SPEECH DAY





Following in father's, and grandfather's, footsteps...

18-year-old Kirkham student Felicity Long, is set to continue a remarkable family tradition, by becoming the third successive generation of her family to go to the same prestigious Oxford college. Felicity's recent A-Level results, from Kirkham Grammar School, have secured her a place at Exeter College, Oxford, where she will read for a degree in Modern Languages (French and Czech).

When she takes up her place there next month, she will be following in the footsteps of both her father and grandfather.

Felicity's grandfather, 83-year old Rev Dr Arthur Long is a Unitarian Minister, and a leading expert in Liberal Theology. He studied at the 700-year-old Oxford college at the start of the Second World War, before working as a Minister at a Unitarian church in Bolton, then taking over as Principal of the Unitarian Theological College in Manchester.

Felicity's father, Adrian Long, is Head of Sixth Form at Kirkham Grammar School, where he also runs the French Department. He studied Languages at the college in the mid 1970's, and since becoming a teacher at Kirkham, he has always encouraged his own most able students to apply to his old College at Oxford.

When Felicity proved to be such a capable linguist, her father encouraged her to apply to Oxford, and she decided to try to continue the tradition by choosing Exeter College.

Felicity's A-Level passes included not only three 'A' grades, but also a Distinction in the Advanced Extension Paper in French, a level, which only a handful of students achieve nationally. She is Secretary of the Kirkham Twinning Association, and has been responsible for the organization of the town's recent visits commemorating thirty years of twinning with Ancenis in France. She hopes to use her experience in this capacity in a future career working in Europe.

GCSE RESULTS

This year we were delighted that 99% of our pupils achieved a minimum of five grade C passes or above. This figure included 100% pass rates in English Language and Mathematics, a most laudable level of success. A particular mention must go to Lucy Martin who achieved all A* grades this year. Furthermore, no less than eleven students achieved a minimum of eight A grades in this year's examinations.

Once again overall, the results were pleasing with nearly three quarters of all grades at B or above, a figure that matches last year's record statistics. The challenge is now there for the year group to replicate this success in their A-level studies.

A-LEVEL RESULTS

Once again the A-level results surpassed previous records with 47% of grades being at A/B level. There were also some outstanding individual performances with no less than eleven candidates gaining at least three grade A's and five candidates with a stunning five grade A's. These individual achievements were well documented at Speech Day as was the further achievement of Felicity Long who gained a Distinction in French at Advanced Extension Award and Terry Ogdin and Miranda Hill who gained merits in Biology and German

These outstanding achievements at the highest grades do not obscure the fact that the pass rate was 95% and the overwhelming majority of students gained entry to their first choice destination in Higher Education. We wish the whole cohort well and thank them for their immense contribution to the school.







All's well that ends well however and all groups went on to complete their routes, and of course, get a little wet! The next expedition will take place during the Easter Holidays with hopefully better weather!



The highlight of this term has to be KGS's first Shakespearean production for many years A Midsummer Night's Dream. It may seem a little unseasonal, but the play is so funny we thought it would be a fine choice. We used the original text but updated the setting to modern day. There were lots of pupils involved from the first formers upwards, and we included live music, a karaoke version of Summer Nights' and plenty of stapstick humour. This production drew on the creative talents of over 100 pupils and staff. Many 5th Year pupils with speaking parts will gain marks for their performance as part of their GCSE Drama. We also had many pupils who had made their own costume and completed make up designs for GCSE marks. Rehearsals were thoroughly enjoyable which set the scene for the three production nights, as can be seen from Mr Alan Thrower's photographs which accompany this report. DRAMA

This term has been extremely busy in the Drama Department. We have had several theatre visits as well as auditions and rehearsals for A Midsummer Night's Dream. Our first Sixth Form trip was to the National Theatre in London to see Chekhovs The Three Sisters at the start of October. The production had received excellent reviews and, as a group, we had read the first two acts together but had saved the ending to experience it live. The play certainly lived up to expectations with a superb ensemble performance from the cost and a beautiful set. The play follows the lives of the three sisters over a year with each act representing a different season. The production included show and rain falling on 'real' trees which added to the realism Chekhov wished to achieve in the theatre.

Our second trip was to Manchester's Royal Exchange to see Lucy Bailey's Twelfth Night. This classic Shakespearean comedy was husely enjoyable for all concerned. We took publis from all year groups and for the jutilors we ran a competition to design a costume and write a review of the performance. Flona Williams won and received a free ticket to see Nutcracker!

in November a group of 5th and 6th Year students also went to the Library Theatre, Manchester, to see Caryl Churchill's Top Girls. This is a superb play commenting on the role of women in society and the egotism of the 1980's. We were not disappointed with the production, it was furny, tragic, hopeful, and hopeless and ultimately a thought -provoking piece of theatre.

Finally, pupils from the first, second and third year went on a Christmas trip to The Lowry in Manchester to see Matthew Bourne's Nutcracker! This was a far from traditional production which included a giant mouth, an enormous wedding cake complete with Busby Berkeley style dancers, and every type of Liquorice Allsort brought to life in Candyland. Unfortunately the afternoon was disrupted by two false fire alarms, our pupils coped very well with these and behaved superbly as they have on all our trips.

TWELFTH NIGHT AT THE MANCHESTER ROYAL EXCHANGE

I thought Twelfth Night was fantastic and very amusing. The setting in a hotel was very realistic and fitting for the play. Katrina Lindsay, the designer, is very talented. The costumes were very out of the ordinary. Only Fabian and Malvolio were dressed even slightly ordinary. Maria wore probably the most unusual outfit for a mald. Karina mixed colour and texture to make the costumes appear strange, even out of this world!

I thought the stage was excellent. The set used water so the normal stage floor was raised and pumps and pipes installed. With the play being in-the round there were lots of balconies and walkways which the actors could use.








