr. J. H. S. Matthews, and Mr. G. Hughes.

An excellent Entertainment of humour and music was provided by Mr. R. I. Stephenson, and several members who were present.

Whist Drive.



The Sports, 1925.

The twenty-sixth Annual Sports Meeting was held on May 20th. The morning opened in a most disappointing manner, rain falling heavily until after the time appointed for the start. Eventually the sun shone, and in spite of bad ground conditions a successful afternoon resulted.

The Open Cross Country, run on March 30th, was won by the Fylde House, with R. Robinson first man home—the time being 26 min. 14 sec. The Lytham House were runners-up.

The Junior Cross Country was run on April 7th; the Blackpool House winning the Cup, with the School House a good second. R. W. Salthouse was first man home. The Mile Race was run on March 24th on the road.

Playing for The School v. The Old Boxs, on July 1st, 1925, two of the Masters, L. Budden (129), and B. Stevenson (96), made 244 for the first wicket.

The Fylde House easily won the Sports House Cup with 134 points, Lytham and Kirkham tieing for second place with 34.

R. Robinson won the *Victor Ludorum Cup* with 62 points. He was first in the Cross Country, the Mile, the Half-mile, the Quarter, the Long Jump and the High Jump, second in the Hurdles, and third in the 100 Yards.

The most noteworthy performance was 18 ft. 1½ in. in the Long Jump.
