Breaktime Snacks - Spring Term

Healthy mid-morning snacks are now available to purchase for all children, for the spring term (which starts on Thursday 6 January). Snacks are usually toast, crumpets, scones or toasted teacakes, and must be ordered and paid for in advance. The cost of snacks for the spring term is £21.66 and payment can be made by cash or cheque (online payments CANNOT be accepted for snack). If paying by cheque, this should be made payable to Ladybridge Primary School.

Q & A Time

Q. Why do pupils take tests during assessment weeks?

A. There are four main reasons:

1. It is an opportunity for pupils to show us what they have learnt since the start of the term.

2. Specific test questions enable teachers to identify whether there are any misconceptions, or what learning might need to be covered again/re-taught.

3. It is an opportunity for pupils to practise recalling learning in a formal test situation (silent and timed, which prepares them for future tests and exam conditions).

4. It helps to identify those pupils who find tests difficult and/or shine, so we can then offer personalised support.
