#### **Uniform**

It's been really lovely to see students wearing their uniform with pride again this term. However, we have noticed over the past couple of weeks that standards have started to slip and a number of students are arriving at school without the correct uniform; missing ties, jumpers or wearing trainers. Whilst we understand that there are some circumstances where this can't be helped and notes provided by parents, there have been several occasions where there have been no reasons given. Whilst the weather has improved, the uniform expectations remain the same. Students are required to wear full uniform, including jumpers.

You may be aware that we do have a uniform store on school site, which stocks all uniform items in a large variety of sizes; some of this is brand new and never worn. If a student arrives at school without the correct uniform, they will be asked by staff to come to the uniform store first thing in the morning and borrow items to rectify this, swapping their mobile phone which will then be returned at the end of the day when they bring back the borrowed item. Students who do not borrow clothing / footwear will need to sit in isolation until the correct uniform is brought in to school for them.




# **Discovery Centre Clubs**



Memphis Design inspired clocks: Using 2D design (CAD) to create their own clock design, acrylic is then laser engraved and cut (CAM) which is then assembled.





#### **Sextortion**

This week's publicity around safeguarding in the national press is around sextortion which is connected to previous topics we have shared. The reported statistics are of concern and the changing dynamic of online crimes towards boys also needs discussion. Research shows that when boys are subjected to online abuse involving sexuality or nudes they are less likely to tell their parents or their friends. This means that together we need to work even harder with boys to raise the profile of this danger and promote sharing to enable them to help themselves and for us as a community working together to protect our young men.

Reading this article will give you an insight into the national press this week:

<u>National Crime Agency launches online campaign to tackle 'sextortion' among young teenage boys - National Crime Agency</u>

'Sextortion' is a type of online blackmail. It's when criminals threaten to share sexual pictures, videos, or information about you unless you pay money or do something else you don't want to.

There is a rise in cases involving 11-13 year olds and Scotland recently revealed a significant case involving an 8 year old. There is a rise of 'gangs' and individuals posing as young men and women and forming online relationships with young people to later extort money or criminal activities from them.


There are lots of ways to help young people to report such offences but the most important first step is to remove the stigma of sharing the experience with others so that help and support and action can occur.
