No formal invitations are being issued, but it is hoped that parents will be well represented, and Old Boys who can come will be very welcome. The proceedings begin at 2-45 p.m. Sir Percy Meadon, Director of Education for Lancashire, has promised to present the prizes.

Cricket, 1943.

Once again we have had a successful season, having created a record in not losing a single match.

As was the case last year, much of the success was due to the deadly bowling of G. V. Swarbrick and D. W. Ruddock, who were ably assisted by W. B. Cartmell and J. A. Curwen. The fact that no side reached a three-figure score against us testifies to their good work.

The fielding was good, and a policy of encouraging the batsmen to attack the bowling proved fruitful on several occasions. However, D. W. Ruddock was the only batsman to get runs with any consistency.

A notable season. We have had the most powerful and most freely-scoring side in our Rugby football history. At home the team was irresistible, and piled up huge scores,

Army Cadets.

The K.G.S. Company is a sub-unit of the 2nd Cadet Battalion The Loyal Regiment. It has completed two years of training, and is increasing in numbers and efficiency. Our strength at present is 92, including three officers.

A third platoon has recently been formed, and Sergt. J. H. Roberts, an exceptionally keen cadet, is in charge of the recruits.

The unit has lost the valuable services of C.S.M. Peter Jackson, who has been accepted for a short University Course connected with the R.N.V.R.

His successor as C.S.M. is Frank, Sanderson. Lt. B. Stevenson and Lt. E. J. Williams have both rendered excellent services as Platoon Commanders, and have been well supported by their Platoon Sergeants, Sergt. G. K. Benson and Sergt. R. H. B. Dewhurst, and other junior N.C.O.'s.

A new miniature rifle range is being erected on the School grounds. This will be a great asset to our Cadets, and there should be keen competition for the House Cup, and Beauchamp Cup. We are indebted to the Governors of the School for their generous contribution towards the cost of laying out the new range.

Prize Day, 1943.

Prize Day was held on July 28th. The Chairman of the Governors, the Rev. E. F. Stoney, M.A., presided.

The Headmaster presented his 24th Annual Report on the working and progress of the School.

The prizes were presented by Mr. J. H. S. Matthews, Vice-Chairman of the Governors, an Old Boy of K.G.S., and a son of a former Headmaster, the Rev. W. S. Matthews. Mr. Matthews advised the boys never to under-estimate the duty of everyone to be happy and make other people happy. "I want Kirkham Grammar School boys to look at things brightly and not dully. If they

cannot look into the eyes of a little child and make it smile it is time they sorted their ideas and found out what is the matter with them. They should always respect the dignity of man, whatever his colour, creed or station in life. God made man in His image, and it was an offence against Him to laugh at anyone's physical or mental difficulties. War-time queues had taught them there were plenty of people who would be known as 'thrusters' in hunting circles, or 'poachers' in tennis. That was an objectionable way of going through life.

Examples of misdirected education had been seen in neighbouring countries. It behoved them to uphold proper. education, the basis of which must be religion.
