## Preparing for June 8th ...

In readiness of an anticipated return to school on  $8^{th}$  June, we have contacted the parents of children from Reception, Y1 and Y6 and are now in the process of formulating plans for those pupils who will be able to attend school from  $8^{th}$  June. There have been some big changes and, unfortunately, for those families who return to school in June, school will be a very different place ...

- A one-way system in and out of the school grounds is now in place. Please enter
  via the top gate (KS2 playground) and leave through the bottom gate (KS1
  playground).
- Only one parent should escort their child onto school grounds.
- Pupils will only attend for a morning or afternoon for Monday to Thursday (school will be closed on Fridays).
- There will be staggered start and finish times (you will be informed about your child's times in due course).
- At drop off/collection time, parent/carers should wait on the playground nearest to their child's classroom (confirmation of which rooms each class will use is still TBC).
- Maintain 2 metres distance, from other families, at all times.
- Pay close attention to any markings on the floor. Please do not wait in 'busy' or access areas, eq, near steps or classroom doors.
- Only let your child bring their water bottle and coat to school.
- Wait on the playground until the teacher calls your child's name.
- As soon as children enter the class, they must wash hands with soap and water at the sink, then they will be told which table/place to sit at.
- All classrooms will be set out in a way that allows pupils and staff to adhere
  to stringent social distancing measures; all tables will be 2 metres apart, in all
  directions. Sorry, but no hugs are allowed at this time!
- There will be a maximum of 6 pupils (and 1 or 2 adults) in each classroom.
- Every child will be given their own zip wallet, which will include basic equipment that only they can use during the day.
- Class activities are likely to be very paper-based with pupils completing tasks by themselves. There will be no partner work, and there can be no practical sharing of resources/equipment. Staff will teach, guide, support and feed back to pupils all from a 2 metre distance.
- Break-times will be staggered and pupils will need to adhere to social distancing when playing/talking with their friends outside (no tig, chasing, catching, throwing or any games that involve being close to someone else).
- Teachers will go through new indoor and outdoor rules with all children.
- There will be regular handwashing throughout the day.
- If your child is not at school from 8<sup>th</sup> June, they will continue to be set home learning tasks via Class Dojo, by staff that are not in school. This means that communication during the day, via Class Dojo or phone, may not be with your child's usual class teacher.

Each week, during lockdown, we will interview one of our staff members or governors, so you can get to know them a little better. This week, it's the turn of Mr Edward Woo, our Vice-Chair of Governors...

Q1. What do you do when you're not being our Vice-Chair of Governors? I have been learning a variety of Latin dances over the last 5 years, and I have danced at the famous Blackpool Tower Ball Room and also did the Bolton Hospice Strictly Dancing 2018 Competition. I have also been learning to sing and I am part of a 70 strong Choir called the Tonge Haulgh Community Choir in Bolton. I have a huge amount of Lego and continue to collect it and regularly build it with my teenage sons.

Q2. What's the best thing about being a Governor at our school? I enjoy the meeting the children and how they love to learn at such an early age. I took on the role of school governor so that I could give something back to the community and to the school children. When I was a small child, I was the only Chinese boy in reception. I did not speak or understand much English and finished at the bottom of the class that first year. Q3. Tell us one thing that is unusual/unique about you.
