

GIRLS ON TOP FORM




KGS U18 team press forward in their resounding defeat of Millfield 5 - 0







This term saw the culmination of all the hard work done as part of the 'National Fr in Schools' competition. The rules state that CO2 powered racing cars are designed using 3D design software, in our case Pro/Desktop, and that these designs are then manufactured by computer aided methods. We had two teams entered this year in two age groups: a second year team called 'Oblivion' (William Bruton, Cathryn Critchley, Phillip Hingley and Paul Taylor) and a fourth year team, called 'The knights who say "NP", (Oliver Boardman, Oscar Clarke, Michael Le Breton, James Leckey, Richard Newton and Paul Peters).

As well as designing and manufacturing their cars, the teams also had to produce a portfolio of design work, a PowerPoint presentation delivered to a distinguished panel of judges and they needed the car to be fast and have a nominated starter with lightening reactions. A tall order!

During the day both cars were unbeaten in all their races. Both teams clocked up nearly identical times, and an average speed over 25m of 7mph.

Oblivion won the key stage 3 class outright and are the NW Champions. The knights who say "NI", finished 3rd overall and now qualify for the National Pinals at the BETT Exhibition in Olympia, London. We look forward to seeing how they get on against the cream of CO2 car designers from across the UK and Ireland. Watch this spacel

Rachel Horton, an Arkwright Scholar for 2001 received her award at the Royal Aeronautical Society in London. The prestigious award ceremony, attended by educationalists and industrialists, is the highlight of the Arkwright scholar's initial year. She now has £500 to spend over 2 years on technology based equipment or software to enhance her studies.

Mr Hill has been extremely busy this term designing and building the set for the school play 'The Shadow of a Gunman'. The 1920's style set tested Mr Hill to the limit, but both his nerves and the walls of the set stayed in place throughout the performances! The quality of the set added to the overall ambience of the play. He also assisted in the audio special effects. This aspect of design and technology allows everyone to see another side of the department. The school play produces almost as much frenzied activity as the run up to the examinations and the completion of project work.

SIXTH FORM

The Upper Sixth have been busy, as usual in the Autumn, completing their UCAS forms for university application.

All KGS forms are now submitted by the EAS electronic system; applicants have noted the incredibly rapid speed of response from universities in many cases. Several students have attracted offers for the most competitive courses before most of the country has even applied.

We have noted a tendency towards increasingly innovative selection procedures by some universities; candidates are in some cases having to submit E-mail answers to an on-line "interview", and others are being required to produce spoken presentations to selectors. It all keeps us on our toes!

RECORD BREAKING EXAMINATION RESULTS

Congratulations to last years Fifth and Upper Sixth students on achieving some of the school's best ever examination results.

At GCSE a pass rate of 90% (compared with the national average of 57%) was a sound return, though not quite our best. The percentage of top grades. A'/A, was, however, a record at 41% (compared with the national average of 16%), showing again how well the school's academic high flyers achieve. Significantly, the core subjects of English and Mathematics achieved pass rates of 94% and 98% respectively.

Meanwhile, our Upper Sixth Formers produced a record pass rate of 92.4% and a record equalling 42% of passes at grades A/B. It was good to see the great majority of our Sixth Formers entering the universities of their first choice and special congratulations go the School Vice Captain, Emma Johnson, who won a place at Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge reading Medicine. The A-Level Science results were outstanding and amongst the best in the country. All 52 candidates in Biology, Chemistry and Physics passed and 72% of all the Science grades awarded were A/B: a stunning achievement for our Science Faculty.

Overall, this year's examination results, when accurately reported, reflect well the growing academic status of the school.

COMBINED CAD FORCE

Field Day was an interesting one for KGS in an experimental format. On account of the continuing constraints of the Foot & Mouth Regulations, all Cadets of both Sections held a joint field day at a single venue for the first time.

Some hardy souls did their over night expedition training before the field day proper and survived in good order and spirits after a dreadfully wet night under canvas. Congratulations to both staff and students for their fortitude. The major event of the "mega - new looking, all singing, all dancing" field day was the fact that the CO slipped on a grassy slope and proceeded to spend the next six weeks limping about school, playing for the sympathy vote! Most Cadets seemed to enjoy getting wet and muddy at Waddecar and, with refinement and more care on grassy slopes, the CO thinks that there is a possibility that the joint field day could become a fixture in the CCF training programme.

The Inspection of the CCF by Group Captain Michael Cross, Chief of Staff at HQ Air Cadets went well. Training was well led by the Cadet NCO's and the Group Captain spoke to a great many of our Cadets on an individual basis. They seemingly gave a good account of themselves, because he wrote a very complimentary letter to School about his day. We await his formal report with interest.

We have been fortunate to receive a large number of gliding places over the term, including two full gliding scholarships, which will be attended by Cpl Steven Watkins and Cpl Jonathan Giddings early in the New Year. Planning is also underway for the next field day which will see all the junior cadets take to the skies at RAF Woodvale near Southport.

D of E training is firmly established and underway and the next major phase of it will take place as part of the Adventure Training Camp at Easter in the Lake District.



'Hamlet', with Sam West in the title role, and yes Mrs Poole did keep telling us that Mr West had taken her niece out to dinner only this summer, was a marathon four and a half hour, uncut version! The matinee of 'Love In A Wood' was very engaging as we were lucky enough to have front row seats and were able to see the fabulous costumes at close hand. The cast of `The Shadow of a Gunman` nearly drove their families mad in trying to perfect their Irish accents, but it was well worth it! This was yet another terrific school production, set in the Old Hall and using a box set designed by Mr Hill, which had the audience believing that they were the fourth wall of a tenement room in 1920's Dublin. Mr Chris Spacey gave us his invaluable assistance in getting materials and even made two beds for us. The lighting, designed by Mrs Walker and Cheryl Bridges provided us with some sinister shadow effects and convinced us of the grubbiness and seediness of tenement life, as did the very authentic costumes, which included toe grinding wooden clogs. Andrew Gregson and Sam Bensky were superb as the comic duo at the heart of the play; Gregson postured as a would-be poet and gunman with effortless ease, while the audience warmed to Bensky's slapstick and stuttering comedy.

Rebecca Ridley was lovely as the charming Minnie Powell, the heroine of the piece. Members of the audience on the opening night were treated to Minnie's untimely death a little too prematurely and Mrs Poole, armed with Mr Sayer's ferocious .38 starting pistol shot Minnie posthumously to great amusement all round.

Another great comedy duo was provided by the pairing of Travis Peters as the anxious Mr Gallogher, with Dayna Perfetti as the non stop Mrs Henderson. Few of us will ever forget seeing Dayna leaping around in the Drama Studio in her 'fat suit' or Travis' vigorous 'ves' and 'no' as Mrs Henderson constantly interrupted him. Janyll Rawlins was a very imperious and nasty Landlady in her Victorian mourning costume and provided some of the serious threat in the play, as did Marcus Plowright with a very physical performance of a Black and Tans soldier. 

It was a popular show full of the charm of the Irish brogue and humour and the cast are looking forward, so they tell the Director, to the next show.




Freddie Buxton and Madeleine Eaves being presented by the Headmaster with The Roy Russell Prize for Junior Drama





and trainers from KGS' sixth form, have prepared four fine competitors.


