Welcome to the winter edition of Inline Magazine; these are exciting times at Little Ilford. The proposal to build a new school on our existing site is becoming a reality. We are beginning to adapt the plans that we had in place for the cancelled 'Building Schools for the Future' programme to suit the new 'Priority Build Scheme'. Works are scheduled to start in December 2014 and the new school is due to open in December 2016. There will be challenges to face. For example, the reduction in playground space during the building process will mean that we have to look at changing our school day from next September, staggering our lunch and morning breaks. However we are confident of our ability to manage this transition and will keep you informed of what is happening as we progress. In the meantime, there is much to celebrate from our exam results, despite the national changes to grade boundaries in English, Maths, Science, History and Geography.

Our Maths results held firm with 76% of students achieving an A*-C pass. The Science results continue to rise with 70% of students achieving double science at A*-C. A quarter of our students achieved the English Baccalaureate this year, up from 9% the year before. The headline figure of five A*-C passes including English and Maths remained above the national average at 60%. Furthermore our Year 11s did brilliantly in the exams at the end of Year 10, achieving on average 72% in Maths and 67% in Science. This bodes extremely well for next summers GCSE results.

We continue to be proud of our exciting programme for Gifted and Talented students. Last Friday I had the pleasure of joining two groups of students at the HSBC global headquarters in Canary Wharf (pictured above). Where they were competing against each other in an enterprise event judged by Stephen Hammond, the Minister for Transport. The bank's staff and politicians present were at pains to tell me how impressed they were with Little Ilford students. Although only one of our teams could be the winner, the HSBC

staff told me they would be keen to recruit from our students in the future.

As the festive period approaches, please keep in mind that it is a very good idea to continue to encourage your child to read for at least 20 minutes per day. Recent research has provided evidence for something that we all knew: performance in all academic subjects, including Maths, is improved simply by reading regularly. I would like to take this opportunity to wish you and your family all the best over the Christmas break and for 2014. *Ian Wilson, Headteacher*

Stephen Hammond MP and Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Transport worked with our students as "Mr Boot", owner of a fictional football club London FC working with volunteers from **HSBC** alongside our students to support them in their decision-making.

On 11th October, 14 students at Little Ilford School in Newham learned first-hand what it is like to be a city executive as they were thrown into a real life business scenario. 'London FC' is up for sale and there are two interested buyers, Mr Alexander and Mr Singh. The students were split into two advisory bodies, one for each buyer, and worked together to advise their client whether or not bidding for the football club was a good idea. Each member of the team took on a role, including presenter, negotiator and administrator. At the end of the day, the teams of students presented their offers for the football club to a board of HSBC executives. HSBC employees worked with the students throughout the day and gave them feedback at the end of the session. Based on this feedback, HSBC will be working with the school to look at ways that the students can be supported on a longer term basis. Erica Cham-Programme Manager (Skills), ELBA berlain, said: "Giving students at Little Ilford the opportunity to learn about the world of business through a real life scenario is a fantastic way to raise their aspirations. By setting the students the 'A day in the life' challenge, we hope that they have realised that they already have many of the skills needed for a career in the city and will hopefully be more confident about making university or job applications."
