## School Dog Risk Assessment

## Purpose

1. Dogs teach children responsibility. Having to remember to feed, provide water and show support for a dog can give children a sense of importance and satisfaction that they can't get from school or other chores. The relationship that develops can be life-changing for a child and a great support system as they themselves continue to grow and develop.
2. Dogs teach children patience. Dogs do not always do as they are told the first time!
3. Dogs teach children compassion. Just like humans, dogs feel emotion and pain. They are prone to injuries and the infirmities of age during their relatively short lives.
4. Dogs teach children about socialisation. Like most of us, dogs are social animals who enjoy and need attention and affection. By learning how to interact with a dog, children can learn how to better socialise with other children.
5. Dogs are fun. Last, but certainly not least, dogs are a lot of fun. They greet you with a wagging tail every day and can cheer you up even on your worst day.

Many people have studied dogs in attempts to decipher their behaviour, and the theories abound. However, you just have to witness the interactions between dogs and children to realise the potential for greatness. Dogs can sense when children with epilepsy are about to have a seizure, they can sense when a diabetic child's sugar is low, and they can help children with severe physical disabilities find happiness in life. With the proper training and supervision, a dog can enrich a child's life.

## Introduction

The Maharishi School Dog 'Ralph' lives with our Class Teacher, Mr Lowrie, and his family. Ralph is a very caring and well behaved dog who has the right temperament to become a real asset to Maharishi School.

Ralph is a 6 year old Cavapoo.


Ralph has public liability insurance, this means he can come into school. Ralph regularly visits the vet for check-ups. Whilst he is there they administer worm and flea treatments.

In addition to the 5 key reasons for Ralph joining us outlined above under 'purpose', we also believe he will improve the children's motivation within the school and help to improve and secure higher attendance levels.

| Use of rewards/ treats | Children and adults could be harmed if the school dog is over excited when receiving a reward/treat. Children/adult must clean their hands after handling treats | Alcohol gel/soap and water will be available to all adults and children. <br> Treats will only be given to the school dog with authorisation | Low | Reminders to the children to wash hands /use alcohol gel after handling treats. Treats to be locked away to ensure they can only be used after authorisation |

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## Area: Hygiene / Health

Reason: To ensure that pupils, staff and the school dog do not have an increased risk of illness as a result of the school dog being in school

| Walking the dog on and off the site | Children could be harmed during a walk offsite if they are not focussed. <br> Children might be harmed if they do not interact correctly when the school dog is on a walk | If the school dog is taken off site, the normal risk assessment procedures will take place. <br> No children will take the lead when the school dog goes for a walk unless authorised to do so by an accompanying adult. No children will be allowed to interact with the school dog when he is on a walk unless permission is given | Medium | Careful consideration needs to be given to the amount of time the school dog is allowed to walk around school during play/lunchtimes |
| Visits to classroom | If the school dog visits a class, and the children do not follow the correct procedure, he may become over excited | The school dog will initially only make classroom visits with Mr Lowrie. <br> The children in classrooms will follow the agreed procedure or interaction will stop | Medium | Careful consideration will be given to when the school dog can visit classrooms and be under the control of the class teacher or teaching assistant |


| Being fed | If a child tries to <br> interact when the school <br> dog is eating he may <br> respond aggressively | No child will be allowed in <br> the school dog's contained <br> area when he is eating. <br> Children may prepare the <br> food for the school dog <br> (washing their hands <br> afterwards). <br> All feeding will be supervised | Low | Reminders to the children <br> feeding the school dog to not <br> interact when he is eating |
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| School events | If the school dog is <br> overwhelmed he may <br> become aggressive or <br> boisterous | The school dog will only <br> attend school events if they <br> are appropriate and he will be <br> under the control of a <br> supervising adult | Low | Monitor the school dog's <br> reaction to school events. <br> If the school events are too <br> overwhelming, the school <br> dog might not attend school <br> on that day |
| Other dogs (on and <br> off the site) | If the school <br> dog is overwhelmed he <br> may become <br> aggressive or <br> boisterous | No other dogs will be allowed <br> on the school premises. <br> At no time will the school dog <br> be walked by a child and, as a <br> result if another dog is seen <br> this will be dealt with by the <br> supervising adult | Low | Monitor the school dog's <br> reaction when out walking |
