I had to review this book, for I think everybody would enjoy it. This is one of my favourite books which I have read multiple times, simply because it is so good. The plot, genre, themes and style were all *unbelievably* gripping, and I couldn't put it down. It is like no book I have ever read before. Murder Most Unladylike gave me shivers of *thrill and fear* all at the same time. Although the book told the tale of something that most likely wouldn't happen in real life, it all seemed so true and realistic. As the plot develops, *vou grow to love* and understand Daisy and Hazel, the protagonists, and hope that their *heart-warming friendship* survives the test of their mission.

Though this book is based in the 20th century, and so really is a historical novel, it at no point feels dated or old in its plot, which may be either good or bad depending on your preference of time period books are set in.

It is a *murder mystery book*, and is perfect for my age group of young adult. I think the plot and gruesome mentions of murder may be too old of a theme for 8-10 year olds, but teenagers are sure to adore this step up from juvenile fiction. This is the first book in a series of 10! I have read book 2 as well, and I can assure you it is just as amazing, and I now look forward to reading the next one on the series! I would recommend that you read book 1 first, Murder Most Unladylike, because you learn things about the main characters that may not be mentioned in you delve right into the middle of the series.

Hazel Wong finds the Science Mistress of boarding school Deepdean School For Girls, Miss Bell, *dead* in the gym. It doesn't take long to work out...*she has been murdered*. But by who? The teachers found near the scene of the crime are suspects, and it is up to Daisy and Hazel to find the clues, identify alibis and break most school rules in order to investigate and solve this murder case before the police...

TOM PALMER VISIT

In January, in the week following Holocaust Memorial Day, we have Tom Palmer visiting school to talk to Year 7/8 students about his book.

'After the war' is recommended by The Centre for Holocaust Education, due to the extensive research carried out by Tom to ensure its accuracy. It is a carefully researched novel based upon the testimonies and experiences of 'The Boys'. This novel allows students to explore the persecution suffered by these young survivors through a compelling story of friendship and hope. The families and the lives that these young people had before the war are prominent in this novel, enabling students to grasp both the enormity of individual loss and the loss of entire communities as a result of the Holocaust.

Students will be able to sign up to meet the author, bringing or buying his books that they wish to be signed by him in the drop in sessions.
