1	Macbeth EDUQAS Literature GCSE	 Students will study Macbeth in line with the EDUQAS GCSE examination. Understand the plot, key scenes, character relationships, and authorial intent within the text. Analyse character development using selective quotations. Explore mood, tone, and themes such as ambition, fate and the supernatural, tyranny, and kingship, building a strong bank of quotations for use in analysis. Write confidently about characters and themes across the whole play. Approach extracts effectively, considering how characters—and the audience—might feel, react, and respond to key events. Demonstrate understanding and analysis in both Part A and Part B exam-style responses. Apply knowledge and analytical skills in timed essay assessments, showing retention of details from the whole play 	Literature Revision/Big Write Fridays.
