English

This has been a very busy and exciting term for students in English. We have enhanced our students' knowledge and understanding of core texts by arranging trips and experiences to enrich their learning:

Year 9 were taken to The Bronte Museum in Haworth. The day consisted of a lecture on Charlotte Bronte, museum & grounds tour plus drama workshop on key extracts from the novel Jane Eyre. The trip provided an insight into Bronte's own childhood and how her experiences are mirrored in the novel.



Year 8 have been to visit and explore Quarry Bank Mill in Style. The day consisted of a guided tour of the working mill with a focus on child labour and living conditions in Victorian Britain. The trip provided an insight into Dickens' own observations and how his experiences are mirrored in the novel Oliver Twist.



Science



As a combined trip, the Science and Art departments took the Year 8's to the Potteries Museum in October. The following is a report from Max in Year 8 about the trip.

'We began by going upstairs to see how pathogens are spread. We did this by covering a ball in a powder that glows under ultraviolet light and holding it before we passed it to our neighbour. After everyone had a turn holding the ball, we were given ultraviolet torches. The powder would glow under the light and show us how pathogens would spread from the ball to our hands.

After, we went around the ceramics gallery and looked at some old sanitary ware such as toilets, showers and sinks. Once, we finished looking at them, we went to the cow display. This is a display of ceramic milk jugs in the shapes of cows. These were relevant to our topic of pathogens because when they were being used from the 1940s to the 1950s, they caused approximately 50,000 deaths because they were difficult to clean, thus causing pathogens to stay inside them and cause illnesses to the users. We also went and visited the old bar and pharmacy, where we saw a stuffed racing dog called 'Billy' then we went to briefly visit the Roman gallery. Following lunch, we visited the Nature gallery to make some bacteria out of clay. We got to name our bacteria and decide whether it would cause harm or not and what its symptoms would be.



We are especially proud to share that the class of 2024 achieved the best progress in Staffordshire, Cheshire and Shropshire in their GCSE Maths results. Placing us within the top 8% of schools nationally. This remarkable accomplishment highlights the dedication and hard work of both our students and staff, and we couldn't be prouder.

During the week commencing 11th November, KS3 students participated in Maths Week, engaging with online talks that explored the real-world applications of Maths. These sessions introduced them to topics such as cutting-edge technology, problem-solving in everyday life and careers in engineering and data science. Helping to connect their learning to future opportunities.

Beyond the classroom, a group of Year 11 students have been attending Further Maths classes after school with Mr Bedford, where they explore advanced topics beyond the curriculum. These sessions challenge their problem-solving skills and deepen their understanding of the subject. A special thank you to Mr Bedford for his commitment to supporting and inspiring our students.

Our work with the wider community continues as we welcome gifted and talented students from local primary schools each week to take part in challenging Maths sessions at Madeley School, led by Mr Woodfine. 

Their second project has entailed more computer based programming and notation of music using The Beatles' *Eight Days a Week* as sheet music for their first project in Logic Pro! Some pupils have been outstanding in using this software to recreate the tune and bass line for The Beatles hit song from 1964! An excellent showing from a new year group with promising future prospects in music! Well done Year 7!

Year 8

The year 8's have been hard at work learning all about The Blues and its influence on popular music. There were some stand out performances from this year group when they performed their renditions of three blues classics......Little By Little, Sweet Home Chicago and/or Hound Dog. Performers were very enthusiastic about their rendition and performed for their peers in each



of their classes. Their latest project entailed remaking the soundtrack for The Spiderman animation film. They have been given a trailer and using the software Logic Pro, have had to re-design the score and soundtrack for the whole movie trailer. There were some standouts again in this year group, but all pupils have excelled and work extremely hard on this project! Well done to all Year 8's!

This year group started the term with a bang and performed a "Pastiche" of their chosen song as a band or soloist. Again, there were some really excellent performances throughout the whole year group! The repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Bullying can be physical, verbal or psychological. It can happen face-to-face or online'.

Bullying can be:

- Physical pushing, poking, kicking, hitting, biting, pinching etc.
- Verbal name calling, sarcasm, spreading rumours, threats, teasing, belittling.
- Emotional isolating others, tormenting, hiding books, threatening gestures, ridicule, humiliation, intimidating, excluding, manipulation and coercion.
- Sexual unwanted physical contact, inappropriate touching, abusive comments, homophobic abuse, exposure to inappropriate films etc.
- Online /cyber posting on social media, sharing photos, sending nasty text messages, social exclusion
- Indirect Can include the exploitation of individuals

Children in Need




