The Curriculum

Curriculum

<u>Music</u> - Children will be exploring rhythmic patterns, arrangements and composition. This is taught by Mr Bilby.

<u>MFL - French</u> - This will be taught later on in the year.



Computing

Children will have access to laptops and iPads to use alongside their daily learning. They will also be learning how to 'code' and write simple programs to make things move. Also, they will be using the internet for research.

PSHE

The theme for this term is 'Being me in my world' and 'Anti-Bullying'. Alongside this we focus on how to look after our own mental wellbeing and how to identify and regulate our emotions through the Zones of Regulation approach.

How can I help my child with Maths?

- Do not say 'I am not very good at maths!'
- Help your child to learn number facts, especially their times tables.
- Help them to understand different maths vocabulary. E.g. increase, difference between etc.
- Ask your child about their maths lessons, and ask if you can help with homework and help them to check for errors.
- Help them to use the correct written methods for the 4 main calculations. (+ - x ÷)
- Use the school Calculations Policy Please see your child's class teacher for guidance. We are always happy to help!

KIRFs (Key Instant Recall Facts)

Each half term, children will be given KIRFs to practise and learn at home as well as the work in school. They include practical ideas to assist in grasping the key facts. It is important that they know these thoroughly and can recall specific facts instantly. KIRFs are designed to be a set of facts that need to be learnt thoroughly as they build on each other year on year. They must aim to know their KIRF inside out, back to front and with instant recall.

- Help them learn their spellings by writing them too.



Recording Reading The children will bring home a RWI/ levelled reading book and a love to read book.

Please make sure that regular reading is happening at home (at least three times a week). To begin with, we would like the children to read to an adult and for the adult to record this in your child's planner. As children become more competent and independent readers, we will encourage them to begin to record their own reading.

Children will have the opportunity to change their books when they need to.

If your child is currently working through the RWInc scheme, their Reading books will be linked to this and will be sent home in line with the colour group they are reading in.

We are grateful for help from parents who may wish to hear children read in school. Please let us know if you are interested and we will contact you!

Phonics and Reading

- The children will have daily Phonics lessons following the Read Write Inc Scheme.
- Children will be grouped in colours, depending on their phonetic knowledge
- The children will have been reading the Read Write Inc book during their phonics lessons. They are bringing it home to 'show off' their reading and improve fluency.
- The children will get to visit the School Library every week!
- We will check the children's planners weekly on a Monday
- Please make sure the reading folder, with planner and reading book are in school EVERY DAY.
- Staff will read with the children and this will also be recorded in children's planners.
- Please read with your child frequently at home. This could be after school or in the morning. Set a regular time that works well for your family.
- Please record this reading in your child's planner. (see following slide)

Homework

All year groups will set homework on a Tuesday and collect in homework on a Monday

It begins on Tuesday 17th September

Reading: Every child should read at least 3x each week, recorded in their planner.

<u>Maths</u>: 1x piece of Maths homework will be set once a week.

Spelling: Spellings will be set once a week and the children will be tested on them weekly.



<u>Uniform</u>

Main uniform:

- White polo shirt (plain)
- Lytchett Matravers branded jumper, cardigan or fleece
- Grey plain skirt (knee length), grey shorts or grey trousers
- Plain grey socks or tights
- A summer gingham dress (red and white check) can be worn in warmer weather
- Plain black sensible school shoes, not boots or trainers. Shoes should be all black including the soles and in good condition so that pupils are safe and comfortable.
- During the winter months all children should wear a coat for times when they are outside.

PE Kits:

- Plain black shorts, tracksuit bottoms or leggings (no sporting logos)
- Plain white T-Shirt (no sporting logos) or plain T-shirt in House colours
- Sports trainers (Please note: indoor gymnastics will be conducted in bare feet)
- Optional school branded hoodie or plain hoodie in school maroon colour (school jumper or fleece can be worn as an alternative)

General appearance:

- All hair at or below shoulder length must be tied back or braided at all times in school, but especially during P.E. and games lessons.
- Hair ties and headbands must be small and discreet.
- Hair should be off the face, clipped back and not obscuring sight.
- Hair should be no shorter than a Grade 2 cut and pupils should not wear extreme hair fashions, including dyed or streaked hair and images or lines cut into the hair.



Jewellery

- No jewellery is permitted with the exception of plain stud earrings and small analogue / digital wrist watches.
- Smart watches are not allowed in school.
- During any physical education in school, children must not wear any jewellery because of safety aspects.

Make-up and Nails

• The wearing of make-up, nail varnish or false nails is not permitted.

Further points

- All personal property should be very clearly marked with the child's name.
- Pupils in the incorrect uniform may be provided with items of clothing to change into in order to meet our school expectations.

<u>P.E.</u>

Please make sure your child wears the correct PE kit to school on a **Monday** and **Thursday**.

Please can you ensure that no earrings are worn on P.E days.

If this is not possible, please provide children with tape to cover their earrings during PE. Watches will be removed.

Attendance

- There are 190 school days in a year; this leaves 175 days to spend on family time and holidays.
- 2 It is the responsibility of parents and carers to ensure that their child(ren) attend school every day and on time.
- The school opens at: 8:45 ; registration is from 8:55 . Please arrive as close to 8:45 as possible to maximise learning opportunities for your child.
