From the Headmaster

This term has been dominated by the demolition of the Wareing buildings (photos far right) and the commencement of our new twelve classroom development. The bulldozers arrived on cue on May 16 and the first blow was struck by KGS Governor John Waite. Mr Waite has been a member of the Governing Body for over 30 years and with his great engineering experience has played a key role in the development of the school facilities since the Multi Purpose Hall was constructed in 1990. This new development sees the completion of another phase in the school's evolution with the major upgrade in the teaching space that began with the science facilities. The school now boasts a full range of exciting interactive classrooms and I hope our staff and pupils will enjoy the opportunities these will bring to their learning environment. will take occupation of six of these classrooms in September with the remaining work being completed by November. While there will be a degree of dislocation in the early weeks of next term we are confident that this will not impinge on the working of the school.

This will not be the only development over the summer as the Governors have made the much needed decision to re-surface the All Weather Pitch. We will have a new surface to match the Lawrence House Pavilion and I hope this will provide our hockey teams with a reliable platform where they can hone their skills for future success. Additionally a new All Weather Cricket Surface and nets have

been provided in conjunction with Wrea Green Cricket Club. This partnership has not only provided these excellent facilities but also wider community access which is so important for the school and its future. In another partnership, this time with the Friends of KGS, a replacement building will be provided for the Old Drama Studio - an eyesore if ever there was one! Over the summer the Friends will gain much needed storage for their many in-school activities and the school will gain a suitable venue for aerobic and weight training equipment used in the new P.E. Curriculum. The summer promises to be a busy time at school but this will mean an exciting set of new facilities in September.

Since the last Newsletter in February the school has received outcome of the the CSCI Inspection Report conducted in the Boarding House. The report reads wonderfully well with the school being adjudged excellent in every category. Great credit must go to Mr Smith and his team for this accolade. The report also reflects well on so many whole school issues such as Pastoral Care, Educational Visits, Health and Safety, Safer Recruitment and many more. The outcome provided a boost, therefore, for us all but must be seen as further evidence of the central role of boarding at KGS in helping to create the ethos which benefits our children. It is also pleasing to report that the boarders dining room and recreation facilities have been refurbished to bring them into line with other upgraded areas.

The end of each year is always marked with some farewells as colleagues leave us either in retirement or moving on to pastures new. This year has seen the retirement of Mr Brian Gornall (photo above) who has worked at KGS since 1969. Although Mr Gornall retired from full time teaching in 1997 he continued to coach the 1st XV. I could not conclude this article without paying tribute to the outstanding service "BG" has given to the school for so many years. Generations of Kirkhamians will remember him with affection and respect. In contrast to the 38 years connection just described, Mr Warren has been at KGS for just under two years. He has covered for maternity in Chemistry and then stepped in to take a part-time role in Physics. While this has been a relatively brief connection with the school I know that Mr Warren is highly regarded and thank him for his help over the two years. We



of illness or injury. We also look forward to Mrs Fyson's new arrival but will miss her next year as she takes her maternity leave.






Drapers keep an







Many of our 5th year and 6th form are well on their way to completing their awards. We recently had confirmation that Rachel and Peter Greaves Bird





Every week we meet to paint models and practice gaming. We have managed to acquire two large gaming boards and many new modelling kits that were kindly donated by Games Workshop.




YOUNG ENGINEERS

Pictured in front of a Royal Navy Sea Harrier are Peter Armstrong, Joe Douglass and Oliver Youngman at the Royal Navy Operation Enigma 2007 National Finals which were held on Thursday 29 March at HMS Sultan in Gosport.

The competition attracted entries from a large number of schools nationally of which 27 were selected for this year's National Final. This year's challenge required teams to design, build and remotely control a model amphibious vehicle that could negotiate both water and land and recover a missing 'satellite' that had fallen into hostile territory.

Teams had to make a five-minute presentation of their design to senior Royal Navy officers and were also judged on the quality of their final design, teamwork and corporate ID. Unfortunately, although the team's craft was working well at the start of the competition, it was beset by technical problems and the team was unable to complete a run of the course.







The second half of the Spring Term is dominated by the House Music Festival which this year attracted almost 500 individual entries. Auditions for the Festival took place over three days at the end of February and we are once again most grateful to Miss Dorothy Dickinson for assisting Mr Barratt in the marathon task of hearing all the auditions. From the initial 500 entrants, 25 soloists, 6 composers (a new class this year) and five vocal and instrumental ensembles were selected to go through to the Finals, which were adjudicated once more by Mr John Reeman. After giving a stunning performance of Chopin's Fantaisie Impromptu Alex Choy was declared the worthy winner, closely followed by Rose Whitehead (piano) and Jenny Patel (marimba). James Edgar and Ashley Parkinson won the Ensemble class, Ashley also winning the Composition class. The House Choir competition was won after a close battle by Kirkham House. The winners of the House Music Festival then went on to give a most enjoyable Gala Concert in the Old Hall at the end of March.





LAMDA AWARDS



The work on exhibit marked the end of a journey for many pupils, but for some the catalyst for even bigger and better things.













Scarborough 07

Twenty sixth formers and four staff returned from a very active joint Art and Geography trip that saw them travel up and down the Yorkshire coast visiting Whitby, Robin Hood's Bay, Filey, Flamborough Head and the first seaside resort Scarborough.

SmART move

Using Scarborough as a base a combined group of Lower and Upper Sixth artists sketched their way up and down the coast in preparation for their AS and A2 modules. Using various media the students produced work that was used to prepare for their exams back at school. This opportunity to work outside for three whole days was a real revelation for the U6 last year with their best work resulting from the experience. As a result, the work they created this year was even better, with the knock on effect of inspiring the L6 and generating a fantastic work ethic with students working late into the night.

There were many locations that they sketched with Robin Hood's Bay (photograph above) and the North Bay at Flamborough Head being the most popular locations. One interesting exercise was working from within the church grounds at the base of Scarborough Castle at dusk. The highlight was trying to draw with the light of iPods and mobile phones (below right photograph features timelapse photograph).

Once back at school the sketchbooks were called upon to turn their experience into a painting. This year the U6 decided to attempt large-scale pieces to depict the landscapes that they had drawn from (see the Art Department's exhibitions page). The work that the sixth formers produced was varied in style and of the highest standard with the A Level Examiner selecting a number of students work to be used as examples of top grades. The work is on display in the School Dining Hall.

This experience showed that it was indeed a smart move to hook up with the Geographers on their field trip, as working outside was truly inspirational.

As last year, the summer term saw the annual exodus to Scarborough with the Lower 6th, accompanied again by the art students. We had an excellent week; weather perfect, scenery fantastic and company very enjoyable.

Just before half term, the 4th year geographers set off on their GCSE fieldwork days. This year the 1st year is combining with the history department, for a trip to Clitheroe and Skipton. We wait with anticipation for what can be arranged for the third year in future.

A Royal Navy Sea King Mk 5 arrived at KGS recently. The Search and Rescue aircraft swooped in and landed on the 1st XV field supported by its five crew from 771 Squadron based at Royal Navy Air Station Culdrose, Cornwall. Pupils and staff were able to look around the aircraft, speak to the crew about their work and they were given a presentation on life on and above the ocean waves and recent rescue missions.

The visit to the school was part of a three day venture by The Royal Navy with the helicopter going to five schools in the North West in all. It is part of an initiative to raise awareness of The Royal Navy and especially the Fleet Air Arm which provides search and rescue cover to large sections of the UK coastline 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, typically at 15 minutes' notice.

Most recently 771 Squadron was involved in the rescue of 26 sailors from cargo ship MSC Napoli, which was grounded off the coast of Devon in January.



Head-to-head competition - involving pairs of each team to identify a secret rule linking a sequence of numbers


Relay race - two members of the team had to work quickly on a problem then pass it on to the other two members





ITALY TOUR


The U15s returned from a successful and enjoyable week's tour of Northern Italy. The Fedarazione Italiana Rugby was founded in 1928 and joined the IRB in 1987 and the 6 nations in 2000. There are some 505 clubs and 15 provinces affiliated, with about 12,000 adult players, 21,000 teenage players and 400 preteen players involved.

The number of young players is increasing steadily and all rugby is organised on a club system. The teams that the boys played against are based on an U15 age group as of 1st January. The Italian Federation play to International Rugby Board regulations, which include lifting at U15 level.

Just prior to their final session they received their tour kit sponsored by WRT and DRS shop fitters and paused long enough to have a team photo with tour manager Dr A Rollins and Mr Lee Townsend, WRT Managing Director (photo left). For the seven day tour they were based at Jesolo RUFC just outside Venice, training and playing three games against local clubs. Their fixtures were scheduled for late afternoon, as players do not finish school until mid-afternoon. The Italian rugby was a new experience for the Kirkham boys as they were playing on firm grounds and were able to include lifting in the line-outs as the Italian Federation play to International Rugby Board regulations.

They boys played Piave di Soligio in the first match winning by 20-7. Try scorers included Chris Travis, Benedict Fulford-Brown and Chris Brown, with a conversion and penalty from Jamie Roper. The second match against Tarvisium (Treviso) was a tougher encounter on a very hard pitch but tries from Benedict Fulford-Brown and James Gardiner ensured a 10-5 victory. The third match in three days saw the boys playing their best rugby of the tour against a strong Calvisano side. Tries from Chris Travis and Benedict Fulford-Brown and a conversion by Jamie Roper were not quite enough as Calvisano came back strongly in the second half. At the end of the week the boys also enjoyed a cultural day around Venice and a day at Gardaland near to Lake Garda.

Accidental Death of an Anarchist

Sixth Form Students' Satirical Success


Staging a political satire involving defenestration. police incompetence, government cover-up and political criticism is always a brave choice: staging such a play as part of an A-level Theatre Studies course seems almost foolhardy, but the Sixth Form students of Kirkham Grammar School have achieved a notable succes de scandale in their production of Dario Fo's Accidental Death of an Anarchist.

The bravura performance was created by the talented quartet of Tristan Brooke, Gordon Cheng, Oliver Fisher and Hazel Fox. Their directorial decision to rotate the roles of the play for each scene was both ambitious and effective: each had the opportunity to recraft the roles of the Maniac and the policemen in a way that reflected the obfuscation and the web of police lies that permeate the plot. A blend of the stylisation of Commedia dell'Arte and the vigour of farce, the result was a hilarious expose of the follies and deceits of officialdom - a theme that has as much relevance today in Britain as it had in Italy

The play entertained several audiences, including the whole of the Fourth Year at KGS - and the hilarity the performance elicited from these most critical of audiences is a real tribute to the actors' skill and professionalism. However, for the students concerned perhaps their most important audience was the panel of external judges from the examination board - their delight in the spectacle was shown by the award of full marks to all four students.

The play was a triumph for the directors and performers, a wonderful theatrical experience for all the audience and a testament of the strength of drama at KGS. It only remains to congratulate all four students:

Tea was at 7:30 and after the last of the dessert plates had been cleared away we were straight off to start our evening's activities. We did ice skating, karaoke,


DVD night, bungee trampolining and a disco. But not all on the same evening. Once finished it was back to our rooms for an early night ready for the early get up the next morning.




















Fairhaven Golf Day 2007

After the victory, Matthew was named by the club's academy as their player of the year.

All three players have already been recognised at international Under 18 level: Robert for England, Matthew for the Republic of Ireland and Kevin for Germany. Kevin is at present playing for Germany in the UEFA European Under 17 Tournament in Belgium.

Meanwhile, they are all also busy revising for end-of-year exams at Kirkham, and continue to play their part in school life alongside their full time colleagues. Head of Sixth Form Adrian Long, who is a lifelong Wanderers supporter, and a regular at the Reebok Stadium, is proud to be helping his club to develop the next generation of talent: "all three boys have been an absolute credit to their club and their school. They have been utterly committed to academic success in their school work despite the many pressures of their football. We are very proud of them"




Give a Triathlon a try



And treat those two impostors just the same"


