It was Class 6's turn for Forest School this week. We started off by sitting around the fire, talking about the changes of Autumn and took a moment to listen to the sounds of nature. Mr Wedderkopp introduced us to a new game called Mr McGregor's Garden. Some of us were Mr McGregor's farmers and the rest were rabbits, hopping around the 'garden'. Every time Mr Wedderkopp shouted "Ooh -arrgh!" the rabbits had to hop to their burrows (hula-hoops) before the farmers caught them. After break time, we learnt how to measure our adopted trees. To do this, we got a stick from the woods that was the length of one of arms and held it straight with the tip of the stick in line with the top of the tree. We then walked towards the tree trunk in metre steps and how many you took determined how the tall the tree was. For example, Charlie's tree was 8.5 metres and Izzie's sapling was a tiny 45 centimetres! Afterwards, we made fact-files and information sheets, measuring and documenting the circumference of the tree trunk and the grid reference on our maps. We also identified the species of our



tree (Charlie's was a wild cherry and Izzie's was a horse chestnut). It was sadly time to wrap things up for the morning, so we headed back to the fire circle for roast fudge and marshmallows. Thank you, Mr Wedderkopp for your amazing teaching, as always.


footwork skills, lunges and blocks. Well done, Class 2!
