

On Thursday 3rd March Class 5 went to Kingsmead for a sports festival. Sadly, we could not go outside because it was raining so we had to go inside for our sports festival. The first game we played was called the garden game. You had to pick up the equipment and then throw the different pieces to the opposite side. This week, Class 5 have been learning about Make Do and Mend. We had already learnt about food rationing but we now know that the textiles, materials and goods, like petrol, were also rationed during WW2. Rationing of materials began 1st June, 1941. This is because the supplies were limited as lots of uniforms had to be made and also because the transportation of supplies and importing of materials from other countries was made difficult. We learned that people had to make do with the things that they had rather than buying new and then had to re-use and repair old items. For our make do and mend project, we had to use an old t-shirt. We read our design brief and understood what features it should include and then started to do some market research to see the designs of drawstring bags which we are going to make. We then designed our bags by choosing different features from the research models and made sure our designs had accurate measurements. We chose our handmade bags to have drawstrings on both sides so that we could tighten our bags. First, we used a sewing machine to sew across the top of our t-shirt. This is the bottom of our bag. Then we learnt and practised lots of different stitches. The stitches we learnt were: running stitch, back stitch, double running stitch, chain stain stitch and cross stitch. We used these different stitches to create a pattern on the pocket of our bag. The pocket was made of felt and we could choose the size and design. Finally, Miss Brown showed us a variation of blanket stitch and we sewed our pockets onto the front of our bags. Our next job will be to measure the length of our bags and do some maths calculations to work out how much cord we need for our drawstrings. We will then thread the cord through the seam of our



t-shirts, which is the top of our bags, and then we have a finished bag. Look out in the next Friday Flyer for our finished bags. We found it really exciting!
