Thank you to all those who attended for your very positive comments about what we are doing right and your constructive advice on how we can improve further.

We are working hard with parents to raise expectations in terms of attendance. This year, so far, our overall attendance is 94.4% yet we are aiming for over 95% as well as looking to reduce the number of students whose attendance is below 90%. Thank you to the parents who avoid making appointments in school time and ensure holidays are taken outside of term time.

A major piece of news is that as part of the rebranding of the school and as we approach our 60th anniversary next year, we have launched a slogan, "Inspiring



Excellence Together". Our teaching and learning vision, EXCEL, started here. We are proud to announce that we have also changed the school name and from January 2019 our school will become "Montgomery Academy". For me, this signifies our intentions of becoming an academy, where academic both excellence together and personal development go hand in hand. Please do not worry about the implications for our uniform; changes to our logo and name on uniform will be introduced with the new Year 7 in August and as existing uniform is replaced.

Our Open Evening for Years 5&6 back in September was extremely well attended and feedback from perspective parents was superb, with many coming to visit us during the school day before they made their final decision. We also have had many new students joining other year groups this term from local schools, as our popularity in the community and with feeder primaries continues to rise. Many parents have heard the positive vibe about Montgomery and, when they visit, believe us in our aim to Inspire Excellence Together.

Autumn Actionin 2018-2019

The Science department at Montgomery continues to go from strength to strength and has had a vibrant start to this academic year. We continue to enrich the learning experience of our students by offering as many extracurricular activities, trips and practical learning activities as possible within our challenging curriculum. The aim is to motivate and inspire our students to share our passion for Science and build an inclusive team ethos in the department; a culture that we believe will allow our students to reach their full potential. As well as our popular and established STEM and Year 7 Science Clubs, we have this year started a Space Club and a STEM Creative Arts Club. We have continued our collaborations with the Institute of Physics, the Ogden Trust and the Royal Society of Chemistry and have also invested time in a Science based online learning program called Seneca. Early indications are that this program could have a really positive impact on improving both independent study skills and overall GCSE outcomes, something we are really excited about!

The Brilliant Club

Building on a successful collaboration last year, 'The Brilliant Club' has started again this term with a new cohort of Year 10 students. During this half term, Mr Mason and Miss Healey accompanied the students to the University of Liverpool for their first introductory session. To complete this course, students have to attend 6 tutorials with a PhD tutor and after this they have to complete a 3000-word assignment on what they have learnt. The purpose of this particular trip to Liverpool University was to experience what university life is like and to introduce this prestigious programme to our students. Our students also had the chance to meet university undergraduates and staff and had a tour of the facilities, with the hope of inspiring the students to apply to study at university in the future. Huge congratulations to all students that have embarked on this tough but extremely rewarding programme, well done!



Led by Miss Healey, our excited Year 7 students started the year with a 'What's in your tray' challenge competition and have also made a variety of slimes and completed a Halloween themed circus of science activities. As we have moved towards the festive season, the activities have been Christmas themed. This has included designing vehicles to complete in Rudolph races, making salt solution snow scenes, and also making soaps and gift boxes. The ultimate challenge was our 'help the elf of the shelf-sledging adventure' competition. In this challenge, students had to build a sledge for Ernie the Elf and rescue him from the shelf. Well done to all students who have been involved, we cannot wait for next year already.

This club soared into action in October under the experienced leadership of Mrs Bach. With tasks such as designing and firing air rockets down the science corridor, students have engaged with a variety of space based science activities. Not only have students experimented with effervescent vitamin C tablets and learnt about the acidic nature of carbon dioxide, they have tested for hydrogen gas, made space slime and investigated the properties of ultra violet light using UV beads. The most recent challenge was to design and make space suits out of different materials for action men models. When tested in a vacuum to replicate space, the student space suits performed brilliantly, well done space team!

Year 8 STEM Creative Art Club

The newest club this year is the Year 8 STEM Creative Arts club, led by Miss Healey. The students in this club started off by making their own paper. To do this they first had to build deckle and moulds to make the paper with. Once made, students tested the strength of their handmade paper by adding weights to it, to see how much it could hold before tearing. For bonfire night, the group studied and tested the chemistry of making fireworks which was explosive fun. Students have more recently used leaves that have fallen off the trees around the school campus to make unique leaf bowls. Finally, on the run up to Christmas the club have used melted wax crayons to create unique baubles, developed Maths skills to draw perfect stars and used their handprints to make a special Christmas wreath.



Seneca in Science & Google Classroom

Initially pioneered by Russ Bradshaw, we have launched an exciting and innovative online Science learning programme called Seneca alongside a collaborative social cloud for learning in form of Google Classroom. Seneca is an intelligent learning programme that uses multiple choice micro-quizzes to build knowledge, boost confidence and reduce exam stress. Content is broken down into bite-size chunks and tailored to each user as the platform works out what






Science Trip to Paris





REDISCOVER LIVE PROJECT 13th November 2018

Lloyds Banking Group at Blackpool 6th Form College

In November, Montgomery School had the pleasure of taking a group of Year 8 pupils to spend the day at Blackpool Sixth to take part in the Rediscover Live project hosted by Lloyds Banking Group.

The overall theme for the day was designed to inspire and to enable our pupils to be ready to start designing their digital futures. The pupils who attended worked as part of a team to complete a challenge that was based around creating ideas and designing a new digital product that they could use in school. They had to create their own digital business complete with a proposal, marketing plan and budget. The pupils had the exciting opportunity to gain expert knowledge and experience form local businesses and tech partners.

Montgomery pupils had the innovative idea of creating a social media site for pupils and teachers in their school which they would regularly check for such things as announcements, homework and even the school dinner menu. Unfortunately, their idea didn't make it to first prize however their idea came a competitive third overall on the day. A great day was had all round and the pupils even got to meet the Mayor of Blackpool.

To help mark the centenary of the end of World War One this November, a group of year eight students helped to design a new war memorial plaque. The plaque was displayed during the memorial service that took place on Friday 9th November and will now be displayed in school permanently. The design incorporated the ceramic poppy the school had received

from the 'Wave and Weeping Window' art installation at the Tower of London.

Students also created designs to be considered for the memorial garden which will be revamped in the Spring. The students had to consider a variety of factors, such as tone, durability, health and safety and overall aesthetics to ensure the design was appropriate for its location outside.



GCSE PHOTOGRAPHY

This terms photography groups have been responded to a range of topics this term. The new Year 9 cohort have been learning how to use the settings on their digital cameras. Students in year 9 have been capturing photos using macro and movement settings whist also learning how to edit their photos using photoshop. Students have also learnt how to read photos and are now fluent in discussing the camera settings used to take a photo and are able to discuss what compositions and what formal elements of art they can see in a photograph. Here are some of the fantastic images that students have created over the past 3 months! Students have made a fantastic start on their course!

Year 10 students have been working their Weird and Wonderful topic using Lego figures and a style call 'Logography' as their starting point. Students have created some fantastic images using a range of camera settings exploring depth of field and shutter speed to capture a blurred background and movement in their photos. As a group we have taken photos around Bispham village and have visited Stanley Park to capture photos. As a reward for those students who are on track in the subject students are visiting Manchester and spending the day taking photos around the city completing a range of tasks in the last week of term to help support their coursework, whilst also enjoying the Christmas Markets and the city centre.

Year 11's have been completing their Britishness topic, as a group we have visited Blackpool illuminations and completed a night shoot experimenting with long shutter speeds, the results were fantastic. In November Mr Hegarty also took a group of year 11's to Manchester for the day accompanied by Blackpool 6th form college. Students completed a Photography walk around the city, meandering through the Christmas Markets and through the cities Northern Quarter and concluding the visit at Manchester Art Gallery looking at the Martin Parr exhibition which showcased his photography work from around Manchester in the 80's.



Sleepover



If your child is invited to a sleepover you will want them to be safe - both in general and in the event of a fire. So before you agree here are some things that might help.

Check that your child:

Is normally woken by and recognises the sound of a smoke alarm

If they don't, or they have a hearing impairment or other disability, tell the sleepover parents so that someone must wake them and/or help them in

- Knows what to do if they hear a smoke alarm go off
- Knows not to hide from fire
- Knows how to raise the alarm
- Is happy to ask about the escape plan of the place they are going to
- · Will tell you if they don't feel safe

If you are in any doubt:

Reverse the sleepover and invite the friend to your home instead

And remember to:

Go through your fire plan with any guests you have staying


Check that:

- There will be a responsible adult present at all times in the property
- There is a working smoke alarm.

Some of these questions may be uncomfortable to ask but why not look at it this way; you wouldn't dream of travelling in a car without seatbelts they are lifesavers if there is an accident.

Working smoke alarms and escape plans are like seatbelts for sleepovers – you hope never to need them - but they must be there just in case...
