ESSENTIAL VOCABULARY

National Park	A protected area of beautiful countryside where nature, wildlife and special places are looked after.
Climate	The usual weather in a place over a long period of time, such as whether it is usually warm, cold or wet.
Glaciation	The process where huge sheets of ice, called glaciers, moved across the land thousands of years ago and shaped the mountains, valleys and lakes.
Tourism	When people travel to visit a place for a holiday, adventure or to enjoy its scenery.
Settlement	A place where people live, such as a village, town or city.
Grid Reference	A set of numbers on a map that helps you find the exact location of a place.
