We have also been fortunate in those who have come to our assistance and filled the places of the masters away on active service. Sometimes we seem very far away from the war, and yet we seek to play our part. Our task is not an easy one in these days. Mrs. Strange's part in the School House is a particularly onerous one, but, like you, we find a pride in facing all the tasks and difficulties of these times and in seeking to maintain the home front as worthily as you hold the forefront:

We have been in charge at K.G.S. for twenty-four years, and I have completed nearly thirty years' service at K.G.S. We feel that we have a big family composed of those who have passed through K.G.S. during those years, a family which is truly dear to us and dearer than ever in these times of stress and strain.

Inter-School Athletic Sports.

The Annual Meeting was held on the Blackpool Cricket Ground on May 19th, 1943. Seven schools competed: Arnold, Baines's, Blackpool, Kirkham, Lancaster, Rossall and St. Joseph's. K.G.S. finished third out of the seven schools with 19 points, being beaten by Lancaster (33½) and Rossall (29½). P. Jackson did very well in returning two Firsts, including a record in Putting the Weight. The Trophy and Certificates were presented by W. W. Wakefield, Esq., M.P., Director of the Air Training Corps, who spoke very highly of the Sports, stressing the importance of physical fitness and team work. He said he knew of no other meeting of this kind in the whole country, and thought it might well be copied by other groups of schools. Army Cadets.

Mr. Hughes has supplied the following review of the excellent progress of the K.G.S. Cadet Unit under his efficient command:

"The Cadet Unit, which was formed in June, 1942, is by now a well organised and disciplined force.

"Last August a week was spent in camp at Moss Side, and though the training was strenuous much benefit was derived from it.

"During the winter months good work was done in preparation for the War Certificate A, Part I Examination. Twenty-five cadets who took the examination were successful.

"Our platoon sergeants, Peter Jackson and Frank Sanderson, after attending a short course at Rossall School, passed with credit War Certificate A, Part II.

"A Special Parade was held at Kirkham on May 8th in connection with the "Wings for Victory" Week. Our cadets took their place alongside detachments from the Navy, Army, R.A.F., U.S.A. Forces, Home Guard and Civil Defence, and their general bearing and smartness on parade was specially commended.

"Our strength at the moment is 82, and we hope to raise our ceiling to 100 in the near future. Cadet Officers B. Stevenson and E. J. Williams have rendered excellent service, and the efficiency of the unit is mainly due to their untiring efforts and loyal service."

Prize Day, 1942.

Prize Day was held on July 29th. War-time conditions brought a certain amount of austerity to this time-honoured function, but the prizes were there, thanks to the generosity of the donors, and the flowers and plants, thanks to the kindness of Mr. Duckworth, again added a festive note to the hall, and a good company of boys and their parents enjoyed the proceedings. The Headmaster presented his 23rd Annual Report on the work and progress of the School.

The prizes were presented by the Vicar of Kirkham, the Rev. A. H. Candler, whose presence and address were highly appreciated.

Mr. Candler stressed the value of forming good habits. He reminded the boys that they all started level in that respect, without any handicap of intellectual attainments or physical strength. Each had equal opportunity of taking advantage of what the old School could give him towards the formation of good habits.

News is anxiously awaited of R. Broughton and J. K. R. Hepburn. The latter's ship was torpedoed on 31st October, 1942, but there is some hope that he may have been picked up and be in enemy hands.

We were very pleased to receive a visit from Eric Parker (1927-31). His adventures are an epic story. He was a rear gunner in a bomber which was shot into flames while operating over North Africa. Parker was the sole survivor of the crew, and he owes his life to the tail of the machine breaking away. He was severely injured and was taken prisoner by the Vichy authorities. He received treatment in hospital and his foot had to be amputated. The Allied landing in November brought freedom to Eric Parker, and among the landing party was his brother Ian (1930-31). Within twelve days the brothers met.
