## Vocabulary you will learn:

Sewa	Service to God, to the community of Sikhs and to the community at large.
Kirat karna	Earning one's living by one's own efforts and by a livelihood which is honest.
Vand chakna	Sharing one's time, talents and earnings with the less fortunate.
Langar	A community kitchen where free meals are served to anyone.
Khalsa	The collective body of initiated Sikhs.
Amrit	A sacred nectar used in the initiation ceremony into the Khalsa.

## Key facts about Sikhism:

**Holy book:** Guru Granth Sahib

**Place of Worship:** Gurdwara

**Belief:** That only one God exists and that God is simultaneously within everything and is all encompassing.

**Special Days:** Guru Nanak Gurpurab, Vaisakhi, Holi, Maghi.



**The Khanda.** A double-edged sword at the centre, representing the belief in one God, flanked by two single edged swords that symbolize the duality of spiritual authority. Additionally, the circular emblem represents the eternal nature of God, reminding Sikhs to remain within the rule of God.

## Guru Nanak's Revelation

After disappearing into a river for three days, Guru Nanak emerged and proclaimed, "There is no Hindu, there is no Muslim," emphasizing the oneness of humanity.
