All schools in Blackpool have had a behaviour review this term and there were many positives from the one at Montgomery. The school was described as having "a calm and purposeful atmosphere where children are well-ordered, move around school calmly and clearly respond well to the high expectations the school has adopted. The leadership team are committed to the welfare of pupils and are committed to a learning culture to improve practice."

We continue to invest in the school learning environment with a complete refurbishment of the Science classrooms and prep rooms. The programme will be finished before Christmas giving us 9 completely new classrooms with new décor, furniture and specialist equipment.

After scooping prizes for Sports Team and Secondary Student in the previous year, we are delighted to announce that a Year 11 student won the Blackpool Gazette Scientist of the Year. Adrian has matured into a truly fantastic scientist at Montgomery and undoubtedly has a big future ahead of him in the science and engineering sector. At the end of Year 10, he took both his Chemistry and Biology GCSEs a year earlier than scheduled. He achieved a level 8 in Chemistry and a level 9 in Biology. Well done Adrian!

On December 22nd we hosted our Diamond 60th Anniversary with an evening of celebration and nostalgia, as we looked back over six decades the school serving our local community. In attendance were over 200 ex-students and staff together with current members of our Montgomery family. They included previous headteacher Paul Moss, ex-student the Worshipful Mayor Amy Cross, four ex-students who heard Field Marshall Montgomery deliver his speech at the official opening of the school 60 years ago.

We have also made great strides in completing the implementation of our Teaching and Learning model EXCEL with teaching staff currently working on developing modelling and moving on to explanations next term. Much work has been going on this year on developing our curriculum and we have decided to move back to a three-year KS3 for current year 7 and 8 students.

There too many positive stories regarding the successes of the Montgomery Family to list all of them here, such as our continued dominance in the sporting arena. I am totally in awe of our fantastic staff, great students and their very supportive parents or carers.

In addition to this work the ambassadors also joined the National Anti Bullying event hosted at the village hotel, Blackpool by the Diana Award Team. The students presented and showcased their thoughts and learning from the day in front of an audience of 300+. We have recently trained an additional 30 students and look forward to more students signing up to become ambassadors for the school.

# **Anti-bully** mark given to school

A Bispham school have won the first bronze charter mark for anti-bullying, after teaming up on a campaign with HeadStart Blackpool.

Montgomery Academy was approached by National Lottery-funded HeadStart to pilot #BlackpoolBeatingBul-lying, which was created by youngsters who voted on the top issues they felt needed to be tackled.

The All Hallows Road school was chosen because some of the children who recognised bullying as an issue go there, and because it was "approachable and open".

Headteacher Liz Cumming said: "Through the development of the charter mark, our anti-bullying ambassadors have worked as a team to collectively come up with a list of action points for the school to move forward and develop. "This had been through

blies throughout the year." The char-

ter mark had helped to positively change the culture of the school, and it continues to draft further ideas, Mrs Cumming said.

The charter mark is the first to be co-produced be-

tween HeadStart Blackpool and youngsters in the town, with the ultimate aim of making sure all resort schools are equipped with the tools and knowledge to stop bullying. The charter mark has

three tiers - bronze, silver and gold -Montgomer

and incorporates factors likehaving the anti-bullying policy on show in both an accessible and easy to read place. HeadStart said:

"The campaign has enabled young people and adults to come together and estab-

lish a practical, achievable and purposeful solution to how we address bullying in our high schools in Black pool. The impact on the individuals involved in developments has been fascinating, to see them grow in confidence and agency, with real determination to bring about change.

"Liz Cumming and Montgomery Academy have been fantastic partners in rolling out the charter mark. There's a real sense of unity in tackling this issue and the charter mark has proven the ideal vehicle to do so."

Due to the campaign's success, other Blackpool schools have now approached Head-Start to take part.








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The main focus of our LEGO®-Based Education programme, Mr Byrne writes, is on designing, constructing and programming a LEGO Mindstorms robot.





Year 10 students have been looking at movement this term and have initially explored the dark photos created by a young American photographer called Francesca Woodman, best known for her black and white pictures featuring herself, many of her photographs show her, blurred, merging with her surroundings, or with her face obscured. From this initial exploration students explored shutter speeds to create their own ghostly like photos, which then resulted in exploring the bright lights of Blackpool on an evening photography shoot, students explored long exposure down central pier, along the promenade and finishing in front of Blackpool tower. Students were also lucky enough to see celebrity Ricky Tomlinson recording part of a new tv show on the comedy carpet turning on Blackpool Tower lights!

To then develop their ideas further students have visited Blackpool 6th form colleges' photography department to experiment with portrait photos. Students experimented with lighting, flash, long exposure and macro photography to use as part of their portrait photography. Some students have used these as part of their independent work around double exposure

Students in year 9 have been working through their knowledge and skills unit, putting their photography skills to use at Stanley park earlier this year.

We have also started the first coursework topic 'food photography' and from the first shoot have some amazing autumnal photos! Well done year 9!


# (O) TH ANNIVERSARY






# MONTGOMERY ACADEMY NEXT ANNUAL SHOW IS..... HIGH SCHOOL MUSICAL

# **ClassCharts** for Parents

At Montgomery Academy we have chosen to use an application called ClassCharts. This is to help teachers, students and parents/carers keep track of student's achievements, access behaviour reports, view lesson attendance, view assigned homework tasks and to record whether these have been completed.

We believe in working closely with parents and one of the key benefits of using ClassCharts is that we are able to securely share your child(s) achievement and behaviour report with you, keeping you up to date in real-time. We are still keeping the app called Expressions which allows free messages to be sent back and forth between families and the school. Should you need login details for Expressions please do contact school.

Since introducing ClassCharts to Montgomery in September we are pleased to announce the huge number of parents and students that have downloaded the app and are checking this on a daily basis. Over 600 students have now had a parent download the app and over 800 students have downloaded the relevant student app.

### Homework

We believe this is having a positive impact with the completion rate of homework's as students and can now see their homework's as listed by their teacher.

To see homework select the homework tab from within the app. Selecting this tab will display a list of homework tasks which your child has been assigned to. To change the date range for displayed homework tasks, click on the Date button to select from the available presets or create your own custom date range. To display tasks in the order they were set, click on the Issue Date button.

To display tasks in the order they are expected to be handed in, click on the Due date button.

To view a homework task in more detail, click on the expand icon in the bottom right hand corner of the homework tile. A popup will appear that contains the a description of the homework task, the estimated completion time and any links or attachments that may have been included.

### Attendance

By selecting the attendance tab will present you with a table of your child's attendance data for the past31 days. By default, the displayed date range is 31 days. To view a different range of behaviour data, click on the Date button to select from the available presets or create your own custom date range.

was awarded, when it was awarded, who awarded the behaviour, the lesson the behaviour was awarded in, and how many points the award is worth.
