Message from the Co-Heads

As you will be able to deduce from reading this Newsletter it has been a very busy and productive spring term for LPS staff & students. Early in the spring term we had an Ofsted Inspection. The Ofsted Inspectors told us that our school was still good in all areas despite the many challenges that we have been facing. The Ofsted inspectors wrote in their report

"This school has a strong commitment to improving the life chances and raising the achievement of it's pupils, regardless of their circumstances. Pupils respond positively to these expectations and are happy at school. They receive careful support to adjust well on arrival. Pupils develop a sense of pride and belonging that enables them to achieve well."

This is a very pleasing outcome for the school and we are particularly delighted that the Ofsted inspectors commented on the positive outcomes we are able to support our students to achieve.

In addition, you will notice that a number of activities and events have taken place over the term, including "Money Week" during which students took part in a trading game competition. Students have also taken part in a number of subject-based and reward trips and visits. Towards the end of the term a group of our Key Stage 3 students performed their own version of the Matilda musical to other students.

By now you will have been informed that, after the Easter holidays, many of our timetables will be changing. This is to accommodate a large number of additional students who have been permanently excluded from their mainstream schools during this academic year. We do appreciate that these changes may cause some difficulties for schools, parents/carers and students but we decided it was a priority to maintain some level of provision for all of our current students, while at the same time being able to create some additional places to be able to admit new students, who urgently need suitable alternative education provision, having been permanently excluded from their mainstream schools. We would like to reassure you that this is a temporary arrangement and will only operate until the end of the summer term. We are currently working on a more flexible timetable for the 2025.26 academic year which will allow us to increase our provision offer again next year.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and enjoyable Easter break.

Narrative Alchemy

This term we had another visit from Narrative Alchemy to deliver an amazing performance titled Chelsea's Story.

Chelsea's Story is our internationally renowned applied theatre play that has proven highly effective in raising awareness around the sensitive issue of Child Sexual Exploitation.

It tells the story of two students who discover the diary of a girl called Chelsea. Chelsea was a 15-year-old girl who, having fallen out with her family & friends, met a guy called Gary. Gary was kind, understanding, had a nice car, had his own flat, and listened to her. Unfortunately, Gary was not all that he seemed! Chelsea's Story is played out and examined by the two students who, along with their teacher, attempt to understand what happened.

The play and post show talk lasts for 55 minutes and has proven highly effective at raising awareness around:-

- Healthy/Unhealthy Relationships
- Safe Internet Use/Sexting
- The Grooming Process, CSE & the differing models that perpetrators can use
- The warning signs of CSE
- Avoiding victim blaming
- Where to go for help & advice











Easter Egg Hunt

To finish off the spring term, a few members of staff organised a school-wide Easter egg hunt.

For the hunt, 51 printed, and laminated Easter eggs were hidden around the exterior of the school. These eggs were hidden in some very tricky places, so much so that even some of the staff were struggling.

Eggs were found above door, in bushes, under benches, on the field, and many other places.

These eggs all had letters on them, and the goal was to collect as many as possible to then create as many words as possible out of the letters each team had found.

This event really was an amazing way to end the term, with both staff and students having a great time and working together.



Other Mentions

On a Wednesday, students in Key Stage 3 participate in a Workskills Class. Delivered by Hannah, our Independent Careers Adviser.

The sessions are a blend of career information and practical sessions to develop skills. Students have worked on a wide range of activities, from Lego stop motion when we looked at creative industries to developing our ability to follow instructions. Plumbing and marble runs to develop our problem-solving skills and bracelet-making to improve our concentration skills. We also made our own Petri dishes of bacteria when we looked at careers in a laboratory. Students have asked some amazing questions, shown their depth of knowledge within careers and have some wonderful ambitions for their futures.









KS4 students took part in a special Vaisakhi breakfast, which we turned into a wider cultural celebration to recognise Easter, Eid, Vaisakhi, and the many faiths and backgrounds that make up our school community.

The morning featured a colourful spread of exotic fruits from around the world, giving students the chance to explore new tastes, learn about different cultures, and enjoy breakfast together. Many tried fruits they'd never had before — from mango and pomegranate, to dates and coconut — and it was brilliant to see their curiosity and enthusiasm.

It was a fantastic opportunity to bring everyone together in a positive, inclusive way, and to celebrate the rich diversity we're so proud of at our school.
