Year 7 Geography Fieldwork Trip

On Tuesday 1st April, Year 7 pupils were given a fantastic opportunity to participate in geographical learning outside of the classroom, and utilise skills previously learnt in lessons to different situations and activities. This trip will allow pupils to use cross curricular skills, particularly maths and science but



also prepare pupils for their upcoming fieldwork topic in geography!

When we first arrived at Bishops Wood, we settled into our classroom for the day and was told the exciting activities that were planned for us. In the morning we began our fieldwork trip with random sampling where we were searching for different varieties of insects across a 10m x 10m grid. Pupils were very inquisitive to understand the names of creatures and to understand their different habitats.





After lunch, we went to a different area of the woods to trial orienteering using six-figure grid references. Pupils were utilising their map skills to work their way through the woods using landmarks for navigation. At each point, pupils were understanding the effects of climate change on different areas of the world and different species across the globe.

We concluded our day back in the classroom and consolidated learning in preparation for geography lessons to come.



Pupils highlighted outstanding teamwork throughout the day, they were working with staff and pupils from other year 7 groups and were able to share responsibilities between themselves. Moreover, pupils were respectful to our leader at Bishops Wood, asking enlightening and deep thought provoking questions to enrich our understanding and pupils were eager to

learn more! Many pupils were resilient in conquering fears today, spiders, the outdoors, reading aloud in groups and touching many insects! All pupils highlighted true Elmwood values and should be very proud of themselves for their conduct and behaviour, definitely a credit to Elmwood School!

Thank you to the wonderful staff that accompanied the trip and ensured all pupils were enjoying the day out!

The summer termly meeting of the governing body is on Thursday 5th June when Carli will be warmly welcomed by the team.



Outdoor Learning at Kingswood Charity Trust Centre

Our Year 8 pupils swapped the classroom for the countryside as they took part in an outdoor education trip to the Kingswood Charity Trust Centre in Shropshire. The visit was packed with activities that encouraged teamwork and problem-solving.



The day began with pond dipping. Armed with nets and trays the pupils explored the Centre's pond and discovered ten newts, along with other pond life. The blindfold course brought lots of laughter as pupils guided each other



Then was the animal care session, where pupils got the chance to meet and care for a variety of friendly animals, including rabbits and guinea pigs. This was most likely the highlight of the day for most of our children.

Throughout the day, the pupils worked together brilliantly, supporting one another and making the most of every moment. It was a fantastic opportunity to learn new skills and build friendships. I for one really relished the opportunity to work with the year 8s out of the traditional classroom environment. My personal highlight was one of our pupils saying how it was one of the best outdoor trips they've been on in the school.



Another highlight of the day was the visit to the Anderson air raid shelter, where pupils learned about World War II history. They experienced what it was like to take shelter during air raids, gaining valuable insights into the lives of people during the war. This immersive experience helped pupils appreciate the significance of historical events and the resilience of those who lived through them.
