Academy Context

Latton Green Primary Academy is a smaller than average sized primary school situated in Harlow. The school is part of the NET Academies Trust and is in a cluster with four other local schools in Harlow and also works collaboratively with another primary school in Waltham Cross. It works closely in partnership with Place2Be, a leading children's mental health charity and has achieved Healthy Schools and School Games gold award. The academy serves a community where social and economic disadvantage is broadly in line with national averages. There are currently 204 pupils on roll with one class in each year group from Reception to Year 6. The school shares its premises with a separate pre-school/nursery which is managed by NET Academies Trust and would be inspected separately.


Our academy can be contextualised as:

- Ethnic minorities is continuing to increase, now at 26.4%; however very few pupils speak English as an additional language (12.3%)
- After White British (74%), our largest ethnic groups are White Eastern European (5%) and White Other (3%)
- SEND is roughly in line with national figures, with 10% of pupils on the SEND register (21 pupils with 5 pupils of these pupils having an EHC Plan). The largest identified areas of SEND is moderate learning difficulty (9/21 pupils), social emotional and mental health (3/21 pupils) and speech, language and communication (3/21 pupils)
- 18.6% of pupils are eligible for Pupil Premium
- 2% of pupils are eligible for Early Years Pupil Premium
- 14.7% of pupils are eligible for FSM
- Mobility is low with only 1% of current pupils joining the school during Year 5 or Year 6.

PE and Sport Premium Background and Aims

Since 2013, there has been additional government funding given to schools. Schools with 17 or more pupils receive £16,000 plus £10 per pupil in years 1-6. Current funding has been maintained in its doubled state from the last three years. The premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

At Latton Green, Physical Education and Sport feature highly throughout the school. Children receive at least 2 hours of timetabled, physical activity per week as well as opportunities for supervised, active play during break and lunchtimes for at least an extra hour per day. We believe that physical activity and sport contribute to the holistic development of children and through participation in sport and physical education, children learn more about themselves and develop lifelong values such as teamwork, fair play and respect for themselves and others. There is significant evidence to show the positive effects of sport and exercise on children's physical health, growth and development but also on their academic ability. Sport and activity also provide a healthy environment for children to learn how to deal with competition and how to cope with both winning and losing. Over the past 12 months we have continued to develop our PE offer, through specialist PE teaching, reviewing the PE curriculum and reviewing the PE clubs on offer. Specialist physical education teachers work in every year group teaching at least one lesson in each class every week. The school was successful in retaining Gold Kitemark status at the end of 2019-20 in recognition of its commitment to developing sporting participation, provision and competition. We are looking to build upon these achievements in the coming year by retaining the School Games Gold status.
