At the start, she works in her grandmother's inn.

They find the rest of the crew from the Hispaniola, but the squire foolishly raises the Union Jack, and the pirates find out where they are staying, so Jim hides. The Captain is shot, and she runs away.

She swims out to the ship, but Israel Hands is there. She tries to tell him to help her sail the ship round to the island, but he <code>gloesn</code>?t understand. He starts to light his pipe next to a barrel of gunpowder, and she tries to stop him, but he blows up.

She sails the ship to the island by herself, to rescue her friends, but she meets Long John Silver. He tells her friends betrayed her, and she joins the pirates. She helps them solve the clues that will lead them to the treasure.

When they discover a tunnel, Long John tells her to stay above the tunnel next to the trapdoor, and hands her a pistol. 

Ben Gunn is a Cabin boy who gets tricked by Long John Silver and because of this, he gets stranded on the island for three years. When Jim finds him, he is mad. After some very funny introductions and one-liners, Jim explains her problems about the crew and the treasure. Later, there is a scene where Ben is talking to himself about an unknown idea. The next we see of Ben is during the treasure hunt. He pretends to be the ghost of Captain Flint and leads the pirates on a chase through the tunnels. Jim's friends show up and explain the plan. #### Climate Change

A greenhouse gas is a gas that contributes to the greenhouse effect by absorbing infrared radiation. Carbon dioxide and chlorofluorocarbons are examples of greenhouse gases. A greenhouse gas is a gas that absorbs and emits radiant energy within the thermal infrared range. Greenhouse gases cause the greenhouse effect on planets. The primary greenhouse gases in Earth's atmosphere are water vapour, carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, and ozone. The greenhouse effect keeps the earth warm by allowing solar energy to pass into the atmosphere and reach the surface of the planet while also providing a barrier for some energy so that it remains on earth. It is this far infrared radiation that is absorbed by the atmosphere, heating the planet.

The global average atmospheric carbon dioxide in 2018 was 407.4 parts per million (ppm for short), with a range of uncertainty of plus or minus 0.1 ppm. Carbon dioxide levels today are higher than at any point in at least the past 800,000 years. In 2018, it reached 407.4 ppm.

Greenhouse gases

Greenhouse gases are naturally produced; however humans produce additional amounts of certain greenhouse gases. 3. Greenhouse gases trap heat in the atmosphere warming the Earth's temperature above freezing. This is known as the Greenhouse effect.

China is the largest emitter of carbon dioxide gas in the world with 9.8 billion metric tons in 2017. The primary source of CO2 emissions in China is fossil fuels, notably coal burning. About 70% of the total energy derived in China comes from coal alone, and since coal is rich in carbon, burning it in China's power and industrial plants and boilers releases large amounts of CO2 into the atmosphere.

Nauru is ranked as the world's smallest producer of greenhouse gases. The nation produced 0.05 metric tons of greenhouse gasses in 2014. Nauru is a small island nation in Micronesia in the Central Pacific Ocean. It is the world's third smallest nation and occupies an area of 8.1 square miles. Nauru has a population of only 11,347 residents. The nation's chief economic venture is the extraction of phosphate. Nauru's low population and the low number of industries are the main reason it is the least producer of greenhouse gasses.

#### China- 9.8 billion metric tons in 2017 US- 5.3 billion metric tons in 2017

The largest source of CO2 emissions in the U.S. comes from power generation, transportation, and industry. Even though the U.S. government undertook significant efforts to reduce the reliance on coal for electricity generation, the country has become a major producer of crude oil.

#### India- 2.5 billion metric tons in 2017

As the Indian economy set out on a path toward urbanization and industrialization, the consumption of solid fuels, such as coal, skyrocketed. Coal as a source of electricity in India has risen from 68% in 1992 to 75% in 2015. Coal mines are abundant in India, and coal is generally cheaper in the country than imported oil and gas.

#### The Russian Federation- 1.7 billion metric tons in 2017


Russia has one of the largest natural gas deposits in the world, and natural gas is the primary source of energy and power generation in the country. Coal, which is widely used in chemical and other basic material industries and for power generation in Russia, is also a major contributor to Russia's CO2 emissions.

#### Japan- 1.2 billion metric tons in 2017

Japan is heavily reliant on burning natural gas and coal to generate electricity for its population and various industries. After the nuclear reactors in Fukushima were shut down in 2011, dependence on fossil fuels increased even more. As Japan prepares to reopen its nuclear power plants, its CO2 footprint may stabilize in the future.

#### In the UK there was 366.9 million tons in 2017.

It is 16th in the world of how many green gases were in the UK.





#### Exploring the Emotional Effects of War Taylor Robinson

What are the emotional effects of war and how are they expressed through poetry?

- a) Who does war effect?

War effects everyone, from soldiers to civilians. Soldiers and those fighting in a war are directly affected both physically and mentally, while civilians involved in the war (such as war photographers and doctors) are also at risk of physical and mental injury. Civilians outside of the war are also impacted through the death or injury of loves ones fighting the in war, as well as the change to normal life during war-time.

#### b) What are some of the experiences of soldiers?

Some soldiers are severely affected by war, both physically, through injury, and mentally and emotionally (e.g. soldiers suffering from PTSD or 'shell shock'). Many soldiers in conflicts, such as the two World Wars, experienced grief and anguish from the loss of friends and survivors guilt for living through something many others did not.

#### c) How are the lives of people at home effected

The lives of people at home are affected by a number of factors, from food shortages and rationing, to a shortage of workers, changes in daily routine and sometimes direct attacks by the enemy (such as during the Blitz). The people at home are left anguishing over the soldiers and whether they will return alive.

#### d) How do we remember wars of the past?

We remember wars of the past through monuments and anniversaries, such as Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday. We also teach conflicts of the past in schools and why they happened in an attempt to avoid them happening again. Many regiments will also have a list of fallen soldiers.

#### e) How does war impact mental health?

War impacts mental health as it can leave soldiers with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), which is a condition that involves feelings of anxiety, flashbacks and nightmares of their time in conflict. During World War I this was known as 'shell shock' and 'combat stress'. Even with treatment PTSD can last for life, long after a soldier's war has ended.
