Golden Mile Leaderboard as at the start of the Spring Term, 2024. 18 local schools are involved in the Golden Mile this year and our pupils have already clocked up an amazing **17,131 miles this academic year** that is 70% of the way around the world!!

Run miles per school so far:

- 1st Milverton Community Primary School 2933 miles
- 2nd Two Moors Primary School, Tiverton 2867 miles
- 3rd Minerva Primary School 1416 miles
- 4th Herne View Primary School—1292

One a miles per pupil basis

- 1st Milverton Community Primary School- 13.27 miles per pupil
- 2nd St John's Catholic Primary School 12.31 miles per pupil
- 3rd Minerva Primary School 11.90 miles per pupil
- 4th Two Moors Primary School—8.35 per pupil

The second wristband was given to Rufus who clearly demonstrated confidence and understanding of the sport by the end of the lesson.
