TECHNOLO The main concentration this term has been on the completion of project work for 0.00 both GCSE and Alevel courses. The number of projects to be managed has increased greatly due to the new A-level system, and both pupils and staff have been working hard towards completion of the practical work. The deadlines approach us quickly next term.

At the start of the term, Steve Crowther, the Director of Technology, once again represented BAE SYSTEMS in their training programmes abroad. This time teacher training was held in the Qatar capital of Doha in the Gulf. The training, in computer aided design and manufacture, was once again well received by the delegates, and enthusiastically endorsed by the Emir of Qatar. The Emir's wife, who is Director of the Qatar Academy where the training was held, visited the delegates and looked at the work produced.

A small dedicated group of 3rd year technologists have been working hard on the 'Technology' content of the school website. They have documented the design and manufacture of the Fi in Schools Competition. They have drawn on their previous experiences as entrants in this competition. The site will be an inspiration to pupils wanting to get involved with the design and manufacture of CO2 cars. Already an enthusiastic team of 1st years have formed a team and will be entering the competition for 2003. They are just beginning to put together a team identity and starting to put some preliminary designs on paper, before they transfer them to the computer in the form of 3D models. Each member of the team will manufacture a car, the one chosen to enter the competition will come from a race off between team members. We look forward to their design and development work.



An Introduction to the Governors of Kirkham Grammar School

The work behind the scenes of the Governing Body often goes unnoticed so this is an opportunity to introduce the members of this group who work so hard on behalf of the school in so many different ways.



PETER HOSKER CHAIRMAN OF GOVERNORS

Mr Hosker attended Kirkham Grammar School between 1951-58 and went on to read Law at Manchester University; qualifying in 1964. Married to Julie for over 37 years, Mr Hosker has practised in Preston and brought up his family in the area. President of the Old Kirkhamians' Association. in 1975 he became a Governor in 1976 and played a key role in leading the school to Independence in 1979. Mr Hosker served as Chairman between 1984 and 1991 and has been Vice Chairman between 1997-2002. His professional career has culminated in being Senior Partner at Napthens Solicitors in Preston and he has served as Deputy District Chairman of the Lord Chancellor's Appeals Service in 1995. A founder President of his Rotary Club, Mr Hosker has recently taken up a voluntary role as Chairman of the Preston AvenCentral Regeneration Board and Partnership promoting the regeneration of central areas of Preston. This is in addition to his new role as Chairman of Governors at Kirkham Grammar School.

PROFESSOR STEPHEN GRIGG VICE CHAIRMAN

After graduating from Loughborough University, Steve Grigg entered the teaching profession and taught at William Hulme Grammar School in Manchester and Stonyhurst College. Following eleven years of teaching, during which he liaised closely with Industry and Government and held positions of Chief Examiner and Advisor, he was appointed

Principal Designate of one of the City Technology Colleges. During this period the Government decided that his skills would be better used more widely, consequently, he became Director for Education Industry Partnerships. This position brought him into contact with Industry and he joined British Aerospace as Head of Human Resources in February 1992 to further their education aims.

The successful implementation of a Totally Integrated Education Policy led to Steve taking the full responsibility for education on a corporate basis as Director of Education Liaison, British Aerospace plc, from November 1994.

In recognition of his contributions to education and innovations in industry, Loughborough University of Technology awarded him a Chair as Professor of Industrial Education in association with the School of Engineering.

Steve is a member of the DTI Export Group, and Chairman of the Southern Africa Board.

In his current role, he works extensively with overseas Governments in a series of social-economic enhancement partnerships, which currently spread across the Middle East, Far East, Australia, Southern Africa, Central Europe, Brazil and Chile.

PROFESSOR BARBARA ROBOTHAM CHAIRMAN OF THE ACADEMIC COMMITTEE

Professor Robotham énjoyed a busy international career as an opera and concert singer making regular broadcasts and recordings.

She joined the staff of Lancaster University as Professor of Voice in 1972, and the Royal Northern College of Music in

1979, where she still lectures. She has been associated with and regularly worked as external examiner at other major institutions such as Sheffield University, Salford University, The Royal Academy of Music, Guildhall School of Music and Drama, and Chethams School.

Professor Robotham was made Honorary Fellow of RMCM in 1967 for her services to singing, and Honorary Fellow of RNCM in 1993 for her services to teaching. In 1998 she was made Honorary Fellow of the University of Central Lancashire for her services to music.

A former Chairman of Governors, Professor Robotham currently chairs the Academic Committee of the Governing Body.

BILL MOLYNEUX CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARDING COMMITTEE

Mr Molyneux was educated at Kennington Road County Primary School, Fulwood, Preston and Horncliffe House, Blackburn before entering School House as a boarder in 1954. He left in 1961 having gained his First XV rugby colours and captaining the school Second XV in order to enter articles with a local Preston firm of Solicitors. Following qualification as a Solicitor he joined his present firm in 1969. He was President of the Old Boys' Association 1976-77 and has been a Governor of the Kirkham Educational Foundation since and is currently Chairman of the Boarding House and Legal Committees.

KIRKHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOLNEYS

MIKE CUTHBERT CHAIRMAN OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Mike Cuthbert is a parent of former pupils Gerard (1985-90) and Jenny (1987-94). He was co-opted to the Governing Body in 1993 and became Chairman of Finance and Development in 1998.

Educated at De La Salle College, Salford and Durham University. Trained in accountancy at Peat, Marwick and Mitchell (now KPMG) in Leeds. Set up accountancy practice in Bolton in 1974 and Chorley in 1982. Retired from practice in 1999 and moved from Chorley to Bilsborrow in 2001 with his wife Carol.

Carol and Mike were one of three sets of parents who helped fund-raise, organize and eventually travel with the KGS Hockey Squad to Singapore, Australia, New Zealand and the USA in 1992.

MIKE HUDSON CHAIRMAN OF THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

Mr Hudson is a Yorkshireman who achieved his degree at Leeds University in 1961. Working in Engineering and Chemical Industries in the North of England in his earlier years be became Production and Personnel Director at Richard Baxendale and Sons Limited for fifteen years. During this period Mr. Hudson was also Governor of three state schools, each for a period of four years. Achieving Chartered Engineer status (C.Eng.) Mr Hudson became Chairman of Preston and District Training Group Limited from 1988-1996. He joined the Governing Body in 1993 and became Chairman of Personnel in 1996.

REVEREND JULIAN BARKER

Reverend Barker was educated at Summer Fields, Oxford and Sedbergh before gaining a place at Magdalen College, Cambridge to read History. Two years National Service interrupted his university career when he served with the Suffolk Regiment spending one year in Cyprus.

On deciding to be ordained Reverend Barker spent two years at Theological College. Career development progressed from Curate in Stafford to Chaplain at Clare College, Cambridge before marriage and teaching at St Augustine's in Canterbury. After leading a team of parishes in Norfolk Reverend Barker is now Vicar of Repton where he has worked since 1982 combining three village parishes.

He was appointed as Governor of Kirkham Grammar School by the Drapers' Company which is one of the London livery companies. Work in this capacity has involved involvement in the Grants and Welfare Committee additional to visits to almshouses and associated duties.

ALLAN BLACKBURN

Mr Blackburn was born in Clitheroe and educated at Earnseat School, Arnside and The Leys School, Cambridge. Married to Gloria since 1971, they have three children, James (KGS 1986-91), Dawn (KGS 1992-8) and Melanie who attends Pear Tree School in Kirkham. Mr Blackburn joined the family textile company in 1965, was appointed Joint Managing Director in 1978 but left to form his own business with wife Gloria in 1990. G.B. Antiques Limited is now the largest antiques centre within the UK. The business now includes James and Dawn in an extensive operation incorporating two further companies within the Lancaster

Mr Blackburn hosts a regular Antiques Roadshow on Radio Lancashire and his 'live' roadshows are in demand across Lancashire.

Mr Blackburn joined the Governors in 1992 and served as Chairman of Development between 1993 and 1997 and Chairman of Governors between 1997-2002.

A talented sportsman Mr Blackburn played hockey for Preston from 1963-8 and represented Lancashire on 23 occasions. He managed his County to its last Championship triumph in 1985 and assisted in coaching the Kirkham Grammar School 1st XI from 1991-99. During this period Mr Blackburn was President of the Lancashire Association (1995-6) and recently represented the English Hockey Association on the organising committee of the Commonwealth Games.

MRS ROSEMARY CARTWRIGHT

Born in Nottinghamshire Mrs Cartwright attended St Michael's Burton Park, Petworth. She trained as a Private Secretary at Christie College, Cheltenham and subsequently worked for a series of International Companies including Boots; Larry Smith and Associates - Real Estate; Amoco International and Armitage Brothers.

Mrs Cartwright is now a self-employed Managing Agent of privately owned Commercial Business Parks and has been involved in this role since 1989. Within the Governing Body Mrs Cartwright is a member of the Finance and Development Committee; Personnel Committee and recently Chairman of the Appeal Steering Committee. Her work has not been limited to the Governors, as previously a parent of two children at the school Mrs Cartwright was Chairman of the Friends.

PROFESSOR HILARY EVANS

Professor Hilary Evans is Professor of Biochemistry and Director of the School of Biomolecular Sciences at Liverpool John Moores University. Having achieved a BSc at the University of Bristol she worked at the University of Liverpool and Lancashire Polytechnic. Interest in both research and teaching has led to service on a national research and teaching panel, various research council committees and appointment as a university teaching quality assessor. Professor Evans has had two daughters at Kirkham Grammar School who are both now at university (Oxford and UMIST). She serves on two academic committees in her role as Governor at school.

SIMON FULFORD-BROWN

Simon Fulford-Brown was appointed as a Governor in 2001. Although originally from this area Simon spent twenty five years based in London and America working in the shipping industry. For the last ten years of this time he was Chief Executive of an International Cruise Line. Simon and his family have been back in the Fylde since 1993. His business interests now are primarily involved with Commercial Property Investment. Simon has three children at Kirkham Grammar School at varying stages of their education. Although having attended nine consecutive Nativity Plays/Carol Services as a Junior School parent this will be the last in such a capacity! For a number of years Simon and his wife have been committee members of the Friends of Kirkham Grammar. He maintains an active interest in all aspects of the school and is keen to see KGS continue to move forward.

BARRY JOHNSON

Mr Johnson boarded at the Kirkham Grammar School for seven years and professes to have only one claim to fame, which was to represent the school at every sport.

He graduated from Liverpool University as a vet and became President of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons in 1993. He is currently Chairman of the RCVS Education Committee.

Father of six sons, four of whom have attended the school with the youngest one entering the Sixth Form in September 2002.

PROFESSOR HARRY THOMASON

Professor Thomason has held senior management positions in universities for the last 20 years. At Loughborough University he has had 15 years experience in varying roles as a Pro-Vice-Chancellor, introducing and leading strategic planning, resource management appraisal and staff development. He is currently Pro-Vice-Chancellor for External Relations, primarily initiating and developing relationships with industry, commerce and government, both at home and overseas.

As leader of the university's external interface, he has spent the last ten years working with senior staff in large companies, exploring and implementing new approaches to corporate education, training and continuous professional development. He has been intimately involved in collaborative partnerships with major companies including Ford, BAE SYSTEMS, Lotus, Rolls Royce, Accenture, and Thomas Cook.

He has been an advisor to the Singapore Ministry of Education and helped them to implement the setting up of their National Institute of Education. He has worked extensively with the Egyptian Government on the development of a new technological university.

Professor Thomason is a graduate in Human Biology and Physiology. He led a large research group in underwater science and technology supporting the oil industry, and was the founding Professor and Head of Department of Sport Science at Loughborough, which is now internationally regarded as the top university in this field. As an architect for new approaches to corporate learning, his expertise and knowledge at the interface between academia and industry, commerce and government is well recognised and much sought after.

IOHN WAITE

Mr Waite is an old boy of Kirkham Grammar School (1942-47) who entered the aircraft industry as a student apprentice at English Electric, Preston. After achieving an HNC in Mechanical Engineering he progressed to Sheffield University to study Applied Mechanics. Mr Waite spent many years within the aircraft industry progressing to Head Accident Investigator and being awarded the MBE in 1974. Further contributions to the Tornado project and as Director General at British Aerospace Projects for Military Aircraft. Mr Waite became a Governor in 1974 and was Chairman between 1991-96.


RICHARD WILSON

Yes, it was meant to be Chatel, but at very short notice Mr Scott was informed of a change in location due to the lack of snow in the Northern Alps. Valloire, a very attractive French 'Station Village' in the Savoie Alpes and the Hotel Touring, was the new venue. KGS Ski Society had visited here at Easter in 1992 and so some of the older staff remembered it.

With apprehension the information was passed on to parents, friends and relatives at 3.30 am when departure was due from school at 4.45 am for an early morning flight to Geneva. It was also a slightly longer transfer time so arrival at the resort was later in the afternoon than expected. The hotel staff were very obliging, as they were all week, and provided a late lunch for us and started ski fitting very efficiently. With it being so early in the season, much of the equipment was brand new and in excellent condition. Terry and Tom, the ski techs, were a great help and even escorted us to the ski school every morning and checked on the gear. Even so, some people still took the wrong boots or skis and some even forgot their ski pass — Mrs Walker!

It was during this first afternoon that the party, (mainly of years 2 to 4, and over 50% were complete novices) discovered the delights of the mountain village. Crepes and pommes frites could be purchased, in Euros of course, and there was a multitude of shops for gifts and sweets. The 'Village Trail' organised by our rep. Savannah, after the evening meal also allowed more discovery of the festive sights and atmosphere of Valloire. How did Mr Scott and Doc Hall manage to get

lost when they were the only ones who had been there before?

The next morning was absolutely idyllic. It had snowed overnight and the village streets were beautiful and unforced until KGS, discovered the fun of snowballing before breakfast.

At least 20 cm of fresh snow had fallen on the ski slopes and even the absolute beginners realised how much more forgiving powder is and easy to learn on. The party was assessed on ski ability and there was a small advanced group with Tristan Brooke indicating that he had spent time skiing in France before. About 10 were intermediate skiers but the vast majority were beginners. So good were the conditions that on the first day, in the afternoon lessons all the groups were at the top of the mountain, skiing Le Crey du Quart at over 2500 metres! This was certainly remembered by the likes of Jennie Ireland and Jemma Thackray. The staff's help was much appreciated by the ski school in picking up the debris of bodies on the first run down, however by the end of the week all were flying down the mountain with great speed and control. The steep learning curve of youngsters on skis was a joy to see and all of them progressed to a very competent standard amazingly quickly.

So good were the ski conditions, (it snowed again on the second night) that Rob Sissons, Jamie Best and Jonathan Knowles all graduated to the intermediate group in a couple of days. Later on in the week the beginners were seen hurtling down red runs in the full racing tuck!

After the lessons Mr Scott, (our Alpine Ski Leader), took any volunteers for an extra run or two before lunch or before the lifts closed in the afternoon. Some great falls were observed and certificates were awarded accordingly after the evening meal every night. It was terrific fun skiing and falling in the powder but difficult to put skis back on and impossible to locate your ski sometimes, yes Robert? Thanks must go to little Joe Leeming for finding it.

It was because of the good conditions that accidents, fortunately, were very few. Maddie Eaves did strain a ligament landing after a jump but rest and physiotherapy allowed her to ski again before the end of the week. Unfortunately Mrs Walker's innocuous slip on the third day put her out of action on the slopes for the rest of the week. The only other casualty was Tristan who broke a finger on the bum-boarding night but the excellent French medical services put it in a splint that would not affect his skiing.

The other evenings' entertainment was also good fun. Some of the older staff rediscovered their skills at ten-pin bowling. (Mr Scott won overall!) We had a slumber party in the dining room and watched some great videos. We had a quiz night and some wanted to go bowling again. After the final night's presentation of ski certificates by the Ecole du Ski Français, we went to Le Village, the local disco for our last night out. This enabled some of the girls to dress in clothes more suited to Tokyo Joe's rather than the sub-zero temperatures experienced in the mountains. Frostbite of the navel was a distinct possibility! An early night was really needed before we set off back at 3.30 am the next morning but some of the party had to have just one more crepe before departure!

Despite the concern over the changed location this proved to be one of the best ski holidays in recent years. The location, hotel, staff, ski conditions and even the food (yes, we did have frogs legs!) were all very good. Thanks must go to Ski Partners and all the staff involved at the Hotel Touring for their help and service. However, thanks must go to all KGS staff who gave up the first week of their Christmas break to accompany this first ever, juniors-only ski trip, especially Mr Scott who, as party leader, does all the organisation and paperwork and to Doc Hall who organises Ski Clobber and runs the bank.

Yes, one usually associates Spain with the Costas and a Summer holiday. But this February half term a group of 31 senior pupils and four staff flew out to Barcelona, heading for Alp 2500 and the ski station of Masella in the Pyrenees.

BMIbaby from East Midlands, (another first), was our departure point, so early in the morning we assembled at KGS for the coach to Nottingham. We arrived at the Hotel Alp in Masella and that was what it was — a hotel and a few other time-shares. No shops, cafes, bars or any other entertainment! The hotel was huge (5 other English schools and too many very noisy Spanish children). The food, however, was very good and as much as one could eat, which was a lot by the lower sixth boys. The rooms were fine after the initial overcrowding which was eased by moving some fifth form girls out.

The skiing was the main purpose of the trip. The next two days' weather was not too good. Poor light and visibility, cold and a wind starting later indicated the beginnings of storm conditions. An exciting invitation was received for the Choir to take part in a broadcast for Granada Television of one of its 'My Favourite Hymns' programmes. Tuesday 25th March

saw the members of the Choir travelling to the magnificent St Walburge's Church in Preston where they recorded a Harvest Festival Service for broadcast on 12th October 2003. As well as leading the congregation in the harvest hymns the choir sang the anthem 'All things bright and beautiful' by John Rutter. Witnessing a television broadcast put together through a morning of rehearsals and the afternoon recording provided a fascinating insight into the mechanics of outside broadcasts and provided the choir members with a challenging and rewarding day.

GRAND FINALE FOR MUSIC TEACHERS



The sound of music at Kirkham Grammar School hit a low note when two of our maestros played their last tune. John Catterall, Director of Music and Richard Evans a peripatetic music teacher both retired at the same time.

Mr Catterall had held the top post since 1971 and received an MBE for services to choral music last year. His skills as choirmaster attracted outstanding school choirs of up to 100 pupils and the annual inter-house music festival regularly attracted more than 300 entries. Mr Catterall has been choirmaster of Broughton Parish Church since 1966 and encouraged thousands of youngsters to improve their musicianship. Many of his pupils received top honours and his church choir is one of only six in the country to achieve the St Nicholas Guild Choir status for consistently excellent standards in choral music.

Richard Evans is well known throughout the brass band world after leading many local people to success in national and international competitions. His credits include international acclaim with the old Leyland Vehicles Brass Band.



based at school.











YOUNGENTERPRISE

This term, club members enjoyed another trip to Aqualife at Auldene Garden Centre, where we had ordered two female gerbils. However, the remaining gerbils were all male. We were actually pleased to hear this because our internet research had shown that male gerbils are actually more sociable than females and unlike most rodents, do not fight for their territory. We have set up a large aquarium tank containing a mixture of peat, hay and sawdust so that the gerbils are able to create burrows and have plenty of room for exercise.

We also purchased a young, female Syrianhamster, called Popcorn, and three black widow tropical fish.

We may be able to breed the Syrian hamsters after Easter, but must first make sure that a reputable pet shop is prepared to take the young pups once they are five weeks old. Hamsters need to be separated before they are mature because breeding closely related individuals can lead to inbreeding problems ie genetic defects or weaknesses.

Also on the agenda, for the warmer weather, is the monitoring of invertebrates in the school pond. Several pond-dipping activities are planned so that we can assess any increase in blodiversity.

After Easter, Animal Ark Club is teaming up with Science Club in a trip to Jodrell Bank where there is a planetarium and nature trail.

DEBATING






Cricket Bowling Machine


