GET FUNDING FOR YOUR STUDIES



APPLY TO BE AN ARMY OFFICER

If you are thinking about joining the Army as an officer, there are opportunities for you to gain funding while you study.

ARMY SIXTH FORM SCHOLARSHIP

If you're completing A levels or equivalent and wish to join the Army as an Officer you can apply for an Army Sixth Form Scholarship. Successful applicants receive £3,000 in Year 13/S6 and from £6,000 at university. Apply September to 1 March in Year 12/S5.

ARMY GAP YEAR COMMISSION

Army Gap Year Commission is a paid 'internship' with no commitment to join afterwards and a salary from £18,000. Apply September to December in Year 13.

ARMY UNDERGRADUATE BURSARY

If you're at university and wish to join the Army as an Officer when you graduate and in your first or second year you can apply for an Army Undergraduate Bursary:

- STANDARD: £6,000 / £7,000 (three / four-year courses)
- ENHANCED: up to £24,000 (128 UCAS points and expecting a 2:1 or higher)
- TECHNICAL: up to £25,000 (engineering or science degree, potential Technical Corps Officers)
- MEDICAL: up to £75,000 for students as potential Doctor, Dental, Veterinary and Nursing Officers.

Officer training at Sandhurst can count towards a fully funded degree or masters in Leadership and Strategic Studies, offered by the University of Reading's Henley Business School.

HOT OFF THE PRESS! STEM GRADUATE INFLOW SCHEME

Applications will open from 2021 and the award is expected to cover 3 years of university tuition fees, plus an annual bursary and a lump sum on completing Officer training.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR SOLDIER ENTRY

After Basic Training, 98% of soldiers enrol on one of 40 APPRENTICESHIP programmes related to their role: from engineering to catering to equine grooming. You can also get a DEGREE IN NURSING at Birmingham City University, as a soldier. The Army pays tuition fees and a salary of over £21,000 during training. Or you could receive a Medical bursary worth up to £42,000, and qualify in nursing before you join the Army. Apply when you have a place on a UK nursing degree course.
