Privacy Notice (How we use pupil information)

Under data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about pupils.

We, The Federation of Mary Howard & St Andrew's CE (C) are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law.

The categories of pupil information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Personal information (such as name, unique pupil number, date of birth, identification documents, address, contact details and contact preferences)
- Characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility)
- Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons
- Assessment information, progress and attainment
- Medical conditions, medical diagnosis and special educational needs
- Behavioural information/logs/records including exclusion information (for further information please see our behavioural policy)
- Safeguarding information
- Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- Family setting and contact details (including any significant events in family life)
- Photographs

We may also hold data about pupils that we have received from other organisations, including other schools, local authorities and the Department of Education.

Why we collect and use this information

We use the pupil data:

- To support pupil learning
- To monitor and report on pupil progress
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- To assess the quality of our services
- Protect pupil welfare

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We only collect and use pupils' personal data when the law allows us to. Most commonly, we process it where:

- We need to comply with a legal obligation
- We need it to perform an official task in the public interest

Less commonly, we may also process pupils' personal data in situations where:

- We have obtained consent to use it in a certain way
- We need to protect the individual's vital interests (or someone else's interests)

Where we have obtained consent to use pupils' personal data, this consent can be withdrawn at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for consent, and explain how consent can be withdrawn.

Some of the reasons listed above for collecting and using pupils' personal data overlap, and there may be several grounds which justify our use of this data.

Collecting pupil information

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing pupil data

Data will not be kept for longer than necessary. The Federation is following the guidance set out in the Information and Records Management Society's toolkit for schools to determine the retention period. Unrequired data will be deleted as soon as practicable. Some educational and attendance records relating to former pupils of the school are kept for an extended period for legal purposes or archived in the public interest, scientific or historical research purposes or statistical purposes.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- schools that the pupil's attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- Our partner schools in The Federation
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- Pupil's families and representatives
- Ofsted

- Suppliers and service providers: 2 Simple, Espresso, Teachers to Parents, Class Dojo, SIMS, SH Active, Academy Photos, Walk to School, Corporate Connection, Entrust
- Financial organisations
- Central and local government
- Auditors
- Survey and research organisations
- Health and social welfare organisations

- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Police forces, courts, tribunals
- Professional bodies

Why we share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our pupils with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

conducting research or analysis

producing statistics

providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

who is requesting the data

the purpose for which it is required

the level and sensitivity of data requested: and

the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. You also have the right to:

• Object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress

- Prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- Object to decisions being taken by automated means
- In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- Claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
