Welcome to the summer edition of Inline magazine. The excitement is building as the opening of our new building gets closer and closer. We are in the process of purchasing the new furniture and working out how it will fit into the various rooms. A group of our special needs students were shown around the building recently and it was lovely to hear them say things like "I can't wait to get into the new dining hall", "The view was fun" and "It is a beautiful building". Our students will finish at lunchtime on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> October, so that everything can be transferred over, returning on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> November when they will be able to enter the new facility. This brings our half term holiday up to two weeks; this is normal for a building project and we will make sure that the students don't lose out.

As you may know, we have won an 'Educational Outcomes' award from the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust for being in the top 10% of all schools nationally in terms of the value that we add to students' best eight subjects. This is the government's new main measure and we are very proud to be able to display the certificate in our entrance hall. Our 'Progress Eight' figure was 0.51 which means that we add more than half a grade of value to our students' grades when compared to the performance of similar students nationally.

We have been extremely proud of our Debate Mate team, which took part in the national debating competition and was the last state school left in the competition. Ms Andrea has also been given the award for the most committed Debate Mate teacher in the country.

As you know, reading is very important to us and we were pleased to receive a visit from Vaseem Khan, author of 'The Unexpected Inheritance of Inspector Chopra'. Vaseem is not only a successful author but is a Manor Park resident.

I do hope that you will continue to encourage your child to read regularly. We recommend at least 40 minutes per day for years 7-8 and 20 minutes per day for years 9-11. The school makes sure that the students always have a book to read. Fostering a habit of reading brings benefits to all areas of the curriculum.

I send my best wishes to all of you and would like to thank you for all of your support across the year.

#### Y10 students receive expert mentoring

25 Year 10 students with the highest APS scores amongst their year group were selected to participate in a mentoring programme organised by ELBA.

The programme consisted of 6 sessions which began in March, whereby students engaged in a one-to-one mentoring session with a mentor from Morgan Stanley, Thomson Reuters or KMPG. The mentors from the range of companies worked through a series of activities and scenarios which helped students work on their communication skills, problem solving skills, time management and stress management. The mentors often gave actions for their mentees to work towards and prepare for the next session to ensure the knowledge and skills they provided were absorbed and applied by the students.

homelessness

On Monday 13<sup>th</sup> June a French charity called "La Rue Tourne" travelled all the way from Paris to discuss poverty issues with a class of Year 10 students.

The charity, which aims to raise young people's awareness on the issues of homelessness, led a 2-hour session almost exclusively in French.

The experience was eye opening for many students who didn't realise that homelessness had a face, a name, and so many different root causes. They learnt about the profiles of 3 Parisian homeless people: Pascal, a former financial adviser; Keita, who left Senegal to protect his baby girl from FGM; and Sylphide, one of the rare women on the streets of Paris.

When asked if homeless people in the UK should have priority over refugees in terms of help and access to shelter, they unanimously answered that people should have equal rights no matter where they come from.

In a bid to close the huge transition gap that often causes young pupils to fear the upcoming change from primary to secondary, Little Ilford School had their annual Induction Day and evening !



# Ms. Andrea crowned Debate Mate's most committed teacher in UK

Ms. Andrea beat teachers from across the country to win the Most Committed Teacher Award in the secondary school category, for which she received a certificate and fantastic prize (Eurostar voucher worth  $\pounds$ 100).

Upon joining the school, she began supporting the Debate Mate project. However, when Ms. Hakim, the project lead, went on maternity leave last summer she kindly took over the project.



"When I started the recruitment process last September I realised that many students were interested and so I asked Debate Mate to provide us with two mentors instead of one. As time went by and attendance kept growing, they sent us a third mentor. So every Tuesday afternoon from 3.30pm until 4.30pm we had three sessions going on at the same time in the E Block.

"I believe the main reason why I was chosen for this award had to do with all the extra sessions I organised for students in order to prepare them at their best."

It was a fantastic experience that extremely benefitted all students who took part. They had the opportunity to learn and discuss a variety of contemporary topics whilst at the same time improving their literacy skills, critical thinking and confidence. This is so important, especially for our students who come from disadvantaged backgrounds. I put a lot of effort in the programme and I was overwhelmed at times but I enjoyed every second of it and the students did too."

#### Award criteria

At Debate Mate, we are so appreciative of all the work teachers do to organise their weekly clubs, attend competitions, and recruit students. We have seen so much dedication this year and your commitment is what fuels and sustains the programme. We would like to honour two particularly committed teachers who have shown exceptional dedication this year.

Debate Mate honoured Ms Andrea's commitment and dedication to the programme in the following bio:

#### Most Committed Teacher Award: Ms. Andrea, Little Ilford School – London

Little Ilford started the year with 28 students, and reached a peak of 48 by the end of the programme. Much of this is down to the excellent work of Ms. Andrea, who not only went above and beyond to recruit new students to join Debate Mate, but also ran additional lunchtime sessions to help students get the most out of the programme. Ms. Andrea also worked hard to make sure her students took advantage of every other opportunity available to them, from joining the Graduate School to sending teams to Debate Mate Schools. We often say that the schools that get the most out of our programme are the schools with the most involved teachers, something that was well-illustrated by Little Ilford's students reaching the final of the Urban Debate League. Well done to Ms. Andrea for all of her hard work, and we can't wait to see her and her students back next year.

Her final words are "I am so proud of how the students did this year and I hope I have had an impact in getting the students excited about debating, but they did most of the work and showed great maturity and dedication."

### Pride in Year 8 leadership

We are very proud of our Student Leaders in year 8 and of how many students volunteer for different leadership roles.

Throughout the course of the academic year we ask students to volunteer to become registration leaders. These students are trained by Mrs. Karim, Deputy Head of Year 8, and carry out duties in registration time to support the form tutors. Duties can involve monitoring of students equipment and homework, giving out notices or collecting other monitoring information. So far, 36 students have been Registration Leaders this year.



Next year, in year 9, our students will represent the school as Prefects. Year 8 students were asked to volunteer for this position and we were overwhelmed with applicants as over 80 students applied. Obviously, we only want the most responsible students to carry out this role and we are pleased to say that 50 have been accepted on to the Prefect programme.

Prefects in year 9, 10 and 11 wear a maroon blazer and are easily identifiable to staff and students. They have duties on a rota basis for lunchtime supervision and are expected to attend all parents' evenings and other school events to offer support to parents.

Also in year 9, we will have a system of peer mediation whereby students mentor and advise other students who require help and support for issues such as bullying. Again, we were delighted with the amount of students who volunteered for this invaluable work.

Mrs. Karim oversees the Student leadership programme in year 8 and works closely with Mr. Herbert, who is our Student Leadership Coordinator, to make sure that the students are well trained and supported throughout their term of appointment.

Students can earn leadership badges for each event that they take part in other than their day-to-day duties, and so far in year 8 we have 13 students who have earned a bronze badge and 2, Hamza and Hajra, who have silver badges. We are looking forward to our first gold badge winner very soon!

In year 8 we value student leadership as it not only promotes independence and responsibility but can also make the difference between a good college application and an outstanding one.
