RECORD A-LEVEL RESULTS

We congratulate our Upper Sixth formers on achieving the best A-level results in the school's history. The number of high grades was particularly pleasing:

Grade A - 27%

Grades A/B - 42%

Grades A/B/C - 61%

The average UCAS points score per student was also at its highest ever level at 23.8, enabling the great majority to secure places at their first choice universities. Sixteen students achieved at least three grade A's, with Phillip Bennett and Michael Strickland each achieving an astonishing six grade A's.


We are pleased to report that one of our Sixth Form pupils, Graham Dawson, has been offered a place at Huddersfield University studying product design with a grade C in Technology and a pass in another subject. The University was delighted to award this offer on the strength of the Computer Aided Design work Graham has done whilst studying at Kirkham.

Training on Computer Aided Design systems has continued with teachers from schools around the North West attending training sessions. More are planned for next term as the national scheme expands.

The Faculty has again been privileged to host a number of visits as part of our relationship with BAE SYSTEMS. This term we hosted the Malaysian Education Minister and the Head of their Teacher Training Organisation. Both visits were highly successful and our pupils were a credit to themselves and the school. Many thanks must go to all the staff from within the Faculty as well as those from other subject areas who kindly give their time and pupils. We look forward to a further visit from Colonel Razif, Commandant of the Royal Military College, before the end of this term.

This term saw the launch of the Fi in Schools Challenge, Here our pupils have to design and manufacture dragster cars which will be raced within school and then in regional finals to be held next term. Kirkham Grammar School is to be designated as a regional race centre for the national competition. This will involve the school hosting other race teams from across the North of England. The grand final will be held in Olympia in London in January, 2001. The prizes are most attractive and will be donated by the major sponsor, laguar Racing. The club operates on Tuesday evenings and Thursday lunch times. There are lots of pupils involved, all trying to beat Mr. Crowther and Mr. Hill to produce the fastest car. The races will take place on a 65 ft. track in the MPH and we will be looking for speeds of approaching 70 mph. We look forward to producing the cars and holding our own races next term. Already the competition is very fierce.

As part of the continued development of the Faculty, we recently took delivery of twelve new computers for the Graphics Department. This will enable our pupils to have access to machines capable of easily handling the most greedy of programs. Twelve of the existing machines will be distributed around the school to both academic and administrative departments. Two of the computers will go into the staffroom areas where they will be used to access the new database system which now holds accurate information on all pupils. Staff will be able to get access to customised information from the beginning of the Spring Term.



The summer holidays saw two highly successful camps, one at Cultybraggen in Scotland and the RAF Millennium Camp held at Cranwell which involved over 2000 RAF cadets from around the country. All cadets attending seemed to enjoy themselves hugely and to benefit from some steep learning curves - like getting up early in the mornings! As ever, the cadets performed well and gave their all in competition, so much so that one junior cadet, on finished a gruelling march and shoot, was sick over the Colonel's boots!

Field Days, later in the term, proved fun if very, very wet, especially the overnight expedition held at Waddecar Scout Camp. The gruelling "survival" exercise held on the night before the CCF field day involved 15 RAF and 15 Army cadets who learned all about survival shelters, catching food, and night navigation on a perfectly wet and cold evening.

Fortunately everybody "survived" to complete all the activities the next day!

Again, the experiences broaden the horizons of our cadets, sometimes in a radical manner. Some few days after finally drying out the wet kit we welcomed our RAF Inspecting Officer for our Annual Inspection and Review. He was most impressed by the working displays he saw and particularly commented on the quality and dedication of our Senior NCO's in both Services. He also enjoyed his lunch!

Finally, I am pleased to announce that Lt. Col. Sayer has been reelected onto the CCFA Executive Committee in London and will continue to represent cadet interests in the North West of England for the foreseeable future.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

Kirkham Grammar School's newly formed Duke of Edinburgh's Award group has attracted a great deal of interest from Fifth and Sixth Form students: we currently have fifteen young people working towards Bronze, and nearly twenty who have entered at Gold Direct level.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award offers the challenge of adventure to all young people between the ages of 14 to 24, and aims to encourage participation in a balanced programme of activities that, perhaps uniquely in this age, is chosen and organised principally by the young people themselves. Current activities followed by our participants illustrate the range available: from First Aid to fishing; from music to marksmanship; from rugby to recycling!

Winter is the "close season" for Duke of Edinburgh's

Award expeditions. However, one intrepid group attempted to snatch a Gold training venture right at the end of the season, under the aegis of Mr. Callister and Mrs. Copland.

The Award works in partnership with CCF, during which time expedition training takes place. Most CCF activities can also count for the Award: indeed, holding CCF stripes can qualify for the Service section of the Award at Gold level.

Currently we are hampered by problems arising from the introduction of new regulations - the most pressing concern being the storage of Award books. However, when the system is fully "on-line", we are confident that the changes will make the Award more flexible, and even more attractive to participants.



Art from Down Under



Website


This September saw the launch of the Art Department's own website. The site gives pupils an excellent starting point for research on anything to do with Art and artist.

The overall result was extremely close, KGS winning by 112-110 points. Notable performances came from Michael Wilson and Harry Leeming in the Juniors, Greg Skinner and Chris Gorman in the Inters, and Richard Kellett, Adam Parker and Jonathan Wilson in the Seniors.

On Tuesday, to October we competed against Bolton School, by far our toughest fixture to date. The overall result was much closer than we had expected. The Seniors lost very narrowly, 36-40 points, the Inters pulling off a most commendable result drawing their match, but Bolton Junior squad were just a little too strong for us.






