THE SHOW GOES ON

How the term has flown by! It hardly seems yesterday that I first sat in the office before taking my first assembly. While it has been something of a

whirlwind it has been a fascinating period, getting to know the staff, pupils and parents. I could not yet boast that I know all in the school community but I must pass on my thanks to all I have met for the warmth of their welcome.

Inevitably the term has been a very busy one for all of us and once again the school is fortunate to benefit from our new developments. The Girls' Changing Rooms have proved an excellent facility and represent Phase I of our Appeal Development. Thanks must go to all those who have so generously donated to this project and I can assure all that the girls greatly appreciate the improvements.

The refurbished Staff Common Room has provided a wonderful venue for our teachers, both to enjoy their breaks and to use for their preparation and marking. It has been a rather different experience for me in not being involved teaching a full timetable but I have enjoyed my contact with the first years and re-investigating Roman times. Hopefully this will prevent me ever losing sight of the practicalities involved in teaching.

There have been many exciting moments to report. I was taken aback to receive a visitation from an old pupil, not unusual in itself but something of a shock when his visit was by helicopter on the front lawn! Our Annual Speech Day proved a thoroughly enjoyable experience and it was a delight to see all the school gathered together and to listen to the choirs perform

so well. Watching so many pupils represent the school on a Saturday has also been very rewarding as has talking to so many parents on the touchline.

My thanks must go to all the parents who have kindly responded to my enquiries about the school. I have learnt a great deal about their perceptions and it has clearly emphasised how strong is the "family ethos". I have experienced the warmth of the atmosphere as a newcomer myself and this is

something that all of us at school must protect, for it is such an important component in providing a happy learning environment.

With the emphasis on "learning" I am pleased to report that the examination results of 2002 once again broke previous records. Our A-level students

achieved a near-100% pass rate with A/B grades awarded to 43% of entries. At GCSE some 97% of pupils achieved five or more 'passes' at grades A-

C with 39% of these grades at A/A*. In particular, the core subject areas of English and Mathematics produced pass rates of 99%, a most impressive record.

Four of our pupils have gone on to Oxbridge with Sian Hickson reading English at Pembroke College, Oxford; Phillip Pearce reading Medicine at Selwyn College, Oxford, Amrita Sidhu reading Mathematics and Computer Science at St Anne's College, Oxford and Rachel Sissons reading Medicine at Downing College, Cambridge.

It is important that we do not sit on our laurels, however, so members of the Fifth Year and Upper Sixth beware! Your task now is to better that!



In so many cases, results which may not win prizes, make headlines or push a school up the League Tables, represent a personal triumph for a particular student, and it is a great shame that the efforts of so many at KGS, and elsewhere were overshadowed by media-driven "scandals" about results.

Upper Sixth student Felicity Long was honoured to meet the Queen on the occasion of Her Majesty's visit to Preston on August 5th. Felicity, one of our Senior Prefects, was asked to represent the School at the Reception in the Guildhall, which marked the end of the Royal visit to the new city. As her guest, Felicity took her father, Mr Adrian Long, who is, of course, Head of Sixth Form at KGS.

During the Queen's progress through the thousand invited guests, Felicity was selected by one of the Royal officials to step forward and meet Her Majesty, and she and her father found themselves in deep conversation with the Queen about Kirkham, and its relationship with its twin towns in France and Germany: Felicity is Secretary of Kirkham's Twinning Association, the youngest ever holder of this post.

The end of this term marks the end of an era at Kirkham Grammar School with the departure of Mr John Catterall, our Director of Music. 
Sophie Cairns of our present Lower Sixth has just been awarded her Queen Scout Award, which is equivalent to the Gold Duke of Edinburgh. For this she had to complete five main clauses: Community Training, Community Involvement, Leadership, Interest and Pursuit and Exploration which is made up of training, an expedition and then a presentation of the expedition. She has done very well finishing the award at only sixteen years of age as most people who gain the award are over eighteen. 2002 GCSE Results

Last year's Fifth Formers are to be congratulated on gaining an excellent set of GCSE Results. The pass rate this year was 93% and all but three of our candidates obtained five or more passes at grades A* to C. Particularly impressive was the fact that out of nearly 900 subject entries 74% of the grades awarded were either A*, A or B; a record for the school.

In the core subjects of English and Mathematics 99% of candidates passed and the pass rate was 100% in no less than six subjects. It was particularly pleasing to see a very successful set of results in the newly reintroduced subject of Latin.

As usual, there were some outstanding individual performances and sixteen of our pupils obtained at least eight A*/A grades. Special mention must be made of Lorna Sissons who gained A* grades in all of her nine subjects.

Six months after the launch of the Development Appeal 2002 to our parents and alumni, the first phase of the planned development has been built and is already in use. The pupils have witnessed the on-going construction, during the summer term, which has filled in the gap between the old gym and the art room and overlooks the rugby pitch, a first floor edifice built entirely in keeping with the adjacent building. The girls' changing rooms, the first of three important projects covered by the Appeal, have been built and, much to the delight of our pupils, have been in full swing since the beginning of the term.

The Development Office continues its quest of raising funds for the next vital development which will be the new classroom accommodation. The concept can be seen in the Appeal brochure, showing an artist's impression of the final building. The Governors plan to phase the building programme and, providing that the necessary funds have been raised, intend to commence the building work in 12 to 18 months' time.

This is an exciting time in the history of the School with ever-continuing development and improvement, that perpetuate the tradition of providing state of the art facilities for today's technologically and scientifically based curriculum.








SARAH SHORROCK'S NATIONAL DRESSAGE CHAMPIONSHIPS

TECHNOLOGY

The Technology
Department has once again been a hive of creative activity.
New project topics are developed during this time, whilst the sentor pupils are beginning to get to grips with the manufacture of the projects they have lived with for the last couple of terms



The CO2 car project nears its completion for the 2002 season. At the time of writing, the regional finals have yet to take place, but we are all confident that the four members of Oblivion' will perform well and do their school and themselves proud. They have worked very hard over the last few months to get to this stage.

Mr. Hill is once again turning bald as he pulls his hair out at the roots trying to construct what seems like a full size railway tunnel! The stage has been converted into a building site whilst the turnel is built. This project is stretching his creativity to the limit, but he is managing to keep his head above water... just.

All members of the Design and Technology Department have recently undergone training in basic electronics. This will keep the staff at the cutting edge of technological development and the benefits of the training will be passed onto the pupils. Further training is planned for the New Year when the topics covered will be PIC programmable Interface Controllers.

We have been host to one visit this term so far. Two members of the Malaysian Ministry of Defence visited Kirkham Grammar School as part of a three-week look into the various activities and initiatives promoted by BAE SYSTEMS. This included industrial, educational and community projects.

Mr S. Crowther's visit to Brunei Darussalam

On 20th October, Steve Crowther and three other trainers from within the BAE SYSTEMS International School's Network, departed for Brunei Darussalam, to run training courses for teachers and curriculum developers, in the field of technology. Four training courses were offered. Primary Design and Technology, Secondary Design and Technology, Interactive Whiteboard and the course operated by Steve, Computer Aided Design and Manufacture.

The training courses were the first stages in developing partnerships between BAE SYSTEMS and the Brunei Darussalam Education Department, as well as partnerships between the International Schools on a global scale.

Steve's training involved 20 delegates from four schools as well as a curriculum development ministers from the Brunei Darussalam government offices. Over the five-day training period, the delegates were introduced to, and became proficient in both 2D and 3D computer aided modelling and manufacture. Delegates had the opportunity to both design and manufacture a range of products using the purpose-built technology suite.

The culmination of the course was the launching of the Fi in Schools competition. During the final two days of training, the delegates designed, manufactured and raced CO2 car designs. The hope is to have global races between schools, and Prof. Steve Grigg announced that a team from Brunel Darussalam were to be invited to compete in the finals of the British event in Olympia, London during January 2003.

The finale of the training was a visit from the Education Minister for Brunet Dariassalam. Pehin Orang Kaya Lailu Wijaya Dato Seri Sena Haji Awang Abdul Aziz bin Begawan Pehin Udana Khatib Data Seri Paduka Awang Umar'. He toured the exhibition of delegates work and presented certificates to each successful delegate.


The event was widely promoted in the Borneo press and this included television coverage of the Fi in Schools launch by the Minister.







DRAMA

This is traditionally a busy term for the Drama Department and this term is no exception. Within two weeks of the start of term, the Fifth Form GCSE Drama group presented an evening of Drama with a 'promenade' performance in two venues, the Old Hall and the Multi Purpose Hall! The Old Hall was the setting for a performance of I was a Good Lil Girl 'til...' a powerful piece about the Suffragette movement which was very effectively conveyed with Jenni Gil as Mrs Pankhurst and fan Duncan as Mr Asquith in a cast of 15. Meanwhile in the MPH, another group were setting up 'Titanic' using the fixed seating to convey the idea of the Titanic's ruptured sides. Rostra blocks became lifeboats as Vicky Biggs and Isobel Morley took us through a music hall interpretation of this tragedy, their humourous contributions pointing up the harsh facts of this piece.

We were delighted to welcome a theatrical make up artist into school to pass on her expertise and skills to members of the fourth and fifth form GCSE groups. In total some 60 students were able to spend time with Louise Grant from 'Grimas' and to gain 'hands on experience. Louise has worked a great deal in television and was able to let us into the secrets of how that perfect black eye is achieved in Hollyoaks' or Coronation Street and Alex Dean was given 'a right shiner which had members of staff on duty at lunchtime stopping him and wondering what had been going on......Lauren Emery volunteered to be aged by about 50 years and astounded all by the transformation that she underwent. There were one or two nasty injuries too, including gunshots to the head, severed wrists and burns. Incidentally, we were delighted to be able to use these skills in a wider context, on CCF Field Day in a casualty simulation, which was frighteningly real by all accounts! On a lighter note, Louise was able to help us with the designs for the make up for 'Grimm Tales' and we had great fun trying on beards, feathers and a range of prosthetic noses while trying to create the right mood and atmosphere for both the piece and the characters. John Gladwell did tell us that his face was sore for days after the removal of an awesome beard. We learned a great deal from Louise and hope that she will be able to join us later on in the school year to share more of her expertise with the Junior classes.

This term's dramatic production was 'Grimm Tales', an adaptation of some of the best known and best loved fairy tales from Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm. Although the tales have been adapted for performance, there were no given stage directions and the great fun of this piece was the process of rehearsal through which all the movement and interpretation of the pieces were created.

There were lots of 'firsts' in this production: Juniors worked alongside the Upper Sixth for the first time; the new lighting system installed in the MPH and so generously sponsored by 'The Friends' was put through its maiden voyage by Mrs Alison Walker and the enormous stage of the MPH was given a totally new look by Mr Hill's huge steel and corrugated card structure, which became the 'world of the play'.

The interpretation of the piece was to be as far removed from the saccharine sweet idea of fairy tales as possible, with the cast dressed as 'urban warriors' inhabiting a tunnel, damp and graffitited, stuffed with junk, old washing machines and rusting bicycles. The cast created their costumes themselves and a very able group of GCSE Drama students added the finishing touches with make up which ranged from tribal markings through to full face paint for a dog and a lion! The accompanying sounds for the world of chaos and disorder which the cast created, sometimes through humour, sometimes through fear, were splendidly provided by the improvisations of Hannah Smith on organ and Martin Cropper on drums. Evan Beswick created six original electronic pieces for the interval music all of which did a great deal to convey the quirkiness of this 'grim' world. 

wonderful lighting effects for this piece with a glitter ball conveying the sparkling pebbles and torches used in blackout for the nightmarish scenes in the forest.



'The Lady and the Lion' gave Maddie Eaves and Nick Rhodes an opportunity to show off the strength of their acting partnership as a couple who lose sight of each other, largely because the boy keeps turning into different animals! With very few props, Nick was able to convey a prince, a lion and a white dove and this is a great testament to his talent. Maddie and Verity Taylor, as the Dragon Princess, shared possession of a splendid red dress which proved difficult to put on, but by this time the audience were distracted by the chocolates which interval by a beautifully choreographed piece, A Riddling Tale, which showed the dance skills of Amy Bleach, Amy Dupres and Susie Leyland.

Act Two opened with 'Aschputtel' or Cinderella as we more commonly call it, with Hannah Spacey as a very compelling Aschputtel. This was a radically different interpretation of the tale which featured Hannah arriving at the ball in a Ferrarri and departing with Prince Charming on a 'Harley Davidison' (yes she passed her test) with fabulous sound effects provided on stage by Andrew Gregson. Nicole Lee was a gentle and elegant Mother Spirit, which provided a calm contrast to Hannah's gymnastics. The Juniors returned to the stage for The Magic Table and The Donkey and this is perhaps the place to mention the wonderful and creative work which the First Years girls did in making the landscape of the various plays. They provided the hills, dales, relatives, soldiers, forests, animals...you name it, all through mime and their own creativity. 
'artlab'

ENVIRONMENTIAL ACTION GROUP

Over the October half-term six eager students, two teachers and a team of people from the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers (BTCV) were cajoled into cleaning out the school pond under the auspices of the school's Environmental Action Group. hidden under the leaves. However, after retrieving all the pieces and putting them back together we found it was nothing more interesting than a few tree roots. The only identifiable items we did discover were a rusty old bicycle and a popped rugby ball!

Thanks must go to all that helped, especially Mrs Scott, who was brave enough to go deep sea, or should we say, pond diving in her wetsuit and life jacket, and Chris and Terry, the budding lumberjacks, who felled a few trees! We are also grateful to Mr. McNeela for supplying all the materials for the pond-dipping platform and to Mr Bamber for providing and erecting the fencing around the pond.

The final result is a pond that is not only clean enough for the duck population of the Fylde, but also for synchronised swimming competitions and diving events off the new pond-dipping platform — a place for the whole school to appreciate and enjoy.

THE MYSTERY OF THE STOLEN SWORDS

When faced with the news within my first week in office that we had lost not only some ICT equipment but also the Waterloo sword, I was devastated. This artefact presented by RC Dickson in 1938 to commemorate former pupil and Cambridge scholar Lieutenant Henry Rishton Buck of the 33rd Regiment, who fell at Waterloo on 18 June, 1815, represented one of the key memorabilia in the school's possession. Its loss was seen as both tragic and likely to be permanent.

The police were alerted and investigated carefully while our Old Kirkhamians' Association searched high and low in antiques brochures but all to no avail.

Then lo and behold in mid-November the police miraculously unearthed our sword in Blackpool and returned it to school. This represents real testimony to the perserverance of our police force and is a relief and joy to all at school.

Soon to be encased and alarmed we look forward to the sword once again gracing the magnificent Old Hall.





Our pet animals all returned in good health after being fostered by several staff and pupils during the summer holiday. This support is much appreciated and the animals certainly benefit from the regular handling which they receive.

The beginning of term is always extremely busy with many first years joining the club. A waiting list had to be used in order to maintain safe standards in the laboratory. Now the membership has become more stable there will be spaces for new members to attend after threstnes.

A group of Animal Ark Club members visited Aqualife at Auldene Garden Centre to handle various reptiles and hamsters. We purchased several tropical fish and two small aquatic tropical frogs which have adjusted well to the school aquarium. The frogs do not eat dried fish flakes. A small frozen block of blood worms (rather like an oxo cube) is dropped into the tank three times a week and the frogs soon find this and grab the bloodworms as the block melts. Some of the fish also eat bloodworms so we try to drop the block in a corner, under vegetation where the frogs seem to hide. A patient observer will always be able to spot the frogs as they swim to the surface every few intruites to gulp in some air. Unlike tadpoles, adult frogs do not have gills but breathe through lungs. Most species live on land eating slugs and trisecis. These tropical frogs are unusual in remaining aquatic in adulthood.

We have also recently purchased a young Syrian hamster called Moley. He is a satin haired, chocolate type very similar in appearance to our founding member' hamster when the Club began, five years ago. Moley is only ten weeks old but already seems to have a very easy-going nature and can be disturbed at any time 1 of day without fear of him being grunpy. Two six week old Roborovski hamsters are also new additions. They run extremely fast but are gradually losing their kamikaze tendencies as they become used to being handled. They have a large cage and we have set up a play-tray for them so they are getting enough exercise.


