HOMEWORK

- The first priority is always reading (because, once you can read well, you are then able to access all other learning).
- The next priority is to regularly practise spellings and times tables. For KS2 pupils, there is additional support for English, maths and science on Century.
- For children in Y2 Y6, the next priority is to choose 4 activities from the autumn grid below. These activities support and deepen 'Discovery' learning, and pupils can choose whether to 'Make it, Find Out About it, Create it or Present it'. By providing flexibility and choice, we hope this will enable pupils and families to select activities that suit them, depending upon the amount of time you have, the equipment and resources you have at home or the amount of help that is available, etc (see example below).
