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Can I check my child's progress on the school's Accelerated Reader reading scheme?

**YES! You can**. Ask your child to login through the school website: "Reading at LSA" tab, then "Reading at LSA" again, then click the "**Accelerated Reader Home Connect" link**. Once your child has logged-in, scroll to the lower left corner and you'll see an option to add your email to receive progress updates:

What is Accelerated Reader (\*AR)?

It's a two-part Reading Scheme from Renaissance Learning. Firstly, students take an online 'Star Test' each term for an accurate picture of their reading comprehension skills. From the test, readers get a 'reading range' (ZPD). Secondly, children attend library lessons fortnightly to borrow, return and quiz books that they read in their own time. If you have a bookshelf at home, students can read, enjoy and quiz most of those books as part of the Reading Scheme if preferred. The scheme helps us to assign a 'level' to most books in our Library collection so that students can match books to their 'reading range' **if** they need to.

How does this "Accelerate" their reading?

Sustaining regular reading furthers reading confidence, reading enjoyment and nurtures a love of reading. We make time for sustained reading by giving each student one full lesson in the library per fortnight. School also delivers collective reading time with form tutors up to Year 10 twice a week. We know from research that sustained daily reading also builds stronger comprehension skills, a key cornerstone of learning.

Current research suggests that there is a significant national decline in book reading among secondary age children. But also that the quality and level of challenge in preferred reading books at this age stalls or declines. AR is a key part of our school's reading culture in Yrs. 7 & 8 to nurture and challenge readers, and we continue to assess reading progress using AR in Yr.9.

While reading for pleasure has its own rewards, our scheme acknowledges and places a value on book reading in the same way that subjects, lessons and extra-curricular activities garner merits and achievement points for students. Readers are awarded for each book successfully 'quizzed'. Our readers appreciate the accuracy of the termly Star Test and enjoy seeing their Reading Range grow with each new 'personal best' score.

In Library lessons, we get to chat about books together, read enjoyable short stories aloud, and encourage readers to stretch themselves by highlighting challenging (for each child based on their personal reading range) but child-friendly reads.

We host an online Library of e-books and audiobooks and a large collection of dyslexia-friendly short-reads for students who have lost the love of reading or struggle with the written word for specific reasons. Early readers can access thousands of specialist hi-low texts in the Library.

Two typical scenarios following a Star Reading Test:

**Ada** in Year 7 scores a high 5.5-8.4 in their Star Reading test. Like many students at LSA, this is a strong reading comprehension score. They can independently read all of the junior fiction books from the Library. Some able readers may personally prefer comics and Manga for casual reading and 'down-time'. We'll encourage them to also borrow and value books on offer for more sustained reading. Ada might also benefit from having a senior-fiction permission slip (books usually reserved for year 8 and upwards) signed by parents to open up more of the books on offer from the Library. Ada should aim to read and quiz at least 3 or 4 books each term. Reading more may garner a 'Millionaire Reader' award and pin later in the year. Millionaire Readers may be chosen in Year 9 to represent the school as judges for Lancashire Book of the Year.

**Theo** scores 1.2 - 3.2 in his Star Test. Most mainstream reading books for Yr.7 and up start around a Level 4 on the scheme, and so will be quite a stretch for him to grasp. If Theo struggles to successfully quiz a mainstream book, we will go through our collection of more accessible shorter reads to find books within his grasp and suggest that he borrows two or three to read over the following fortnight for quizzing in the next Library lesson. If there's a specific need, we might also encourage Theo to try the reading app where filters and fonts can be adapted and changed to suit his preferences. Theo should be reading 10 or 12 'quick reads' each term on his own or with family to build his reading stamina, practice successful quizzing and enter the grow his skills to enter the mainstream reading realm.

Both Theo and Ada are awarded the same achievement points when they pass a book quiz.

### **Bronze and Silver DofE support, Year 9 & 10**

The Library supports student taking the Duke of Edinburgh Award in two ways. Firstly, students can apply to **volunteer** as a Library Leaders one day a week for either 3 or 6 months. We're already teaching successful applicants new skills, who'll keep a record and evaluate their work as they go.

And secondly, students can use the Library to learn a new **skill**. We recommend signing-up for one or more OpenLearn Open University Courses. There are dozens to choose from at all levels. They are free. You can choose a couple of short courses or take on a more challenging longer one. Once completed, you'll receive a participation certificate as evidence from Open University for your DofE award and to add to your CV or College application.

#### **Lancashire Book of the Year 2025**

Once again, we're inviting our top 'millionaire' readers from last year's Year 8 to become our Yr.9 judges for Lancashire Book of the Year 2025. It's an exciting County-wide school challenge where students tackle

### 8 Historical Fiction Reads

Following on from student involvement in the Young Walter Scott competition, here's a handful of suggested reads.

For younger readers:

Now or Never - Bali Rai

A retelling of a true episode from the Dunkirk evacuation.

The Roman Mysteries - Caroline Lawrence

Accessible classic series set in ancient Rome.

**Windrush Child** - a post-war story of late-colonial Britain from Benjamin Zephaniah.

**Sawbones** - Catherine Johnson, 18th Century London is the setting for this crime thriller with young Ezra, skilled in anatomy and the dissection table, as the apprentice to a highly respected surgeon.

For more advanced readers:

I, Ada - A portrayal of the young 19th Century Mathematical genius, Ada Lovelace

**The Eagle of the Ninth** - Rosemary Sutcliffe Mystery adventure set in Hadrian Britain.

HMS Ulysses - Alistair McClean's debut novel after winning a short-story competition.

**Dissolution** - CJ Sanson's brilliant murder mystery set in Reformation Britain.

# REMINDER : Year 10 and 11 Parent-Pay Revision Guide sale closes November 11th.

Core subjects:

**English**: Additional new workbook titles have been added to the suggested list this year but if you still have copies at home from previous years, they will work just fine. There is no separate Higher or Foundation levels for English guides and workbooks.

**Maths**: Unchanged. Choose between a Higher or Foundation workbook first for useful practice. Then aim for two of the Target Grade workbooks at your level (3 or 5 for Foundation, 7 or 9 for Higher). The Target Guides are very good for embedding learning. Then, if you can afford it, the Maths Revision Guide, Past Papers and Revision Card pack can be useful but not essential. Past Papers can be found online for free from Edexcel. If unsure, please speak to your Maths teacher.

**Science**: Unchanged. LSA run two separate GCSE Science Courses, either Combined (Double) Science which is just one large book, or Triple Science with one book for each of the GCSE Sciences; Biology, Chemistry & Physics. Then narrow down what you need by choosing either Foundation or Higher. Some borderline students may be unsure. If so, please discuss with your teacher. You may find the option of Flash cards useful.

If you keep the guides in very good condition, the Library will be happy to swap your title later in the year if you change between Higher & Foundation Papers.

Other subjects:

**German & French** have moved to a NEW SPEC with Pearson. The new Guides and Workbooks are not yet ready. Guides purchased from previous years are of less use as a result of the changed spec. Geography is supplying revision materials in-house from this year.

There is a **new Engineering** book this year.

No changes for the rest: For **PE**, choose either GCSE or OCR Cambridge National. **Drama**, **Computing**, **Business**, **RS** and **Food** tech just have one guide each – all unchanged from the last couple of years. No guides required for **Art** or **Music**.
