Key Questions: Are people always good? What does the bible say about how to live your life well? Do the 10 commandments have any meaning today?	 Children can talk about why people may act in a bad way at some point, and their reasons for doing this. Children know that the bible has passages which tell Christians how to live and that there are passages which explain people can be good and bad. To know that in Christianity there is a list called the 10 commandments which gives people guidance on how to live. Children can relate these to how they think would be a good way to live: honesty, kindness, freedom, truth, fairness. Children can recognise similarities between Christian and humanist views on codes for living.
