While the annual pressures of examinations have been felt by the whole school, staff and pupils alike, the term has remained a busy one. The first half of the term was notable for the school going 'worldwide' as we launched our new website officially. His address at the launch stressed the global exposure that the website gives the school and how he had recently grasped the opportunities presented by this powerful tool for his own ventures. STAFF

This year sees some changeover in staffing at school with four retirements and one or two other departures.

Mr Brian Taylor (photo right) retires as Head of German at Kirkham Grammar School after 35 years' service. Brian arrived in 1968 after taking his degree at Leeds University and his PGCE at Liverpool. Arriving as a fresh faced youth Brian has overseen the development of German throughout the school extending the teaching to junior forms and to Alevel. He was appointed initially by Bill Kennedy and has subsequently worked with four Headmasters.

During his time here Brian has made a significant contribution to the life of the school. He was Housemaster of Lytham House until its demise — at which point he transferred to Preston House and remained at the helm for several years. On the sporting front Brian was in charge of junior cricket for many years and held the lofty position of Captain of the successful school staff cricket team. Legend has it that he was a fine wicketkeeper who always kept the slips on their toes! Brian even drove our ist XV on their first ever tour abroad, to Narbonne in 1977. He has, of course, led many trips abroad in his role as a linguist and has been single handedly responsible for the success of the German Exchange with the Anne Frank Schule in Linden.

As Chairman of the Fell Walking Society, Brian has led generations of Kirkham Grammar School pupils across the hills and dales of the Lake District and more recently has managed to encourage the ladies of the staff-room to take to the hills at weekends. His talents also extend to the school choir where he was a stalwart for many years and more recently who can forget his role in the school play as Mr Peach, the adjudicator of the Farndale production of Macbeth. Pink is indeed his colour!

In his twilight years Brian has assumed the unenviable task of President of the Staff Common Room and has led this diverse body with good humour and patience.

He now looks forward to a long and well earned retirement and takes with him the best wishes of all at KGS.

Mrs Barbara Williams has taught at Kirkham Grammar School for six years as part-time Religious Studies teacher and regularly illustrates her commanding presence by speaking unscripted to the school in assembly. Her stories always capture the audience and mirror the success she has with her pupils within the classroom. Her contribution to the Religious Studies Department and school in general will be missed but she leaves with our best wishes.

From the Physics Department we were all disappointed to recognise the final departure of Mr Ray Noble. Ray has taught Physics at school for thirteen years and recently undertook the immense task of Examinations Officer. Held



dear by so many pupils Mr Noble has suffered heart problems of late and has thus not been in school since November. His cheery smile and ever-helpful response to any problem will be missed. We hope Mr Noble enjoys his retirement in Mawdsley and continues to visit us on a regular basis.

Also from the Physics Department we see the departure of Mr Brown who is undertaking not his first retirement but his third! He has worked part-time in the Physics Department in recent years and done much to support this excellent department. His experience as a Chief Examination Officer has always been of great assistance and we wish him well on this his — definitely — final retirement!

Mrs Lynda Poole left us in May to take up a new post at Teeside School for Girls where she has accepted the position of Deputy Headmistress. Mrs Poole has run the Drama Department with great energy over the past four years; most recently with the school production of 'Grimms Tales'. Her enthusiasm for drama has never dampened and she has left some treasured memories for many pupils.

From the Technology Department we lose Mr Steve Crowther who moves on to pastures new. Mr Crowther, as Director of Technology has overseen the transformation of the Department with an exciting newly fitted series of workshops for our pupils to use. The link with BAE Systems has also benefited from Mr Crowther's sure grasp of his subject and the further development of ICT within school has continued under his stewardship. We are grateful for Mr Crowther's contribution to school life and hope he finds happiness in his future career.

Mrs Helen Parkinson also leaves us to play a greater role in the family farming business. Although with us for only one year Mrs Parkinson has quickly made an impact with the care and concern she has shown in her preparation and the delivery of her lessons.

One further departure has seen Mr Alan Shelley leave the Reprographics room after three successful years overseeing its inception. We are grateful for all their hard work and for the enthusiasm which they bring, under the close supervision of our team of experienced mentors.

Throughout the term, a number of aspiring PGCE students have visited KGS in order to observe the teaching methods of various members of staff. The Art, Business Studies and Maths Departments have played host to graduates currently applying for teaching courses. We also welcomed two trainee teachers from Boras University, Sweden: Katerina Fasth and Marge Sundstrom are learning to teach English in Sweden and spent a week at KGS observing a range of lessons. It seems that the School's reputation for exemplary teaching has spread internationally.

The Governors remain determined to maintain the momentum in creating an exciting environment for all our pupils and teachers. We have seen the new Girls' changing rooms, extended common room facilities, newly launched website and now a purpose built nursery for the Junior School. This development will allow pupils to enter the Kirkham Grammar School community from the age of three in outstanding purpose built accommodation.

Within the Senior School, Mrs Frances Piercy has continued to further the Appeal, having now launched the Isabel Birley Society; undertaken a central role in the recent Auction Dinner and developed the Appeal Newsletter to keep all our generous donors informed of developments. Her work here now nears its end and Mrs Piercy will move on in August after three years undertaking that most difficult task of raising funds for school developments. She has done so with impeccable professionalism and both Mrs Piercy and her daughter Emma leave with our grateful thanks and our best wishes for a successful future.

We now await the outcome of the Appeal but the following statement has been issued to all donors and to staff at the school to ensure we are kept up to date with developments as they arise.

SCIENCE LABORATORY AND CLASSROOM DEVELOPMENT

The Governors are currently finalising plans for Phase 1 of our new classroom development. This has involved a curriculum audit, projected over coming years, and a broad look at the geography of the school.

As a consequence, the original concept of enclosing the quadrangle may not prove to be the most favourable position for our development and the likelihood of building to the west of the school is now being seriously considered, involving construction in place of current temporary classrooms.

Our aim is to provide modern, well-equipped laboratories in Phase I to allow all Science to be taught in an exciting environment where pupils' involvement in practical work is central to teaching throughout the curriculum. We believe these fully networked and highly equipped facilities will enhance the current Technology and ICT provision within the school to provide an outstanding educational experience for all our pupils. There will also be provision made for new classroom facilities.

It is hoped that an announcement confirming these developments will be made in September 2003 for a building commencement date of Easter 2004.


Sixth Form Leavers Ball 2003

We wish all our Sixth Form every success with their AS and A2 examinations.



the great indoors auraforo ART WORKSHOP Third year pupils who have opted to do GCSE artwork next year were involved in a two day workshop based on the work (top left) by artist Laura Ford whose exhibition "The Great Indoors" was held at the Harris Museum, Preston. Her work was based on an idea of camouflage, where she wanted to create a forest of stags with oversized antlers suggesting trees, their bodies hedges, their legs trunks and undergrowth. Our students with the aid of a team of three artist teachers that included Rachel Chester (OKA), started the workshop with a visit to the exhibit at the Harris, then an intensive developing of ideas and construction of sculptures that resulted in six impressive stags heads (example above) and various camouflaged woodland creatures. The finished pieces have a very 'Contemporary Art' feel and will be going on temporary display at the Harris in August. We have yet to find a more permanent hanging in the school so for the meantime they can be seen in the senior artroom which is always open for

GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

The week before the Spring Bank half term always sees the current fourth form geography students released into countryside and town for their annual data capture exercise. This means that they spend a full day in the Trough of Bowland collecting information, measuring hydraulic variables and getting thoroughly wet, and half a day in Kirkham collecting human geography information.

All this is essential preparation for the internal assessment, or fieldwork report, which has to be completed by next October and constitutes 25% of the final GCSE grade.

The weather this year was appalling. Very heavy rain actually caused a shortening of the second group's work, as the water was too deep for safety! They also had quite a wet morning collecting information in Kirkham as it rained all day. However, not to be put off both groups successfully completed their assigned tasks and collected the required information and can now begin the more arduous task of writing the report.

With the increased use of ICT, the laptop computer was an essential and very valuable addition this year. As the information was recorded it was immediately transferred into a spreadsheet and all the data, from all groups on both days, can now be accessed on the school's intranet, or J drive by all the pupils. This greatly overcomes problems of lost data or the results sheets falling into the river!

Despite the weather, both GCSE sets worked well and seemed to enjoy themselves even though they were exceedingly wet through.





Scarborough Field Course

Straight after Easter the annual Lower Sixth field course prepared to depart for Scarborough. Once the minibuses were packed, we were ready to set off east over the Pennines. Final head count.... 'Where's Tom?' We then lost Bob and decided that he would catch us up on the motorway.

The weather en route was simply appalling. Very heavy rain, low cloud and even wind — why were we venturing into Yorkshire? Even when we arrived in Saltaire, Bradford, it was still spitting so the walk around Sir Titus Salt's factory village was cut short slightly and we were forced to adjourn to a McDonalds for lunch!

By the time we arrived in Scarborough the sun began to shine. The Cliffside Hotel, (a new venue this year) was ideally placed and we could leave the minibuses safely without risk of parking tickets. It was decided to walk up to the castle for the historical introduction by Mr Scott and so that Mr Harrison could point out the coastal defences being constructed in the North Bay. A brief drive through the old town and a walk around the harbour soon gave the hearty geographers a renewed appetite for more food. In the absence of McDonalds, Mr Scott insisted on seafood. Cockles and mussels were tasted by only a few, but Tom even tried an oyster, with some reluctance. Many thought that ice cream was much safer.

The evening work session went on till 9.00 pm as much had to be prepared for the river survey the following day. We were fortunate to have excellent, sunny weather for the River Derwent study. The area of Hackness and Harwood Dale (all part of the North Yorkshire Moors National Park) was very attractive and restful until KGS geographers disturbed the peace. A hearty meal was enjoyed by all that evening as appetites had been built up during the day, as there was no McDonalds in the countryside.

The second full day was spent in the beautiful city of York. Here the heritage and tourist industry was being studied, as specified in the AS Module 3. Mr Harrison also guided the group around the Foss Flood Barrier and other river defences that have been built to combat recent flooding on the River Ouse. Evidence of the terrible floods of 2000 was seen along the riverside. Mr Scott gave a guided tour of Clifford's Tower, Fairfax House, The Merchant Adventurers Hall and the Shambles. After lunch with the pigeons, the afternoon was then spent in the famous Castle Museum.

After a full and very tiring day, again the group work lasted till 9.00 pm preparing the coastal survey day. Some of the party required even further sustenance and Alex Newton (despite four Weetabix for breakfast and a full fry-up) discovered a nearby take-away Chinese and was determined to eat his way through North Yorkshire!

The introduction to the coastal module was covered from outside the hotel. Here we could observe the various sea defences that have been used along the cliffs and the new, reinforced sea wall. The site of the Holbeck Hall was visited where a plaque informed us of the demise of the hotel which slipped into the sea a few years ago. We continued the coastal work all the way down to Bridlington. The classic case study of Flamborough Head was studied, much to the delight of Charliel This area had been mentioned and studied in class, but here it could be studied first hand — read the book - get the tee shirt! (Much of this information, along with the coastal management scheme in Scarborough, was actually examined in the module!). The burgers at the café were not up to McDonalds!

On returning to Scarborough Mr Scott took the group down to the North Bay again, to see the force of the waves, as it was high tide. Despite health and safety warnings from IMS some of the group managed to get a drenching from the waves. The final night's work finished the group was allowed a little R and R but more was in store the next morning. Breakfast as usual, several Weetabix, full fry-up and lots of toast for Alex to give him strength to load the minibus!

Our return trip took us through York, again a little wet, but a very impressive walk of the walls to the North of the city visiting King's Manor, the Minster and, of course, McDonald's to see how it has been architecturally blended in to the surrounding buildings!

Thanks must be given to Mr Scott, Mr Harrison and Ms Oliphant for all their help and organisation. The work that was covered was all very closely linked to all three AS modules examined at the end of May. Although this was a much shorter course than previous years' it was much more concentrated and ideally placed just before the assessment sessions.

We were also unlucky not to be able to compete in the Mace debate because of a late change of date.


However, on the credit side, the Society has staged monthly debates which have been lively and interesting; formats have varied from traditional parliamentary style to balloon and snap.

On a scorching hot Saturday in June, Animal club regulars were rewarded for all their 'cleaning cage duties' by a trip to Chester Zoo. We were most impressed by the large, walk through bat zone where, once our eyes became accustomed to the dim light, we could see a variety of bat species flying over our heads. Many of the Zoo's animals were 'sunbathing' in their outdoor enclosures and less active than usual but at least they were easy to spot. The tropical house with its many species of snakes, poison arrow frogs and crocodiles, was overwhelmingly hot and led to a quick exit to the ice-cream kiosk.

In recent years the zoo has developed a much more environmentally friendly approach and has specialised in collections of endangered species, which are being bred for release into their natural habitat. Displays of information about the breeding programmes explain how the gene pool of each species is kept as diverse as possible by cooperation between zoos to exchange animals. This ensures that closely related animals or hybrid animals are not bred. The Black rhino, Asian lion and Asian elephant are all examples of endangered species that we observed at the zoo.

SCHOOL OF THE YEAR PRESENTATION

On Friday, 6 June at the Annual Lancashire County Rugby Dinner, (Preston Grasshoppers), Kirkham Grammar School R.U.F.C. were presented the School of the Year Trophy. This prestigious award was gained due to the success of rugby throughout the school. The 1st team won the National Tens at Sedbergh and were runners up in the Fylde Sevens. The U14 were runners-up in the Lancashire Schools Cup, while the U13 won the Lancashire Schools Cup and the King Edward VII Sevens Trophy, as well as being semi-finalists at the National Sevens in London and being finalists at the Birkenhead Sevens. No other school came close to as much all round success.

Golden Days for the Mathematics Department!

This year the school took part for the first time in the UK Mathematics Challenges. These are national competitions organised by the UK Mathematics Trust to foster interest in mathematics and provide a challenge for budding mathematicians. Aimed at the top of the ability range, successful students may be awarded bronze, silver or gold certificates although gaining any certificate is a worthy achievement since only 40% of entrants score highly enough for a certificate.

In the Spring Term we entered fifty-three of our pupils from the fourth and fifth years in the Intermediate Challenge. We were delighted that over 60% were awarded certificates and better still that 40% gained gold or silver certificates. Of the many outstanding results Joanne Box, a fourth year pupil, deserves special mention. Her mark was high enough to gain her entry into the prestigious European round of the competition in which she subsequently gained a very creditable mark. Top mark in the fifth year went to Nick Long with other gold certificate winners being Chris Calvert, Tom Clark and Emily Martin.

This term it was the turn of the second year to enter the Junior Challenge and I am pleased to report that the results were even more spectacular. Over 75% of the candidates gained an award with gold certificates going to Harry Eakins, Samuel Rowe, Joe Brown, Charlie Baker, Chris Box, Alex Spencer and Tom Newton. A further nine candidates gained silver. Both Harry Eakins and Samuel Rowe did so well that they have joined the very select band of pupils who are entering the Junior Mathematics Olympiad. Only the top noo pupils in the whole country reach this level so this is a very significant achievement. We wish them every success.






U12 X1


FRIENDLY FIXTURES
