



Favourite Holiday? My favourite holiday so far has been to Marmaris, Turkey.


Tell us something that people would be surprised to hear? In my free time I do people's nails and occasionally me and my family go to an RAC track with our bikes.





After lunch, pupils had the opportunity to explore a mini cave, and there was even a large ball pit! A couple of pupils showed great resilience during this activity as they had never been caving before, there was great care and teamwork shown by all pupils in helping others, definitely living into the Elmwood Values! Next, pupils spoke to Army



officers and had the opportunity to sit in army vehicles, finally pupils watched a horse parade before heading home.







## Year 7 Geography Trip

On Monday 16th June, Year 7 pupils were given a fantastic opportunity to participate in geographical learning outside of the classroom, and utilise skills previously learnt in lessons to different situations and activities. This trip will allow pupils to use cross

curricular skills and retrieval of knowledge of ecosystems, different habitats and biomes in Africa at the Monkey Forest at Trentham Gardens!

In the morning, we began our trip with our wonderful guided learning about the species of monkeys and their original location, in North Africa, more specifically Morrocco and Algeria. As we walked around the forest there were approximately 140 monkeys to be seen in their habitats. Monkeys were grooming each other, play fighting and communicating between each other. After exploring and spotting many monkeys climbing and swinging through the trees, we stopped for some delicious lunch. Pupils were communicating

and chatting about the cute sights they had seen in the forest! To finish off the day pupils played on the park, which was themed to mimic primate behaviour. At each point, pupils were understanding the varieties of monkeys species and their natural behaviour and how evolution has impacted the growth of their tails.



Pupils highlighted outstanding teamwork throughout the day, they were working with staff and pupils from other year 7 groups. Moreover, pupils were respectful to our leader at the Monkey Forest, asking enlightening and deep thought-provoking questions to enrich our understanding with pupils eager to learn more! Many pupils were resilient in conquering fears today! All pupils highlighted true Elmwood values and should be very proud of themselves for their conduct and behaviour, definitely a credit to Elmwood School!
