HEADMASTER'S LETTER TO PARENTS






A SUMMER OF SUCCESS AT K.G.S.

The School has been fortunate to enjoy some remarkable individual and team successes this summer and I would like to thank all our staff and pupils who have worked so hard to achieve them. All the following achievements are 'firsts' for the school and, taken together, they constitute a truly outstanding few months in the history of KGS.

A full inspection at the beginning of the term confirmed the progress the school is making. We could scarcely have expected a more encouraging report overall and it was particularly good to hear the inspection team confirm that the school is fulfilling the potential of its pupils, in many

cases well beyond, and going a long way towards realising its aims. There was high praise for the quality of teaching; the breadth and success of extra-curricular activities and the ethos and corporate life of the school.

The Junior School's success in achieving the Investors in People Award at its first attempt reflects a great deal of hard work and detailed preparation, much to the credit of our new Headmistress, Mrs Lesley Taylor, and the staff of the Junior School. Nor would we have achieved this without the experienced guidance and tireless efforts of Governor, Mr Michael Hudson, to whom we are all very grateful indeed.

The completion of the Technology Centre build represents another of this term's triumphs. As I write, equipment is being installed and we can look forward with confidence to gaining International recognition from British Aerospace for this magnificent new facility, the likes of which I have never before seen in a school.

We were all delighted to hear of Pat Sanderson's selection for the two England rugby test matches against New Zealand, a remarkable achievement for a young man of 20 years of age who becomes the first Old Kirkhamian ever to have won an international cap in the sport of rugby at senior level. Alex Sanderson, meanwhile, captained

the England Schools' U18 team to victory in the Five Nations' Schools' Championship, making this a rugby season the Sanderson family and the school will never forget. Alex thus became the first KGS pupil ever to captain his country.

Also for the first time the school has an Arkwright Engineering Scholar. Michael Strickland's achievement in receiving this prestigious award is both a personal triumph for him and also a timely and important boost for the school's new status as an international centre of excellence for technology. Arkwright Scholarships are recognised as among the most competitive and difficult awards to obtain.

Katy Parker's selection to represent England in the European Youth Table Tennis Championships in Italy'is further confirmation of her prodigious talent and we wish her every success.

The all-round talent of Katie Mellor proved too strong for the opposition in the Police/EDS Schools' Challenge. Twenty two schools entered this competition, which resembles the Krypton Factor. Katie successfully negotiated initiative tests, physical tests and general knowledge questions, to reach the final and subsequently emerged as the clear winner of a contest which brings the most talented pupils of the area together. It is a very tough competition to win and Katie deserves all our congratulations.

Our boys' athletics teams capped a marvellous summer season when they swept the board in the Fylde Coast Schools' Athletics Championships, winning all four age groups; a remarkable feat against seventeen other schools, most of whom have many more boys to choose from. Benefiting from the coaching of Mr Syl Sampey and the enthusiastic support of Mr Richard Taylor, our boys once more showed the will to win which makes KGS teams so difficult to beat in any event.




Katie Mellor, winner of the Police/EDS Schools' Challeng

An enjoyable time was had by all. The weather was kind - except on the river day when everyone was drenched and an early finish was forced. Much thanks must go to the Geography Department for their time and organisation of this annual but essential event which is an integral part of the modular advanced level Geography course.


CLUBS & ACTIVITIES

K.G. ORNITHOLOGISTS

Summer Term 1998 had to be one of the most exciting for the ornithologists. They began with a now routine trip to Riggindale for the only English eagles. The eagles were spectacular, as was the weather, (although their eggs later failed to hatch) and the group had good views of the male in flight and perching. Pied flycatchers were closely observed in Mardale but also most unexpected was the feeding osprey at Leighton Moss.

Half term brought our annual expedition to Orkney where K.G. Ornithologists were joined by bird watchers from King Edward's School, Bath. The trip began well with their best bittern at Leighton Moss and despite cold weather in Orkney, the sun shone as the group visited the world-famous archaeological sites of Skara Brae, the Ring of Brodgar and the Tomb of the Eagles. They got close to special birds like hen harriers, fulmars, puffins and great skuas which dive-bombed the party on Hoy.

Those capable of a six hour sea voyage visited remote Papa Westray to sing to inquisitive seals and see the spot where Britain's last Great Auk was shot. A return via Speyside enabled them to pick up local species like crossbill and crested tit and to visit the famous Osprey eyrie at Loch Garten. Amazingly the club exceeded its expedition record of 113 species (in Mallorca last year) with 119!




K.G. Ornithologists on their annual expedition to Orkney

It was good to see many of them appreciating the greater subtleties presented by the real climbing which the summer term allows, ie climbing on natural rock rather than on synthetic climbing walls.

RAF EASTER CAMP RAF LAARBRUCH, GERMANY

Ten Cadets and two members of staff spent part of the Easter break at RAF Laarbruch in Germany on the Annual CCF (RAF) Camp.

RAF Laarbruch is situated on the Dutch/German border near the small town of Wesse and is about 75 km north west of Cologne. This is a large operational base which is home to two Harrier ground attack squadrons (3 Sqn and 4 Sqn), a rapier missile, Squadron (26 Squadron RAF Regiment) and an RAF Regiment Field Squadron (1 Squadron RAF Regiment) along with numerous other supporting personnel.

The busy week at the base involved visits to various sections, including bomb disposal, the fire section, police dog section and the operating hangars of the flying squadrons, where the cadets could speak with the pilots and ground crew and have a close look at the aircraft. The cadets also had the opportunity to fire weapons on the range, use a virtual reality trainer and take part in a night exercise in the depths of the German forests! The formal training ended with flying and work experience at various sites around the base.

It was not all work, however, with a night out swimming at Holland's Centre Park, a shopping trip to Cologne, a bowling night and a trip to Arnhem, the airborne museum at Oosterbeck and a visit to the Riechswald War Cemetery. The visit to Arnhem proved to be a very moving and awe-inspiring experience.

With the current financial constraints on all three services, it was very much a feather in the cap that the cadets at Kirkham Grammar School were selected for this camp. Most RAF contingents receive an average of one overseas place every two to three years. To be given the opportunity to take ten cadets was a tremendous accolade for all the work the RAF Cadets have undertaken over the past two years.

The Captain and Vice Captain of School, Emily Ross and David Rees, were at the forefront of all military plans and manoeuvres. Timothy Chadwick and Paul Baer were commended by the Camp Commandant for all-round commitment and participation.

SPORT

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

The girls have had their most successful season to date. Out of seven athletic matches contested so far this season, the following results have been achieved: U12 have won 4 out of 7, U13 have won 4 out of 7, U14 have won 7 out of 7, U15 have won 3 out of 7

This year we entered our Junior and Inter Girls in the TSB National Athletics Competition. In the county round at Stanley Park on May 18th both teams did very well indeed and scored sufficient points to qualify for the regional finals. The junior girls competed at Salt Ayre track, Lancaster but unfortunately did not perform to their best on the day and finished sixth. The inter girls competed at Robin Park track, Wigan and performed superbly. The girls finished in second place just 15

points behind the wirejers. An excellent achievement and one which will certainly be built on next year.

In the Lancashire Women's Athletics event Danielle Hanley and Jane Meloy were first and second respectively in their events. The annual Fylde Coast (hampionships at Stanley Park the girls competed very well indeed. Forty-nine girls represented in school and there were personal bests on the day. Sixteen schools competed in the championships and the results were as follows:-

KGS U12 - 2nd KGS U13 - 8th KGS U14 - 1st KGS U15 - 7th

The third year have won this trophy for three consecutive years, another first in the history of the school. Overall, the girls have had a most valuable, enjoyable and rewarding athletics season and they have been a credit to their school.


VIMTO MASTERCLASS

Kirkham Grammar School was chosen to host a Vimto Masterclass on 22nd June 1998. This involved girls aged 11-14 years participating in a hurdling session which was run by Diane Allahgreen, one of England's top 100 m hurdlers (indoor European bronze medallist). Diane demonstrated her skills and passed on her knowledge, providing the girls with an insight into competition at the very top level of sport. It was a great opportunity for the girls to meet a top international competitor.

The girls were then asked to raise money, through sponsorship, to help support the England team in their preparation for the Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur this September.

Certificates were awarded to all who participated and the top three fundraisers won Nike and Vimto prizes. The girls have also entered the Masterclass Medals Competition and this has given them an opportunity to win an exclusive print, signed by the England Commonwealth Games Team. To win this they had to try to guess the total number of gold, silver and bronze medals the England team will win in Kuala Lumpur.

Diane Alahgreen enjoyed her visit to KGS so much that she accepted our invitation to Sports Day in 1999 and said that she hoped to be bringing a Commonwealth medal along with her.

SWIMMING

I am delighted to report that lower sixth former Michelle Harrison has been selected to represent the England Schools' National Swimming Team in the eleventh World School Games to be held in Shanghai, China from 12th - 19th October 1998. Michelle has been chosen to swim the 400 m freestyle, one of her strongest events. We congratulate her on achieving selection for her country again for such a prestigious swimming event and wish her every success.

BOYS' ATHLETICS

Kirkham boys have enjoyed an outstanding athletics season with every year group making a significant contribution. At the beginning of the term the 5th and 6th year teams finished close runners-up to Lancaster R.G.S. in their annual four-schools competition at Lancaster.

The first year team has developed in confidence and, after a comprehensive victory over King Edward VII, went on to greater things by winning the U13 trophy in the Fylde Coast Championships! Outstanding this year has been James Houseman who has remained unbeaten over 100m, 200m and long jump. There have been major contributions from John Townsend and Stuart Blackburn and the unbeaten combination of Marcus Plowright and Terry Ogden in both the 800m and 1500m has been inspirational.

The second year has the strongest in depth squad and, having won the prestigious seven-schools tournament at Lancaster R.G.S. at the start of the season, they have swept all opposition aside, culminating in a decisive victory at the Fylde Coast Championships. While George Leeming has been a dominant figure in both track and field, significant contributions have come from the likes of Tom Hookey, Dan Housemen and John Bowden.

If a prize could be given for the best late developers it should surely go to the 4th year squad. There were signs at the end of last year that they were getting together as a team and the realisation has come this year. Following wins over King Edward's and Arnold they went to the Fylde Coast Championships and achieved a magnificent result by winning their trophy. This was team effort at its very best and it would be unfair to single out individuals. The collective achievement of winning all lour age groups was the first of its kind since the championships began in 1931.

Individually the school provided ten Fylde Coast Champions, ten boys selected to compete in the Lancashire Schools and two boys, Gareth Rees and George Leeming selected to compete for Lancashire in the English Schools' Championships in July.

Much credit should go to Mr Trenhaile for his invaluable input into the coaching of the third year boys and to Mr Taylor for his enthusiasm and encouragement of all the boys, both in practice and competition, and I am sure that all would agree that this season's outstanding results could not have been accomplished without the expertise, enthusiasm and commitment of our national athletics coach, Mr Syl Sampey.

GIRLS' TENNIS

Girls' tennis has been of an exceptionally high standard this season. The results have been better than ever experienced at KGS before and the standard of tennis has been a delight to watch. Despite the appalling weather conditions experienced throughout the term, the girls thoroughly enjoyed some very tough encounters, with their sheer determination to win always providing them with the cutting edge.

The Lancashire U13 and U15 tournaments, which were held at KGS this season, brought much success. Lauren Ainge won the U13 singles Plate competition, Philippa Leeming and Emma Johnson won the U15 doubles Plate competition and Jane Meloy and Ruth Burns played some excellent tennis to become the runners up in the U15 doubles tournament.

League games have also been very successful. The U13 team, consisting of Lauren Ainge, Katy Parker, Katie Gough and Hannah Spacey, narrowly missed out on qualifying for the Lancashire League semi-finals by just one game. They played 3 matches, convincingly winning two 7-1 and drawing one 4 and a half to 4 and a half. The U15 team, consisting of Philippa Leeming, Emma Johnson, Ruth Burns and Jane Meloy, convincingly made it to the finals of the Lancashire League Competition which will be played on Tuesday 30th June.

The U14 Lancashire Cup team, consisting of Jane Meloy, Ellie Cairns, Rosemary Ward and Rachel Sissons, played well to make it to the second round of the competition which is to be played on Thursday 2nd July.

U13, U14, U15 and senior teams have played 4 friendly matches experiencing yet more success, and we wish the U12 team luck in its first match to be played on Friday 26th June.

The girls have again thoroughly enjoyed their breakfast tennis sessions with David Shaw (tennis professional). These have proved to be a valuable and productive experience for all involved.

BOYS' TENNIS

This has been the most successful tennis season for several years. In the local leagues the U15 team came runners-up to a strong Lytham St Annes side, whilst the U13 team easily defeated all opposition and progressed to the semi-final of the Lancashire Schools' Competition where they narrowly lost to Broughton High School.

In the U13 Singles Competition, Kirkham was by far the most successful school, with three of our pupils, Gavin Phillips, Adam Tuck and Liam Hanley, reaching the quarter-finals and Jack Ward reaching the semi-final where he lost to the eventual winner. In the Plate event, our boys were again successful, with Mark Gregg and James Wigglesworth losing in the semi-finals and James Leeming losing the final in a very close, tense match after having match points himself. It has, however, been a most rewarding season and the boys deserve our congratulations.

CRICKET

The weather has had the last laugh this season with so many matches being cancelled without a ball being bowled.

The 1st XI looked a promising side but has suffered with not being able to play and develop. At the time of writing, four matches of the six organised have been lost to the weather. The two completed matches have seen a narrow defeat, off the last ball, by Hutton and a more comprehensive one, with a weakened side, by Batley Grammar School. A victory over King Edward's, Lytham by 7 wickets deservedly redressed the balance, the highlights of the game being an allround performance of 3 for 12 and 39 by Ben Godfrey and 90 not out from skipper Phil Watkinson.

The junior sides have fared little better, but individuals have emerged and shown promise. Paul Ashton and Adam Parker are two excellent prospects who have been blooded in the 1st eleven at a very early ages.

The U12's have made real progress under Mr Painter's committed leadership and they are developing into a very competitive side.

INTER HOUSE EVENTS

In a short term, with many disruptions, the first Inter-House event was the Senior Cricket semi-final between Kirkham and Preston, the latter house winning by 73 runs. Three days later School defeated Fylde in the second semi-final and eventually went on to beat Preston in the final.

The Senior Tennis matches found mainly mixed boys/girls teams representing the House of Kirkham and produced a final of Kirkham against School, the latter once again the eventual winners. School House had certainly signalled their intent to recapture the Whitby Cup.

The results of the Junior Tennis were Kirkham 1st, School 2nd, Fylde and Preston joint 3rd. The results of the Intermediate House Tennis were Fylde 1st, Preston 2nd with School and Kirkham sharing third place.

The Junior Cricket event has so far produced one finalist, with School defeating Fylde, but torrential rain caused the Kirkham v Preston semifinal to be postponed. The final is on the morning of July 8th when, at the same time, the Junior Girls' Rounders will be played in a knockout competition.

The Junior Academic Trophy final placings will be announced at the final School Assembly on July 10th. Suffice to say that the placings throughout the last two terms have remained unchanged, ie. 1st Kirkham, 2nd School, 3rd Fylde and 4th Preston. However, it would seem at the moment that School House, for the 2nd time in its history, is favourite to wrest the Whitby Trophy for Champion House from Preston, who has had a hat trick of wins, 1994-97.

At another academic year-end it is always fitting to thank not only the House Competitors, organisers and attached teaching staff, but also the many others who help, beyond the call of duty to referee, umpire and in any way supervise such a long and enjoyable programme of Inter-House events.

SPORTS DAY 1998

The Annual Sports Day took place on Wednesday 13th May and was, once again, a great success. The Guest of Honour was Mr Graham Knight, National Technical Director Sprints, Relays and Hurdles. The weather was glorious, the competitors were eager to perform and the spectators supported superbly throughout the afternoon. The results of most events were very close indeed. Within the competition two records were broken; Victoria Peters - Inter Girls Long Jump 4m 70 and Victoria Wilson Inter Girls Javelin 23.75 m.

Graham Knight was very impressed, stressing how marvellous it was to be a

part of such a big school athletics event, especially at a time when sadly the "School Annual Sports Day" has come to an end in many schools. The trees will have a bench under them, creating an attractive memorial garden which will stand as a lasting reminder of the happiness these three fine young people brought to their school.

SCHOOL CHARITABLE WORK

A busy term has seen much activity. On returning after Easter our attentions turned to Christian Aid and it was good to see that a number of our older pupils and staff volunteered to take part in the door-to-door collection.

Later in May we continued our efforts to raise money for the Kirkham Friends of the Children of Chernobyl. The school sponsors one of the children, Viktor Kurgozov. Victor's mother died when he was six months old and his father left him with his grandmother on the day of his mother's funeral and has had no contact since. He lives with his grandmother, who is in her mid-

seventies, and his fifteen year old cousin on the outskirts of Mogilev in very poor conditions in a wooden hut. They have to live on £5.50 a week when the cost of living is equivalent to our country except for toiletries and footwear which are more expensive.

This year is the 12th anniversary of the accident which occurred in the nuclear power plant and the children come to visit this country for a month to relieve the suffering caused by the effects of the radiation. During their stay a group of second and fifth year pupils from KGS accompanied the children on a trip to Camelot and staff arranged a collection of toiletries and medical supplies for the group to take home with them.

Other efforts have seen a group of third year girls arrange a sponsored silence at the end of term. They were so moved by an assembly given by Mr Sayer about the inequalities in the world that they arranged this project themselves. Congratulations to them all for their ingenuity.

We also wish one of our sixth form pupils well for her work during the summer holidays. Gwennie Jenkins is about to depart for Rumania to help with work being carried out in orphanages there. It is wonderful that she is prepared to devote her time and energy to such a cause. Again, a collection was organised for clothing and toys for Gwennie to take with her for the children in Rumania.

Other activities have seen our pupils involved in a sponsored aerobics session to raise money for the Kidney Foundation, whilst the weekly community service programme with various projects in the local area continues to be well supported by our sixth formers.
