Revision is an <u>active</u> not a passive activity.

Revision is ineffective if not undertaken rigorously. Be committed.

Remember: in order to commit information to long term memory (and be able to retrieve it again) you must re-visit your revision notes several times.

- 1. Answer questions that have not been set. Students fail to focus on the key words and opt, instead, to write all they know about a particular topic.
- 2. Drift from the point.
- 3. Write a lot of text that takes a long time and only answers part of the question.
- 4. Fail to include topics/concepts/issues expected by the examiner because of misinterpreting the question.
- 5. Fail to use appropriate language or use it in the wrong context.
- 6. Fail to attempt all of the questions or choose an incorrect sequence or combination of questions.
- 7. Answer too many or too few questions.
