Alex Sanderson and David Giles won full international caps representing an England U.18 rugby team which achieved the 'Grand Slam'. Both have earned the honour of an England tour to Australia this summer.

K.G.S. U.13 and U.11 hockey teams contested the National Finals as Champions of the North. Our U.11




FRENCH TRIP



The Summer Term offers the club the opportunity of climbing on real rock and this was grasped enthusiastically - too enthusiastically for some who failed to appreciate the character-building delights of cold fingers and damp rock on one particularly windswept day early in the season at Anglezarke Quarry! Visits were made to the established favourite venues of Wilton Quarry, Stanworth and a new limestone crag at Farleton near Carnforth was explored and found to be an excellent crag but suffering somewhat from polish due to overuse.

Those who climbed this term were the usual mix of experienced climbers (three of whom can now competently lead climbs) and those completely new to the sport such as David Darroch who has made a promising start.

The club is looking forward with great anticipation to the construction of a climbing wall in the Multi-Purpose Hall. Sunday 22nd June saw the second sponsored "Yomp" along the Lancaster Canal to raise funds for this project and the club is very grateful for the support of the C.C.F. and especially to Flt. Lt. Taylor for organising the Yomp once again.

K.G. ORNITHOLOGISTS

A small party of ornithologists enjoyed a week's bird watching on the Balearic Island of Mallorca during the Easter Vacation.

As the party arrived at the hotel in Cala San Vicente, members were greeted by a scops owl and this presaged an exciting trip. The geology and climate of the island revealed stark contrasts with towering mountains and cliffs, vast wetlands and citrus groves, shivering cold and simmering heat. On three occasions the party rose before dawn to visit the Albufera Marsh (the fourth largest in the Mediterranean) where there were some exotic wetland species including the purple gallinule (an enormous bright-blue moor hen), great white egret, night heron and numerous ospreys and marsh harriers. Elsewhere they encountered obscure larks, buntings, warblers and terns which were short-toed, moustached, spectacled, fantailed or whiskered and even a rare swallow which was red-rumped! For many the birds of prey were the most spectacular with stunning sightings of peregrines, booted eagles and local specialities like the Eleanor's falcon and vultures (griffon, black and Egyptian).

This was an exhilarating expedition which the party enjoyed, despite being deprived of confectionery, junk food, pulp TV, computer games, swimming and sunbathing. A staggering 113 species were seen and all were convinced that a return visit to Southern Europe was essential.

On 7th May the ornithologists visited Riggindale and once again the party was blessed with superb sunshine. The walk from the head of Haweswater was sublime with pristine views of goosander and a resplendent male redstart. While waiting for the golden eagles to change over on the eyrie, a vagrant red kite was spotted and then the party was entertained by a spectacular aerial display as the male eagle chased and harried, first a peregrine and then a flock of ravens.

Later, in the hanging oak woods of Mardale, there were clear views of pied flycatcher and wood warbler whilst the afternoon found Leighton Moss full of black terns in summer plumage, booming bitterns, a pair of bearded reedlings nesting right beside a hide and three impressive red deer stags wallowing in shallows. A tremendous 69 species were seen in what must be the most unlikely combination of bird watching habitats. Mr Clark would like to thank a patient and tireless party!

COMBINED CADET FORCE

The success of the School 1st XV squad last term in the Daily Mail Rugby Cup caused the postponement of the Inter-House senior rugby competition. The Summer Term, therefore, started uncharacteristically with this postponed event. The Inter-House Athletics Championships were enhanced this year by the presence of Olympian Kris Akabusi and the production team of 'Record Breakers' who filmed in school all day. Kris Akabusi was kind enough to open the sports in racey style and present two special 'Record Breakers' prizes to the outstanding male and and female performances of the day. Two school records were broken by Amy Wareing, who smashed the Intermediate Girls Discus record by a full three metres with a throw of 26.44 metres, and by Sheree Halliwell who convincingly beat the Senior Girls' long jump record with a distance of 4.94 metres.

The U14's have come closer to victory this season than ever before.

The U15's have enjoyed very good victories over Queen Mary and Lytham, and were very unfortunate to lose by one point to Arnold.

The U12's have had a super start defeating Queen Mary and Lytham.

The girls have worked very hard this term and have been fortunate to experience a breadth of

first class coaching. Sid Sampey has worked superbly with P.E. staff and in addition to his regular top quality training sessions he has also run specialist high jump, discus, javelin and shot coaching sessions. We have also enjoyed the expert coaching of Mr Graham Knight, the Great Britain National Hurdles Event Coach. Our team hurdlers benefited greatly from his two and a half hour coaching clinic. In addition to this Mr Bruce Craven, ex Great Britain javelin thrower has also run a javelin coaching clinic.

We mixed the athletics groups this summer for the first time - what a great success it has been! The girls and boys have worked superbly together, encouraging, assisting and at times competing against each other. The coaching staff have certainly been fully utilised this term and both the athletes and non-athletes have thoroughly enjoyed it.

No less than twenty two girls have achieved personal bests!

TECHNOLOGY

Four fourth year pupils, Lester Short, Michael Strickland, Alistair Kipling and Samuel Wright recently undertook a project under the Manufacturing by Design Initiative sponsored by British Aerospace and the CBI. Their brief was to design and manufacture a model of a nose wheel undercarriage for an aircraft and to present the design at the Northern celebration at Warton Aerodrome. The team was selected to re-present their project at the National celebration at Rover in Warwick during the first week of the summer holidays.

The department has recently taken delivery of the first of a new batch of computers to increase the computer aided engineering capability. One of these machines is equipped with video conferencing facilities which allows the department to link with other schools and to share programs, ideas and teachers!

British Aerospace have assisted the School through their JETS (Joining Employees To Schools) scheme. Old Kirkhamians have helped with project work on a regular basis, as well as acting as project managers for the British Aerospace/Kirkham Grammar School work experience exchanges.

A small group of Sixth Form students studying physics and design and technology were invited to attend the British Aerospace Loughborough University Systems
Department Open Day. They were taken from Warton to Loughborough, and had the chance to see the British Aerospace sponsored department and academic courses in action. Workshops and lectures were held throughout the day to promote not only the Systems Department, but the importance of the British engineering industry and its future role to the success of the country.

CHARITIES

Three main charities have been supported this term. The British Heart Foundation, Christian Aid and the Kirkham Friends of Chernobyl. Collections were taken before half-term to coincide with Christian Aid Week and a total of £150 was raised. After half-term, our fund raising concentrated on the visit of the children from Chernobyl and our guest speaker in assembly gave us a clear account of the background to the disaster and of the appalling consequences of the tragedy. A non-uniform day was held to sponsor one of the children and the whole group of Russian children were taken to Camelot Theme Park for the day, accompanied by a group of helpful and reliable fourth formers.
