We looked at the different parts of the International Space Station (I.S.S) and how far it had to be away from the Earth to not get caught in the gravitational pull (it has to be 250 miles away). We looked at how many different galaxies there were and watched a film about them and there were absolutely loads, it was amazing! Finally, we ended with a short clip about how people might live on

The Year 4 Class took part in a soft-archery lesson for their enrichment session. The group was first split into 6 teams and we explained the safety rules and why we follow these procedures. We then demonstrated the correct bow and arrow shooting techniques, how to hold a bow correctly, the stance and release of the arrow. We started off with a practice session where the children tried shooting at the target. We then moved on to games such as 'completing the jigsaw': each target was split into 5 sections and each team had to collect all 5 pieces to win the game! We then moved on to 'baking a cake' by hitting different colours which resemble a cake but if they hit the black area their cake was burnt and they had to start again! We then played a team/individual competition which meant each pupil had 3 arrows and they had to achieve the highest score and a team score. The highest scoring individuals

from each team went into a 'bow off' to determine our 'Master Archer' of the day. Aubrey took this crown with 14 points! Anna top scored in the games with 16 points. Atticus and Bluebell also performed very well in all the games. House points were awarded this week not wristbands. All the children were really engaged and were very enthusiastic to shoot arrows. They all concentrated and were well-behaved. Mrs Bray was also a star archer, she couldn't resist having a go herself!





Before half term, Reception pupils took part in a soft archery enrichment . Most of the children had never taken part in archery before and they really surprised both of the sports coaches with their abilities. Archery is quite a tricky sport to master at a very young age as it in-

volves posture, balance and technique all having to come together at the right time to release the arrow towards the target. However, as always, the children were keen to be involved, to embrace a new challenge and they demonstrated great attitudes throughout the lesson. Our wristband winners were Cora, Sonny and Jasmine for all

showing competence in mastering a new sport and having a great attitude. Two other children stood out, Otto and Nelly: even though they were both unsure and apprehensive of this new sport, let alone succeeding, they both shone with their ability to shoot an arrow at a target and they both progressed notably. *Miss B* 

In Class 3, children didn't let the downpours dampen their spirits at Forest School this week. The class took part in their own water cycle by playing the part of a droplet on its journey from condensation all the way through the cycle back to the beginning. This gave children the perfect opportunity to warm up on their journey around the playground and field. After this, children played a game of '1, 2, 3' before taking part in a variety of activities such as den making, using the mud kitchen, building bug homes and toasting
