She has held senior positions in the NHS, education, leadership and management including: **Consultant Midwife, Director of Midwifery, Head of Nursing (NHS), Senior Lecturer, Curriculum Leader and Lead Midwife for Education**. She has also supported the education of midwives internationally.

- She has helped the shape the national maternity policy as well as advised on maternal health. **She contributed massively to the NHS** and their policies surrounding maternity, lifting the visibility of midwifery as a profession
- Included as one of the 100 most influential people in the UK with African/African-Caribbean descent
- She was appointed as the **FIRST chief midwife for the International Confederation of Midwives in 2023**
- She is considered one of the most influential Black, Asian and minority ethnic people in health (2024)

She is dedicated to advancing a well-resourced, educated, regulated, and enabled midwifery workforce, supporting midwives and health systems worldwide.
