Dear Parents and Carers

Ofsted Inspection of Longbenton High School - June 2022

I am delighted to announce that the result of our June 2022 Ofsted inspection is an improvement in our overall school rating from 'Requires Improvement' to 'Good'. Since I began here as headteacher in September 2020, I have been determined to ensure that this was the outcome. I am incredibly proud of what staff and students have achieved in such a short space of time to make this ambition a reality.

I am particularly pleased inspectors acknowledged that:

- The school has been transformed under new leadership; as a result this is a much "improved" school
- We have high ambition for students and an "ambitious" curriculum
- Behaviour is "calm and purposeful" and students have "positive attitudes to learning"
- Disruption to learning is rare but if it does take place, it relates only to a "minority"
- We are a "caring school" who "knows its pupils well"; students "feel safe" here
- Those with SEND "make strong progress"
- Personal development is a real strength which "supports pupils to become confident young people"
- Staff professional development is very strong; staff enjoy working here
- We successfully delivered learning during the pandemic

Ofsted reports are now very short in style and tone; it unfortunately does not fully capture the fantastic verbal feedback we had from the inspection team about the school. The report can be accessed here:

It is important to note that the requires improvement judgement for the behaviour and attitudes sub-category is related to punctuality and attendance, not issues with student behaviour. Punctuality and attendance are areas that come under the behaviour and attitudes heading. Outlined in the table below are our strengths within this category and the areas that were identified during the inspection as not quite being fully secure. In the summer term, we were already in the process of restructuring our pastoral team and systems, including the appointment of a second Deputy Headteacher with responsibility for Culture and Ethos. Whilst it was recognised by inspectors that we were working hard on punctuality and attendance issues, the impact was deemed not yet sufficiently embedded in our school improvement journey.

With this in mind, whilst we appreciate and understand the legacy challenges of the pandemic, including mental health,









we know you will support us going forward in getting students into school regularly and on time, in order to maximise learning and their chances of success.
