



JUMPXTREME TRIP





The camaraderie among the staff is something special; we all pull together to support each other, creating a warm and collaborative environment that benefits our pupils. I wanted to take a moment to express my heartfelt appreciation for the unwavering support that our Senior Leadership Team (SLT) extends to both staff and pupils. Whether it's navigating work-related challenges or dealing with personal issues, SLT are always there to offer their guidance and assistance. Their commitment to fostering a supportive and inclusive environment is truly commendable. They understand that our well-being is paramount, and they go above and beyond to ensure that everyone feels valued and heard. From providing professional development opportunities, to offering a listening ear during tough times, the SLT's dedication to our community is evident in everything they do. Their open-door policy encourages open communication, making it easier for us to seek help and share our concerns without hesitation.




Thank you to not just Ryan, Caitlin, and Daniel but to those pupils who also participated in the regional competitions this year. We look forward to many more competitions next academic year.

THEATRE VISIT

Each day the young people read a section of a book as a class. Pig Heart Boy by Malorie Blackman has been a key text for some year groups this year.

The book is a powerful story about friendship, loyalty and family around this topical and controversial issue. 'That's all I ever did - watch and listen. I was always a spectator, never a participant. I didn't call that living. I was alive - but that was all.' Cameron is thirteen, and all he wants is a 'normal' life - friends, swimming, school, family. But his life is far from normal. Not every thirteen-year-old desperately needs a new heart because theirs doesn't work properly. Finally, one doctor offers hope. Cameron could - if he and his parents agree - take part in a radical and controversial procedure involving the transplant of a pig's heart into his human body. It's risky, and it's never been done before . . . While Cameron comes to terms with the idea, he finds the world around him is much less accepting. 'But surely everyone will understand that it's better to have a pig's heart that works than a human heart that doesn't - won't they . . .?'

A small group from Key stage 4 and Year 9 had the opportunity to watch the stage version of the book at the Grand Theatre in Wolverhampton. The production was edgy, but connected well with the learners.
