THE CHALLENGE AHEAD



A computer generated image of the proposed new building


Over the past decade, Kirkham Grammar School has emerged as one of the nation's most rapidly developing schools. The number of pupils on roll has risen from 550 to 950. In order to accommodate this growth a successful ten year development plan led to the building of a new Junior School and a floodlit sport-turf pitch, capable of housing twelve full size tennis courts, in 1991; further classroom accommodation, eleven acres of new playing fields, a sixth form centre and a lodge were added in the mid nineteen nineties; an international centre of excellence for technology in 1998, a languages centre in 1999, extended library provision in 2000 and a magnificent new dining complex in 2001.

The Governors and Headmaster, now intend to build on this success by launching a second ten year development plan. There is no intention to increase the number of pupils on roll. Kirkham Grammar School is well known for its one family ethos and Governors are keen to preserve this by keeping the school relatively small in size. Therefore, plans for the next decade are designed to provide pupils with the best purpose-built accommodation.

Plans have already been approved for the building of new girls' changing accommodation, two further small classrooms and extended staff-room facilities. However, the centre piece of the new development plan will be an expansive, three storey classroom block, built in sympathy with the original architectural structure of the school, which will house the core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science. The Junior School will also be provided with a science laboratory and boarding accommodation will be upgraded.

In order to kick start these essential developments Governors are appealing to parents, former pupils, friends of the school, major donors, business and industry and charitable trusts for £1 million.

The benefits to pupils will be substantial. They will be taught specialist subjects in purpose built accommodation, with the facilities they require to advance their learning of key subjects, which are at the heart of the curriculum: Science, Mathematics and English. In the context of developing school facilities, the proposed new classroom block is, to a large extent, the final part of the jigsaw. It will provide the school with its essential needs for generations to come and it will enhance the overall image of the school immeasurably. Its early construction is absolutely vital. Without it the teaching and learning of core subjects cannot continue other than in temporary makeshift accommodation.



A Blueprint for Future

Development over the coming years centres upon the construction of a three-storey classroom block, which will extend across the north side of the Senior School quadrangle and house Science laboratories, Mathematics and English classrooms. Presently much of the teaching of these core subjects is accommodated in temporary buildings, which have a limited life span. The "Wareing" buildings on the north west edge of the campus will need to be replaced within the next few years, therefore it is absolutely vital for the future of the School that we accomplish this key development.

The design of the new Science, Mathematics and English block, which is to be built in sympathy with the original school building, enables it to be erected in phases. The cost of completing the full build is likely to be in the region of £2 million, a daunting sum. However, the urgent need for more Science laboratories and teaching spaces makes it essential that we get the project underway during the summer of 2003. The Governors cannot possibly finance such a large-scale development out of income and further borrowing is not an option.

The School has maintained a successful development programme over the last 10 years, which can be seen from the school plan below.


The three-storey classroom block, across the north side of the School quadrangle, which will house Science laboratories, Mathematics and English classrooms, is clearly visible, along with other future developments.



Mr John Catterall, Director of Music at Kirkham Grammar School since 1981, received an MBE for his services to choral music in Lancashire in the New Year Honours Awards. Many of his pupils have received the Royal School of Music St. Nicholas Award - the highest award open to choristers.

The Headmaster said. "As one of Mr. Catterall's sponsors, I was thrilled to see him receive the recognition he deserves after a remarkable career in teaching music. Year on year at Kirkham Grammar School, Mr. Catterall's skills as a Choirmaster have attracted outstanding School Choirs of up to 100 pupils and the annual Inter House Music Festival regularly attracts more than 300 entries. The thousands of people who have attended school concerts over the years, not to mention equal numbers of his pupils, will be delighted that he has been honoured in this way".

Mr. Catterall's Broughton Church Choir is also one of six in th UK to achieve St. Nicholas Guild Choir status, which is awarded by the Royal School of Church Music for obtaining consistently excellent standards in choral music. Mr. Catterall said: "Lam very pleased and surprised. It is a wonderful start to the New Year".




The proceeds from the concert in January will be donated to the Army Benevolent Fund and a contribution will also be made to School funds.


BOARD WORK



Next term we are planning to purchase a small incubator in order to observe the development of a few chicken eggs. The chicks have already been guaranteed good homes once they become too large to keep in school!


