## Year 6 and 7 Workshop

On Wednesday May 25th, all year 6 and 7 children will be receiving an assembly/workshop delivered by the St. Giles Trust. These sessions have been funded by the Hampshire Police and will be led by a trained professional with lived experience of the criminal justice system to de-glamorise gang involvement and expose the harsh realities of crime and violence (for year 7). For year 6, these sessions will focus on weapons awareness, gangs and the importance of being a good citizen. The sessions will aim to raise awareness about the dangers of gang culture and debunking its perceived 'glorified' lifestyle including risks of drug distribution and County Lines.







Year 2 have had a busy week welcoming two new children to our classes. It has been lovely for the children to demonstrate the expectations of Mayfield to new children. In English we have been creating our own story about Little Red Riding Hood being a villain and doing unpleasant things in the woods or to Grandma - the children have enjoyed thinking of lots of nasty things! Some children have written a story from the Wolf's point of view and tried to make him sweet and kind. We celebrated all their efforts with a picnic lunch today. In Maths we have introduced the language clockwise and anticlockwise turns and the difference between a quarter turn and a half turn. We have started a plant investigation in school to see what a plant needs to grow. Please help your child to take care of their sunflower in the pots. We have set the children a challenge of who's sunflower can grow the highest.

This week, year 3 have been getting ready to write our own story based on An Alien in the Jam Factory. We have created our own main characters and settings. We have also looked at using speech marks to punctuate direct speech. Next week we are looking forward to our Roman Dress-Up Day on Wednesday.







This week Year 4 have really enjoyed making electrical circuits. They investigated conductors and insulators by adding them to the circuits and seeing if they would light up. This week, Year 5 have enjoyed developing their collage skills by selecting different textures to represent different parts of their beast. They have loved activities like finger painting, an enterprise project, planning their own recipe and computing!
