Class 2 had a lovely morning at Forest School this week. Despite the threat of wet and windy weather, they actually managed to have a mostly dry morning. The children completed their art unit on printing by creating wings for their bugs using plants from the ground. As part of the science unit of work, they collected weather data for Mr Wedderkopp to add to his chart. They explored the school grounds and played amongst the trees on various little projects. To finish the session, the children enjoyed toasting marshmallows on the fire and drinking hot chocolate. Thank you to Miss Davey for leading the session. *Mrs McDonagh*

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Class 5 have had great fun making parachutes. We watched a video of the Apollo 15 Splashdown and saw the parachute in action. It held the Endeavour module with the Apollo 15 crew inside on the 7th August, 1971. We considered the forces acting on their parachute and how this would be the same for the forces acting on our parachutes. We have been learning about the different types of variables; the independent variable is the one thing that we change in our experiment. The dependent variable means the thing we are measuring (in this case it was the time the parachute took to fall), and lastly, the control variables which are the things that we keep the same; in this case the amount of the blu tack (which was 5g) and the drop of 2 metres. There were also other control variables and we had to make sure they stayed the same to make it a fair test. We planned 4 different parachute investigations: two groups were investigating materials, two groups were testing the lengths of the strings, two groups were changing the size of the parachute and the two groups were changing the shape of the parachute. In conclusion, we found out that the bin bag was the best material compared to the fabric and the sugar paper. The best length of string was 47cm and the best size for the parachute was 6 x 20cm. All of these factors would make the 'perfect' parachute because it was the most successful that would fall at a slower velocity and be controlled.
