A Protecting my child from harm

One form of potential harm is child sexual exploitation. This is a sensitive topic and hard for parents/carers to think about. It is powerful for parents/carers to know what it is and recognise what are the possible signs and where to seek help.

Child sexual exploitation (CSE) is a form of sexual, emotional and physical abuse of children.

It can be difficult to recognise the warning signs of child sexual exploitation, as they are similar to the challenges that all parents of adolescent children face.

Child sexual exploitation can be defined in the following terms:

- A person under 18 is sexually exploited when they are coerced into sexual activities by one or more person(s) who have deliberately targeted their youth in order to exercise power over them.
- The process often involves a stage of 'grooming', in which the child might receive something (such as a mobile phone, clothes, drugs or alcohol, attention or affection) prior to, or as a result of, performing sexual activities, or having sexual activities performed on them.
- Child sexual exploitation may occur through the use of technology without the child's consent or immediate recognition; for example through being persuaded to post sexual images online or via mobile phone.
- Child sexual exploitation is often conducted with actual violence or the threat of violence. This may be threats towards the child, or her or his family and may prevent the child from disclosing the abuse, or exiting the cycle of exploitation. Indeed, the child may be so confused by the process, that they do not perceive any abuse at all.

Child sexual exploitation happens when a child has been persuaded that sexual activity is a 'normal' part of adult life.

Adolescence is a time of experimentation and can be a particularly challenging period for parents and their children. Most parents understand the value of young people learning about themselves through new experiences, but also want to protect their child from harm.

Here are some of the signs, that together could indicate your child might be at risk of being sexually exploited.

- Frequently going missing from home or school
- New friends or relationships that are the central focus of the child's life
- Being secretive
- Physical signs of abuse
- Changes in behaviour such as increased anxiety or distress
- unexplained absences from home or school
- Anxiety or urgency around mobile phone use
- Unexplained money, phone or clothes etc
- Drug or alcohol use
- Unexplained injuries or marks

Exploiters of child sexual exploitation are both skilled and strategic; they aim to drive a wedge between parents and their child, closing down the normal channels of communication and breaking the emotional bond.



FUEL programme – Easter 2025

We are delighted that the Department for Education has confirmed funding for the FUEL programme to run at Easter, Summer and Christmas in 2025. The programme is funded to provide activities and meals free of charge for children who are eligible for benefit related Free School Meals.

All families who have previously booked onto the programme will be notified directly when booking is open. We would love to support more children in 2025 and welcome your support with encouraging families to book places on activities.

Places can also be requested for children who are refugees, are in care, are young carers or who may be vulnerable during the school holidays. The number of places available for these children are limited but we do our best to support as many as we can.
