What should I already know?

- Christians believe that Jesus was the son of God and celebrate his birth at Christmas.
- During the Last Supper, Jesus washed his disciples' feet. The mood around the table was sad and sombre rather than celebratory. Jesus knew that this would be the last time that he and the twelve would eat together. Jesus died on the cross at the hands of the Romans. Christians celebrate Jesus' resurrection with Easter.



The Bible was written over a period of 1500 years. It holds 66 books written by around 40 different authors. The authors of the Bible were inspired by God to write their ideas down. It is split into two parts: the Old Testament and the New Testament.

Christianity has become the largest of the world's religions and geographically, is the most widely diffused of all faiths. It has more than two billion believers. This map represents the religions which are most prevalent in each country around the world – Christianity is marked as purple.

Communion is a ritual to show the togetherness of Christians and God. Christians believe in life after death. They do not believe death is the end. They believe that although the body dies, the soul carries on.
