Dear Parents and Carers,

Cases of Covid-19 have been rising to record levels in Taunton Deane and Wellington during this month, and we have seen the impact of this in our school too, so we still need to remain cautious in order to keep our school open for the children. Added to this, there have been many reports recently of multiple positive Lateral Flow tests (LFD) that don't translate into positive PCR tests amongst our school community. This has hit the national news and has been a problem across Somerset; the government is investigating. Until we have a definitive answer, Public Health England have issued the following advice:

"If a pupil or staff member has been in close contact with a positive case (such as a household member) or has displayed Covid-19 symptoms and has tested positive on an LFD (but subsequently tested negative on a PCR), they are treated as potentially infectious. We recommend they isolate and remain out of the setting, for 10 days."

This month has been a difficult one for us here, not least in terms of staffing, and we would be extremely grateful if you could follow this advice to help us keep our school community as healthy as possible. As a result of this we have taken the decision to hold next month's Parents' Evenings remotely again. More details will follow soon. Thank you. Mr R Stead

Class 1 had the perfect Autumnal morning for Forest School this week, what luck! We were all excited to get out and get stuck into some forest school activities with Mr Wedderkopp. We had plenty of time to play their old favourite games and chat around the fire pit at the end with our hot chocolate. This week's session also provided us with rich learning opportunities which introduced our new science topic perfectly as well as linking into our Gruffalo work in English.

Our Science is focusing on habitats and this was the perfect opportunity to search for microhabitats around the school grounds, it's amazing what can be found amongst leaf litter and at the bottom of a tree. This inspired some of the children to make a bug hotel in the hope that some small creatures such as woodlice might make this their new home, whilst other children wanted to collect animal footprints on paper to see which animals were visiting the forest school area. In the classroom we were able to talk about why these places made had the perfect conditions for these creatures and we introduced new vocabulary such as 'predators' and 'camouflage'. We also collected and photographed objects to categorise them into: alive; dead and never alive. This sparked some in-

teresting discussions amongst the children. We love the curiosity and energy Class 1! We can't wait to do it all again next term! Mrs MacCormick
